



Talented actress **ANNETTE BALDWIN** portrays Jane Addams' warmth, strength of character, and ability to affect social change in America. Prevent Cooking Fires: Watch What You Heat

It's time for Fire Prevention Week, and from October 8-14 the Addison Fire District is joining forces with fire departments throughout the nation to remind local residents to 'Prevent Cooking Fires: Watch What You Heat.' During this year's fire safety campaign, firefighters will be spreading the word about the dangers of cooking fires—most of which result from unattended cooking—and teaching local residents how to prevent cooking fires from starting in the first place.

According to the latest National Fire Prevention Association (NFPA) research, cooking is the leading cause of home fires. One out of three home fires begins in the kitchen—more than any other place in the home. Cooking fires are also the leading cause of home fire-related injuries.

Among the safety tips that firefighters will be emphasizing:

- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, broiling, or boiling food.
- If you must leave the room, even for a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- When you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, stay in the home, and use a timer to remind you.
- If you have young children, use the stove's back burners whenever possible. Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the stove.
- When you cook, wear clothing with tight-fitting sleeves.
- Keep potholders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, paper and plastic bags, towels, and anything else that can burn, away from your stovetop.
- Clean up food and grease from burners, stovetops, and ovens.

This is the 85th year that fire departments have observed Fire Prevention Week, making it the longest running public health and safety observance on record. The annual Addison Fire District's, Fire Prevention Week Open House will be held Saturday, October 14, from noon until 3:00. The event will be held at Fire Station #2, 666 South Vista Avenue (one block south of Fullerton and one block east of Grace Street). Mark your calendar now!



Candle Care

Candles can add a warm glow to a home, especially during the holiday season. Please take care to keep candles a safe distance from drapes, decorations, or anything else that can burn. Never leave candles burning while away from home



Turkey Tips



Practice safe food preparation procedures to reduce the risk of food borne illness to your family this Thanksgiving holiday. Meat and poultry, the centerpiece of most holiday meals, can be a source of food borne disease such as Salmonella bacteria, unless handled and prepared properly.

- Use a cooking thermometer to determine if the turkey is fully cooked. The meat should reach 180° Fahrenheit (F), and if the bird is stuffed, the stuffing must reach at least 165° F.
- After using utensils or cutting boards for raw food preparation or handling, thoroughly wash these items before using them for the preparation or handling of any other food.
- Wash your hands thoroughly before and after preparing any food product.
- When thawing a frozen turkey, either keep it refrigerated on a tray or thaw under cold running water.

The 5th Annual "Addison By the Slice" Pizza Bakeoff once again drew crowds to the Village Green to award prizes in several categories.

This year, though, it was just one of many festivals that drew the community together during the weekly Concerts in the Park east of Village Hall.

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Join the Neighborhood Watch

The goal of the Neighborhood Watch program is to reduce crime and criminal opportunity in participating neighborhoods.

The Addison Police Department works as a team with neighborhoods to resolve problems. We also make it easier for you to get to know your neighbors by providing your Watch Area with a **monthly** newsletter which is delivered by Block Captains on the third Tuesday of every month. They are also available on the Village website under Crime Prevention programs- Neighborhood Watch at *AddisonAdvantage.org*.

By working as a team, we teach your neighborhood how:

- To create physical and psychological barriers to reduce the opportunity for criminal activity at the neighborhood level.
- To foster communication and build helpful relationships between neighbors.
- To create more communication links between the police and the neighborhoods.

How does your neighborhood become involved?

- Host a Watch Meeting for the residents in your area
- After the meeting, Neighborhood Watch signs are placed in participating neighborhoods.
- Have persons volunteer to become Block Captain/Co-Block Captains for the neighborhood.
- Block Captains would be responsible for pick-up and distribution of monthly newsletter to each resident in their area.

As the Mayor's Community Charity Ball has continued to grow in popularity each year, so has the Silent Auction. What began as a select few items available for bid has grown into 200 or more items that help to raise the majority of the funds that are donated to the sponsoring organizations.

Due to the volume of items purchased, organizers have announced that changes are planned to streamline the payment process at the end of the Silent Auction.

At the beginning of the evening when receiving seating assignments, guests will have the opportunity to pre-register their credit card and receive a bid number. Should they win one or more items during the Silent Auction, their items will automatically be marked "Paid," and they will be able to skip the payment line and simply pick up their item(s.) In the event they do not win any items, or decide not to bid, nothing will be charged to their credit card, and the information will be destroyed.

"Pre-registration is something that has been done

successfully by other fundraising organizations at recent Silent Auctions," said Doree Krage, event coordinator. "We appreciate our guests' generosity, and don't want the payment process to become such an inconvenience that they don't want to participate in the auction."

Pre-registration is not required, however. Those who do not pre-register are still welcome to bid during the Silent Auction. Should they win, they will simply pay for the items after bidding closes.

"As the auction has grown, unfortunately so has the payment line," Krage said. "Pre-registration will cut down on the number of people who need to go through that line."

The entire payment process, whether guests decide to pre-register their credit card or not, is overseen by Village of Addison employees who volunteer to work at the event.

Are Your Trees Under Attack By Killer Volcanoes?

Do you have a mountain of mulch climbing up the tree in your yard or parkway? Does the trunk of your parkway tree look like a telephone pole buried in a pile of woodchips? If you answered yes to either question, you are very likely killing your tree.

Mulching is one of the most beneficial things a homeowner can do to keep trees healthy. When applied properly, mulch helps maintain soil moisture, control weeds, improve soil structure, insulate plant roots, and inhibit certain plant diseases. Mulch also protects plants and trees from “weed whacker” damage and lawnmower injuries – in addition to giving planting beds a uniform, well-cared-for look.


Over-mulching, however, is one of the most frequent landscaping mistakes made – often causing significant damage to the tree. Although the mounding of mulch high around the trees may appear aesthetically pleasing to many homeowners, reputable certified landscape contractors and arborists avoid such poor plant health-care practices. Too much mulch – be it layers deep or piled high against tree trunks – can cause major problems and prove harmful in more ways than one, including:

- Excess moisture in the root zone, which causes plant stress and root rot
- Insect and disease problems
- Micro-nutrient deficiency or toxicity
- Weed growth
- Unpleasant smell, caused by anaerobic conditions and “sour” mulch
- Habitat creation for rodents that chew bark and girdle trees

Mulching basics

To ensure the health of your trees and plants, follow these practical mulching tips to landscape like the pros:

- For well-drained sites, apply a 2 to 4-inch layer of mulch. If drainage problems exist, use a thinner layer.
- If mulch is already present, check the depth. Do not add mulch if there is already a sufficient layer. Instead, rake the old mulch to break up any matted layers and refresh the appearance.
- *Avoid placing mulch against the tree trunk.* The mulch surrounding a tree should resemble a “crater” (thickest at the outer edges and shallow in the center up to the root crown) not a “volcano or mound” (where mulch is mounded/piled up against the tree).
- Mulch out to the tree’s drip line (branch tips) or beyond if possible.
- Most commonly available mulches work well in most landscapes. Be mindful that some plants may benefit from the use of a slightly acidifying mulch such as pine bark.



Over-mulching, especially against the tree trunk (as pictured at left) can cause permanent damage to a tree. Mulch should be placed thickest at the outer edges (right.)

Free Mulch Available

The Village of Addison provides Addison residents with *free* truck-load deliveries of woodchip mulch (3 cubic yards or greater).

To inquire about or arrange for the free delivery of woodchip mulch, call the Public Works Department at: 620-2020.

Residents who wish to receive less than 3 cubic yards of mulch may help themselves to free mulch located at the southwest corner of the intersection at Vista and Winthrop Avenues, where the Village maintains a wood chip supply for residents.

What's new in District 4?

Every school year brings new changes into the classroom, but the beginning of this school year at District 4 has really been exceptional. For the 2006-07 school year, the District has implemented a great number of changes that will have a positive effect on our students and their families now and in the years ahead.

The most obvious changes have been made to our school buildings. The renovation project that was made possible by the passage of a building bond referendum in



April, 2004 has been completed. This past summer, Indian Trail, Lake Park, Lincoln, Stone and Wesley Schools have all been renovated--as Ardmore, Army Trail and Fullerton were the summer before. Last spring the schools were emptied. Everything from books, desks and chairs to computers, paper and pencils were

removed from the buildings and moved into storage bins outside the four elementary buildings and into the 2 gyms at Indian Trail. On the day after school ended in June, the walls started coming down. New walls, electrical wiring, ventilation system/air conditioning, bathrooms, cabinets, classrooms, elevators and a food service kitchen (which serves the entire District) were all built during the summer. The changes are extensive and have greatly improved the learning environment for the students.



Another major change in the District is the implementation of the technology plan which has given all classroom teachers Think Pad computer tablets to be used as their primary computers. These portable devices, along with wireless access to the Internet, and digital projectors, will give teachers great flexibility in working in both large and small group settings. Training designed to assist teachers in maximizing their use of the new technology was held in June and August. Further training will continue on student early dismissal days which are scheduled for November 21, January 25 and February 22.

The Board of Education approved the purchase and adoption of a new science curriculum in February, 2006. Students in grades 1-5 are now studying the new McGraw Hill curriculum and junior high student are working with the McDougall Littel series. These materials were selected by the Science Committee, which has teacher representatives from all grade levels and from each of our schools. As with other curriculum adoptions in recent years, a great deal of information about the science curriculum is available to parents and accessible on the Internet through the district website, www.asd4.org.

Residents of the Lincoln School attendance area have probably all seen the new playground that was built on school grounds in August. KaBOOM and Motorola

We believe that learning will be enhanced with the partnership of computer technology, teachers and students.

The 2006-07 school year is going very well. It will continue to be a very exciting year for our students. Please contact any building principal or me with concerns or questions.

partnered with Lincoln to help provide expertise, funding and volunteers to create a playspace, planter benches,



picnic benches and an outdoor classroom area. KaBOOM is also planning to work with District 4 to build a playground at Army Trail School in October. We are grateful for the support of KaBOOM and our corporate sponsors in creating play areas that will be enjoyed by students and neighborhood children.

Indian Trail students who take Industrial Technology classes this year are experiencing an entirely new approach to learning applied technology skills. 7th and 8th grade students will be designing projects on computers in a wide range of



areas --space & rocketry, engineering and stress analysis, web development, video production and more. Students will be able to develop the projects they design in a lab setting.

Another change made during the summer was the centralization of student registration for students that are new to the area. Previously, parents registered their children at the individual school buildings, which could be difficult for families with multiple children that would be attending different schools. This year, parents were invited to come to the district's administrative office to register all of the children in their family at the same time.

The summer of 2006 brought an exceptional number of new changes to the staff and families of District 4, all of which have the common goal of providing a better educational experience for our students. We are grateful for the effort of our entire staff in implementing these improvements!

New staff for schools

Close to 40 new staff members joined District 4 this fall as new teachers. They began the year with a four day orientation program where they met administrative team members and attended curriculum overview, technology, insurance and other procedural sessions. On the last day of orientation the new teachers were given a bus tour of the school district and met with the veteran teachers who will be serving as their mentors during their first year in District 4.

A more effective way in which citizens can obtain current information about registered sex offenders is to go to the website of the Illinois State Police, www.isp.state.il.us/sor/frames.htm, or to the website of the DuPage County Sheriff's Department, www.co.dupage.il.us/sheriff/Offender/exoffenderhome.htm. These websites allow access to the database by name or location (city, zip code or county name).
