

Cover the Bases & Strike Out Fire

Fire Prevention Week 2001 will be October 7-13. This year will have a baseball theme of "Cover the bases & strike out fire." In keeping with this theme, here is a home safety checklist you can use to see if you hit a fire safety home run! Put a "Y" for yes or "N" for no, next to each of these questions. Tally your score of "Y"s and see how you did in the score box below.

- There is always an adult in the kitchen when food is cooking on the stove.
- Are stove tops clean & uncluttered?
- Are pot holders within easy reach?
- Are pot handles turned in so they can't be bumped?
- Are curtains well away from the stove?
- Is there a "kid-free" zone of three feet around the stove when cooking?
- Are extension cords used safely? (not under carpets or across doorways)
- Are all electrical cords in good condition?
- Are kitchen appliances (toaster, microwave, etc.) plugged into separate outlets?
- Has your fireplace chimney been cleaned during the past year?
- Is there a screen in front of your fireplace to catch sparks?
- Are propane tanks and other fuels stored safely outside your home?
- Has your heating system been serviced by a professional within the past year?
- Are portable heaters turned off at bedtime or when no one is home?
- Are portable heaters kept at least 3 feet from anything that can burn?
- Does your home have working smoke alarms on every level and by the bedrooms?
- Are the batteries working in all your smoke alarms?
- Are all the exits in your home clear of furniture, toys, and clutter?
- Does your family have a home fire escape plan?
- Has your family picked a place to meet outside after you exit your home?
- Have you practiced the plan within the past 6 months?
- Do the kids know how to call for help using 911?

From the Mayor's Desk ...



A few years ago, drivers along Lake Street endured a year of traffic difficulties at the intersection of Lake Street and Wood Dale Road/Villa Avenue. The roadway was raised nearly four feet, and the entire intersection was improved.

The traffic hassles experienced during those months are a distant memory, and there is no disputing the fact that those hassles were indeed worth it.

Residents and commuters once again will be experiencing some difficulties along Lake Street as the Illinois Department of Transportation this fall begins its yearlong project to widen and resurface the eastern portion of Lake Street.

For those who travel Lake Street often – and most of us do – there is no doubt that we will experience inconveniences. The blocking of lanes and the noise of construction are never pleasant in the short term.

However, in the long term, we will have an improved main thoroughfare through town, that more easily handles the increasing traffic load of a growing community.

We ask for your patience during this time. To minimize your inconvenience, we encourage you to use alternate routes when possible, and leave yourself extra time to get where you are going.

We also regret the inconvenience our Lake Street businesses will endure during this time, and we encourage our residents to continue to patronize these local establishments during construction.

Lake Street Project to Begin

IDOT Plans Phase I – Addison Road into Elmhurst – for Fall Start

The long awaited widening and resurfacing of Lake Street (U.S. Route 20) will begin this fall, and will be completed by the end of September 2002, according to the Illinois Department of Transportation.

With bids for Phase I of the project scheduled to be opening in mid-September, the project should begin in late October or early November.

Phase I will include Lake Street and its intersections, beginning just west of Addison Road, and continue east into Elmhurst. However, the intersection of Lake Street and Wood Dale Road/Villa Avenue, which was completely reconstructed in 1995-96, will be omitted from this project.

The project will begin with the relocation of utilities, and include the resurfacing the entire roadway. In addition, some portions will be widened.

From Iowa to Maple, the highway will be widened to include a fifth lane, to be used for left turns from either direction.

The intersection of Lake Street and Addison Road will also be widened to allow for longer left turn lanes off of Lake Street, and the addition of right-turn only lanes.

During much of the construction, lanes will be closed, and traffic will be accommodated by just one lane of traffic in either direction.

No schedule has been released as of yet by I.D.O.T. for the remainder of Lake Street reconstruction, although it is planned to be finished within the next five years.

The entire project is funded by the State of Illinois, through Governor George Ryan's "Illinois First" program, and was made possible through the efforts of local legislators, such as Illinois Representative Lee Daniels and State Senator James "Pate" Philip.

The Village of Addison will contribute approximately \$1 million towards watermain replacement, ornamental street lighting, brick pavers and landscaping.

Vehicle Stickers on Sale Now; Display by Oct. 15

Vehicle stickers are now on sale, and may be purchased by mail or at the Village Hall Collection Office at One Friendship Plaza. Stickers are valid Sept. 1, 2001 - Aug. 31, 2002.

Residents who currently have an Addison vehicle sticker should have received a preprinted renewal form in the mail. We encourage residents to verify the accuracy of the information on the form, and save time by using the return envelope provided.

New residents should bring the vehicle registration showing an Addison address when applying for a sticker. All the necessary information for the application can be found on your registration.

Please note that vehicles that do not display a sticker by Oct. 15 will be ticketed by Addison Police. Anyone

purchasing a sticker after Oct. 15 will incur a \$5 late charge. After Nov. 1, the late charge will be \$10.

Senior citizens, physically handicapped persons and/or veterans and active full-time armed forces personnel must present proof of their status. To receive a senior citizen discount, the motor vehicle owner must reach the age of 65 on or before Jan. 1, 2001. Physically handicapped persons must have a handicapped license plate on their vehicle to qualify for the discount.

Discount fees shall apply to one motor vehicle registered per individual. If an owner has more than one vehicle, the reduced fee will apply to

Branch Pickup Service Concludes in October


The Village of Addison offers seasonal branch pickup service to residents from April through October. Branch pickup dates are determined by the area of town in which one resides.

Branches should be out on the parkway the **Sunday before their scheduled pickup**. Village crews will pass down the street only once during each week. Only one collection will be made per area per month.

The requirements are as follows:

- Branches should be on the **parkway, not the street**, stacked in one direction on the parkway with the thicker end facing the street.
- Branches should be limited to eight feet in length and eight inches in diameter.
- Limbs larger than eight inches in diameter should be cut into 16-inch log lengths and placed separately from the branches. Logs will be picked up Thursday or Friday of that week.
- Branches should not be tied with string, wire, etc.
- No root balls, lumber or landscape waste will be collected.

A Bit of Addison History

Visitors to the Addison Historical Museum might enjoy reading "Fond Reflections of Addison's Days Gone By," which is a 10-page record of the memories of former resident Clarence Fiene. Mr. Fiene lived in Addison from his birth in 1908 until the late 1990s. Here is a sample of what he wrote:

During World War I, wheat flour was very scarce. It no longer could be purchased in stores. My father bought wheat from farmers then hauled it to the old Windmill on Mr. Heidemann's farm to have the grain ground into flour. It was a great privilege to come to the Windmill with my father to watch the operation. At a distance the huge wings of the Windmill looked as though they barely were turning. However, while standing on the balcony floor on the Windmill, the wings would whoosh--whoosh--whoosh--whoosh! on by at an alarming rate of speed. Inside the mill, the various sieves were shaking making a loud noise like rump--rump--rump--rump! There was loud creaking and groaning from the drive shafts which transmitted power to the various operations. The shaking sieves would produce a haze in the mill from minute particles of ground grain which would remain in suspension for long periods of time. A generous layer of the substance would settle on the eyebrows and mustache of Mr. Heidemann, giving him the appearance of an old white-haired man

To see the old Windmill in operation was an adventure I shall never forget.

Schools Are Open; Remember to Drive Safely

Beat

The Addison Police Department is asking for your help in making our school zones safe.

One of the biggest complaints the Police Department receives from crossing guards, parents and school staff are the failure of motorists to use due care in school zones. This includes reports of motorists driving too fast and passing school buses loading and unloading children.

The Addison Police Department aggressively enforces traffic laws near schools and school crossing areas, so drivers should be aware of school zone ordinances.

Speeding In School Zones: Remember, while school children are present, the speed limit in a marked school zone is 20 m.p.h. If a driver is cited for speeding in a school zone, the judge can impose an additional \$50 surcharge to go to the school district's safety program.

Passing a School Bus: Drivers passing a school bus that is loading or unloading school children (or displaying its "Stop Sign" and flashing red lights) will have their license suspended for three months and fined a mandatory \$150 for the first infraction. If they commit a second infraction within five years, they will be fined \$500 and have their license suspended for one year. Also, if you allow a person to operate your car and he or she illegally passes a school bus, you have to provide their name to the State's Attorney if asked. Failure to do so, will cause you to face the penalties as if you were driving the vehicle.

Please be alert for crossing guards and school children.

With help from everyone, we can have a safe and fun school year.

The Addison Police Crime Prevention Section has a variety of programs to educate citizens in taking part in preventing crime in their neighborhoods and businesses. Contact a Crime Prevention Officer to request a presentation or to inquire about a specific program. If you have a complaint about a member of the Addison Police Department, contact any one of the police department supervisors to voice your complaint and to fill out the appropriate personnel complaint forms. The Addison Police Department investigates all complaints against its employees in an effort to maintain the highest level of professional service to the community.

CHARACTER COUNTS! to Addison

Character development starts at home, but as the Ashanti saying goes, "it takes a whole village to raise a child." In recent months, Addison leaders have been meeting and making plans to implement the nationally recognized CHARACTER COUNTS! program for character development throughout our community.

Parents, teachers, youth leaders, and others of diverse backgrounds and professions all have a part to play in teaching young people to be responsible and live with integrity. This is most effectively done by setting a good example and working together with young people to reinforce the qualities present in individuals that exhibit good moral character.

Last year Lake Park and Indian Trail Junior High students took part in a pilot program in which 6th grade students visited 1st and 2nd grade classrooms at Lake Park each month to teach the younger students about the six pillars of character that have been defined as the basis for this program of character development.

This year, as the program expands in the community, signs of CHARACTER COUNTS! will be everywhere. The Josephson Institute of Ethics, creator of the program, suggests the use of the word TERRIFIC to help remember the Six Pillars of Character (T-R-R-F-C-C for Trustworthiness, Respect, Responsibility, Fairness, Caring and Citizenship). By way of introduction to these terms, the following descriptions are offered.



trustworthiness

**Be honest • Don't deceive, cheat or steal •
Be reliable — do what you say you'll do •
Have the courage to do the right thing • Build a good reputation •
Be loyal — stand by your family, friends and country**

respect

**Treat others with respect; follow the Golden Rule •
Be tolerant of differences • Use good manners, not bad language •
Be considerate of the feelings of others • Don't threaten, hit or hurt anyone • Deal peacefully with anger, insults and disagreements**

responsibility

**Do what you are supposed to do • Persevere: keep on trying! •
Always do your best • Use self-control • Be self-disciplined •
Think before you act — consider the consequences •
Be accountable for your choices**

Meet David Rolison, Army Trail's new principal

Army Trail students and teachers are used to seeing new faces in their building. Each year more than 70 new first graders enter the school and many other students transfer into second through fifth grades as well. This year, however, a very notable new face belongs to Mr. David Rolison, Army Trail's new principal.

Rolison comes to District 4 with a 31 year background in the field of education. Most recently he served as the principal of Golfview Elementary School in Carpentersville, a K-5 school with an enrollment of 750 students. Rolison began his career teaching Spanish to 4th-8th grade students. He continued to teach Spanish for the next 23 years

at the high school level. For the past 8 years, Rolison has been an administrator, serving as assistant principal at the high school level and principal at Golfview. He is currently working to complete his dissertation in order to earn his doctoral degree.

Having visited Army Trail School a number of

times in spring, Rolison says he is very excited about starting to work with the students and staff. He attended a summer workshop with five Army Trail staff members at which they studied standardized test scores from the 2000-01 school year. He plans to use the test data to make improvements with the goal of raising student test scores. "Student academic achievement is our main purpose," said Rolison, "so we always want to show improvement in that area."

Another goal of Rolison's is to get parents more involved in their children's education and the school. Having experienced success in recruiting parents for a beginning computer class in Carpentersville, he feels confident that he can reach out to Army Trail families as well. Rolison feels his background and his desire for open communication will help him establish and build relationships with parents and will help give voice to the Hispanic community at Army Trail.

One of the accomplishments of which he is proudest at Golfview was his success in finding space to create a computer lab for the students there. "I was so pleased to walk into Army Trail and see its beautiful new classrooms, labs and gym! There are so many opportunities here for the children to learn. I'm very excited about starting at Army Trail."

School improvements made during summer

Summer is always a busy time for the Buildings & Grounds crew in a school district as workers labor to improve buildings that are empty for the summer months. Walls, doors and trim are painted, new cabinets are installed and countless repairs are made.

One major project completed this summer included the renovation of the bathrooms adjacent to the junior high commons area. The improvements include all new lighting, ceiling panels, faucets, sinks, partition doors and toilets with auto flushers. "With the newly painted walls, these rooms will be much brighter and nicer for the students," said Building and Grounds Supervisor Joe Munch.

The air chiller system installed last summer at Indian Trail has proven to be quite effective as summer school students were able to attend classes in June and July in a comfortable setting

Grant links students with Historical Society

Indian Trail Junior High students under the guidance of teacher John Tataris used some very modern technology to make Addison history available to Internet users. With money made available through a Museum in the Classroom grant, they created a web site that brings the Addison Historical Museum to life.

Tataris began working with students Matt Gatz and Laura Schmidt on this project in January laying out storyboards and deciding what direction they wanted the project to take. After spring break they put in many hours filming at the Historical Museum, editing videotape and constructing a web page which takes visitors on a virtual tour of the museum.

The students visited the museum on Monday, June 11 to present their web tour to Jeannette Paradiso and the members of the Addison Historical Society. The tour is available online through the Village of Addison website, addisonadvantage.org.

“This is a really wonderful project that these students have developed,” said Bertie Ratliff, a District 4 art teacher who has worked with the district’s technology department for the past 2 years. “They’ve done a marvelous job of using technology to make this information about the history of Addison available to the Internet audience.”

John Tataris designed and maintains the website for Indian Trail Junior High. During the 2000-01 school year he taught computer classes at Indian Trail, where he proposed this project to his students. “We all enjoyed working on this project and learned a great deal from it,” said Tataris. “We’ve offered our services again if any similar type of opportunity presents itself.” Tataris is currently exploring the possibility creating a virtual yearbook that Indian Trail students could purchase in CD format.

Summer bridges program reaches students

For the second summer in a row, the halls of the “round building” at Indian Trail were filled with the sounds of children learning. The Summer Bridges program, under the direction of Lincoln School principal Marilyn Krajenta, enrolled 161 students who spent 6 weeks building their reading, writing and math skills.

“This is a marvelous opportunity for the students to build their skills and at the same time, teachers are learning and working with new techniques and strategies to improve the ways in which they are able to teach students,” said Krajenta. “We’re so pleased to be able to offer this opportunity to so many children in Addison.” Twice as many students were enrolled in the Summer Bridges program as there were last year, the first year of the program.



Cover the Bases & Strike Out Fire

Fire Prevention Week 2001 will be October 7-13. This year will have a baseball theme of "Cover the bases & strike out fire." In keeping with this theme, here is a home safety checklist you can use to see if you hit a fire safety home run! Put a "Y" for yes or "N" for no, next to each of these questions. Tally your score of "Y"s and see how you did in the score box below.

- There is always an adult in the kitchen when food is cooking on the stove.
- Are stove tops clean & uncluttered?
- Are pot holders within easy reach?
- Are pot handles turned in so they can't be bumped?
- Are curtains well away from the stove?
- Is there a "kid-free" zone of three feet around the stove when cooking?
- Are extension cords used safely? (not under carpets or across doorways)
- Are all electrical cords in good condition?
- Are kitchen appliances (toaster, microwave, etc.) plugged into separate outlets?
- Has your fireplace chimney been cleaned during the past year?
- Is there a screen in front of your fireplace to catch sparks?
- Are propane tanks and other fuels stored safely outside your home?
- Has your heating system been serviced by a professional within the past year?
- Are portable heaters turned off at bedtime or when no one is home?
- Are portable heaters kept at least 3 feet from anything that can burn?
- Does your home have working smoke alarms on every level and by the bedrooms?
- Are the batteries working in all your smoke alarms?
- Are all the exits in your home clear of furniture, toys, and clutter?
- Does your family have a home fire escape plan?
- Has your family picked a place to meet outside after you exit your home?
- Have you practiced the plan within the past 6 months?
- Do the kids know how to call for help using 911?



A few years ago, drivers along Lake Street endured a year of traffic difficulties at the intersection of Lake Street and Wood Dale Road/Villa Avenue. The roadway was raised nearly four feet, and the entire intersection was improved.

The traffic hassles experienced during those months are a distant memory, and there is no disputing the fact that those hassles were indeed worth it.

Residents and commuters once again will be experiencing some difficulties along Lake Street as the Illinois Department of Transportation this fall begins its yearlong project to widen and resurface the eastern portion of Lake Street.

For those who travel Lake Street often – and most of us do – there is no doubt that we will experience inconveniences. The blocking of lanes and the noise of construction are never pleasant in the short term.

However, in the long term, we will have an improved main thoroughfare through town, that more easily handles the increasing traffic load of a growing community.

We ask for your patience during this time. To minimize your inconvenience, we encourage you to use alternate routes when possible, and leave yourself extra time to get where you are going.

We also regret the inconvenience our Lake Street businesses will endure during this time, and we encourage our residents to continue to patronize these local establishments during construction.

Lake Street Project to Begin

IDOT Plans Phase I – Addison Road into Elmhurst – for Fall Start

The long awaited widening and resurfacing of Lake Street (U.S. Route 20) will begin this fall, and will be completed by the end of September 2002, according to the Illinois Department of Transportation.

With bids for Phase I of the project scheduled to be opening in mid-September, the project should begin in late October or early November.

Phase I will include Lake Street and its intersections, beginning just west of Addison Road, and continue east into Elmhurst. However, the intersection of Lake Street and Wood Dale Road/Villa Avenue, which was completely reconstructed in 1995-96, will be omitted from this project.

The project will begin with the relocation of utilities, and include the resurfacing the entire roadway. In addition, some portions will be widened.

From Iowa to Maple, the highway will be widened to include a fifth lane, to be used for left turns from either direction.

The intersection of Lake Street and Addison Road will also be widened to allow for longer left turn lanes off of Lake Street, and the addition of right-turn only lanes.

During much of the construction, lanes will be closed, and traffic will be accommodated by just one lane of traffic in either direction.

No schedule has been released as of yet by I.D.O.T. for the remainder of Lake Street reconstruction, although it is planned to be finished within the next five years.

The entire project is funded by the State of Illinois, through Governor George Ryan's "Illinois First" program, and was made possible through the efforts of local legislators, such as Illinois Representative Lee Daniels and State Senator James "Pate" Philip.

The Village of Addison will contribute approximately \$1 million towards watermain replacement, ornamental street lighting, brick pavers and landscaping.

Vehicle Stickers on Sale Now; Display by Oct. 15

Vehicle stickers are now on sale, and may be purchased by mail or at the Village Hall Collection Office at One Friendship Plaza. Stickers are valid Sept. 1, 2001 - Aug. 31, 2002.

Residents who currently have an Addison vehicle sticker should have received a preprinted renewal form in the mail. We encourage residents to verify the accuracy of the information on the form, and save time by using the return envelope provided.

New residents should bring the vehicle registration showing an Addison address when applying for a sticker. All the necessary information for the application can be found on your registration.

Please note that vehicles that do not display a sticker by Oct. 15 will be ticketed by Addison Police. Anyone

purchasing a sticker after Oct. 15 will incur a \$5 late charge. After Nov. 1, the late charge will be \$10.

Senior citizens, physically handicapped persons and/or veterans and active full-time armed forces personnel must present proof of their status. To receive a senior citizen discount, the motor vehicle owner must reach the age of 65 on or before Jan. 1, 2001. Physically handicapped persons must have a handicapped license plate on their vehicle to qualify for the discount.

Discount fees shall apply to one motor vehicle registered per individual. If an owner has more than one vehicle, the reduced fee will apply to

Branch Pickup Service Concludes in October


The Village of Addison offers seasonal branch pickup service to residents from April through October. Branch pickup dates are determined by the area of town in which one resides.

Branches should be out on the parkway the **Sunday before their scheduled pickup**. Village crews will pass down the street only once during each week. Only one collection will be made per area per month.

The requirements are as follows:

- Branches should be on the **parkway, not the street**, stacked in one direction on the parkway with the thicker end facing the street.
- Branches should be limited to eight feet in length and eight inches in diameter.
- Limbs larger than eight inches in diameter should be cut into 16-inch log lengths and placed separately from the branches. Logs will be picked up Thursday or Friday of that week.
- Branches should not be tied with string, wire, etc.
- No root balls, lumber or landscape waste will be collected.

A Bit of Addison History

Visitors to the Addison Historical Museum might enjoy reading "Fond Reflections of Addison's Days Gone By," which is a 10-page record of the memories of former resident Clarence Fiene. Mr. Fiene lived in Addison from his birth in 1908 until the late 1990s. Here is a sample of what he wrote:

During World War I, wheat flour was very scarce. It no longer could be purchased in stores. My father bought wheat from farmers then hauled it to the old Windmill on Mr. Heidemann's farm to have the grain ground into flour. It was a great privilege to come to the Windmill with my father to watch the operation. At a distance the huge wings of the Windmill looked as though they barely were turning. However, while standing on the balcony floor on the Windmill, the wings would whoosh--whoosh--whoosh--whoosh! on by at an alarming rate of speed. Inside the mill, the various sieves were shaking making a loud noise like rump--rump--rump--rump! There was loud creaking and groaning from the drive shafts which transmitted power to the various operations. The shaking sieves would produce a haze in the mill from minute particles of ground grain which would remain in suspension for long periods of time. A generous layer of the substance would settle on the eyebrows and mustache of Mr. Heidemann, giving him the appearance of an old white-haired man

To see the old Windmill in operation was an adventure I shall never forget.

The Addison Police Department is asking for your help in making our school zones safe.

One of the biggest complaints the Police Department receives from crossing guards, parents and school staff are the failure of motorists to use due care in school zones. This includes reports of motorists driving too fast and passing school buses loading and unloading children.

The Addison Police Department aggressively enforces traffic laws near schools and school crossing areas, so drivers should be aware of school zone ordinances.

Speeding In School Zones: Remember, while school children are present, the speed limit in a marked school zone is 20 m.p.h. If a driver is cited for speeding in a school zone, the judge can impose an additional \$50 surcharge to go to the school district's safety program.

Passing a School Bus: Drivers passing a school bus that is loading or unloading school children (or displaying its "Stop Sign" and flashing red lights) will have their license suspended for three months and fined a mandatory \$150 for the first infraction. If they commit a second infraction within five years, they will be fined \$500 and have their license suspended for one year. Also, if you allow a person to operate your car and he or she illegally passes a school bus, you have to provide their name to the State's Attorney if asked. Failure to do so, will cause you to face the penalties as if you were driving the vehicle.

Please be alert for crossing guards and school children.

With help from everyone, we can have a safe and fun school year.

The Addison Police Crime Prevention Section has a variety of programs to educate citizens in taking part in preventing crime in their neighborhoods and businesses. Contact a Crime Prevention Officer to request a presentation or to inquire about a specific program. If you have a complaint about a member of the Addison Police Department, contact any one of the police department supervisors to voice your complaint and to fill out the appropriate personnel complaint forms. The Addison Police Department investigates all complaints against its employees in an effort to maintain the highest level of professional service to the community.

One of the accomplishments of which he is proudest at Golfview was his success in finding space to create a computer lab for the students there. "I was so pleased to walk into Army Trail and see its beautiful new classrooms, labs and gym! There are so many opportunities here for the children to learn. I'm very excited about starting at Army Trail."




