



◀ Addison Trail students participate in mock interviews with staff and community members, in order to improve communication and interpersonal skills that students need for success beyond high school.



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

School Improvement Plan Charts a Course

As Addison Trail High School prepares to open the 2007-08 school year, the **course of action for improving student achievement** will continue to focus on increasing reading and math achievement, as well as increasing the graduation rate of students.

The **School Improvement Plan** (SIP) is a three-year plan required by the Illinois State Board of Education and outlines the academic goals for schools and strategies to meet these goals.

The Addison Trail administration and staff have identified the following **academic goals for 2007-2010**. The goals will be achieved through personalizing the learning environment and identifying student needs for academic and social interventions:

Math and Reading Goal

- ❑ ATHS will improve by 10% in 2007, and by 15% in 2008 and 2009, the number of students overall, and in targeted subgroups who meet or exceed on state tests.

Graduation Rate Goal

- ❑ The graduation rate of the overall student population will increase from 82.5% in 2006, to 92.5% in 2010.

DeVry Partnership Strives to Improve Student Math Achievement

Nearly 90 incoming freshmen from Addison Trail and Willowbrook High Schools experienced summer school for the first time on a college campus thanks to a partnership between District 88 and DeVry University. This **unique learning opportunity for students** offered a computer-assisted instructional model called "MyMathLab." The online course was designed to increase the skills necessary to be successful in high school algebra classes.

"MyMathLab" is an **Internet-based program** that has been used in over 400 colleges across the country to deliver instruction. The program provides dependable and easy to use online testing, homework, individualized study plans, along with a full online textbook **to help students be more successful**.

The incoming freshman, who were selected for the program based on placement test scores from spring, attended DeVry four days a week in June and July. They worked with District 88 math teachers and DeVry instructors who jointly developed the online course. **Each enrolled student worked at their own pace** in the classroom and had the option to practice math concepts at home, if they had Internet access. Upon successful completion of the program, each student received a half-credit in math.



District 88 incoming freshmen worked with high school and college instructors on math skills during summer school at the DeVry University campus. The new partnership offered a hands-on learning experience.



Having a working smoke detector is one of the easiest ways to protect yourself and your family from dying in a fire. The early warning given by the detector could mean the difference between being trapped and getting out safely. This month we will look at the basics of smoke detectors. How many should I have? Where should they be? How do you maintain a smoke detector? All these questions and more will be answered.

State law requires a smoke detector on every floor of your house, including basements. If you have finished your attic space, one would be required there as well. In addition, there has to be a smoke detector within 15 feet of all sleeping areas. Newer guidelines recommend a smoke detector in each bedroom as well.

The best location for the detector is on the ceiling, at least 6 inches from the wall. If you have to mount the detector on the wall, it should be 4 to 6 inches from the ceiling. This will allow the smoke to reach the detector as quickly as possible.

Maintenance is easy. The battery should be replaced at least once a year. You should test all your detectors monthly as well. A detector is usually good for 8-10 years. After this time the detector needs to be replaced. It is also a good idea to vacuum out your detectors occasionally. This will keep dust from interfering with its operation.

If you live in an apartment, the responsibility for smoke detectors is shared. The landlord is required to provide and maintain smoke detectors in all common areas. This includes laundry rooms, hallways and stairways. The landlord is also required to provide the appropriate number of smoke detectors inside your apartment. The tenant is required to maintain the detector. This includes changing the batteries. If you believe the detector in your unit is not working, contact management to have it replaced.

And remember, when your smoke detector or building's fire alarm sounds, you should leave and call 911. Too often the fire department arrives and people have not evacuated the building. There could be a problem that you are unaware of. Let the professionals figure out why the alarm is going off.



Did you know...

...there are special detectors for people who have vision or hearing disabilities? These special detectors use strobe lights, shakers or other specialized means to notify you in case of emergency. These can be ordered on the inter-net or from your local hardware store.

...there are smoke detectors for home use that work together? New construction is required to have smoke that are linked together. If one goes off, they all sound. This can increase the time you have to get out in case of fire. These can be fitted into your current house.

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Know The Rules For Going To/From School Safely

1. Instruct your child to always take a friend when walking to school – there is safety in numbers. Likewise, he/she should stay with a group while waiting at the bus stop.
2. If anyone bothers your child while going to and from school, you should teach him to get away from that person and tell a trusted adult.
3. Visit the bus stop with your child and learn the bus number.
4. Instruct him to say no if someone they don't know or feel comfortable with offers a ride. He should never accept a ride unless you have told him it is okay.
5. Tell him that if someone follows him on foot, to get away from them as quickly as possible. If someone follows him in a car, him should turn around, go in another direction and try to quickly get to a spot where a trusted adult can help him.
6. Children should be taught to never leave school with someone they don't feel comfortable with or know. They should check first with you or another trusted adult.
7. Instruct your child on how to properly get on and off the school bus. He should wait on the sidewalk, away from the curb, until the bus comes to a complete stop and the bus driver advises them to enter the bus. Stay seated until it has completely stopped, before exiting.
8. Walk the route to and from school with your children and point out landmarks and safe places to go if they need help.
9. Make certain that they really know and understand these safety rules. Make the walk to and from school a "teachable moment" and a chance to put their skills to the test.
10. When a bus is loading or unloading children, all traffic in both directions must stop otherwise it is a violation which requires a mandatory court appearance, possible license suspension for three months, as well as a minimum fine of \$150.
11. The speed limit changes around school areas to 20 mph when children are present.

Drivers Beware – Keep These Laws in Mind

As school is about to begin, officer presence will be more abundant to enforce traffic laws. Please keep the following in mind:

- **Parking Where Prohibited** – Do not stop or park on roadway side of another vehicle, also known as Double Parking. This law is extremely important since double parking usually contributes to traffic jams on or around school property. More importantly, drivers may not be able to stop in time when an individual crosses the front of their vehicle.
- **Improper Parking at Right-hand Curb** – Every vehicle stopped or parked on a roadway should be parallel to the curb, and within 12 inches. Children should never have to cross a lane of traffic after exiting a vehicle. This poses a risk of being struck by a passing vehicle. Pull all the way to the curb to drop off or pick up children.
- **Blocking a Private Driveway** – Never park a vehicle, occupied or not, in front of a public or private driveway, or within 15 feet of a fire hydrant. Drivers should be courteous to homeowners attempting to enter/exit their property.

The aforementioned laws were developed to maintain a level of safety and time-efficiency when dropping off children and picking them up. Please heed extra caution when driving through school zones. Vision 1, Goal 1: Undertake Strategic Property Redevelopment Initiatives in the Town Center

The Town Center Redevelopment Project is a long-term plan to create a distinctive civic heart for Addison.

The area is defined by Lake Street on the north, Diversey Avenue to the south, Addison Road on the east and Church Street to the west. Envisioned for this area is a mix of townhome and condominium buildings, commercial and mixed use properties.

The first redevelopment project within the Town Center was recently approved by the Plan Commission and Village Board. Property at the southwest corner of Lake Street and Michigan Ave., which housed the Addison Fire District from 1943 to 1989 and later a Heating and Air Conditioning Business, will see a mixed use development of retail, office and residential.

In addition, the Village has begun to initiate redevelopment where possible. As part of the Town Center goals, in June the Better Bilt industrial property at the northwest corner of Moreland Avenue and Addison Road was purchased for \$1

million. The 38,000 sq. ft. factory building was constructed in 1926, with additions added in the 1950s and 60s, and is situated on 50,000 sq. ft. of land. Better Bilt has been vacant since May 2006.

The Village's intent is to demolish the existing building, and sell the property to a single user or hold the property. By holding the property, it can later be assembled with adjacent property to create a larger, unified development.

In each issue of Spotlight on Addison, watch for updates the Village's Strategic Plan for 2007-2012. The Strategic Plan was adopted by the Village Board in December 2006.

Technology plan progresses

District 4 has for many years been a leader in using new technology to help improve the learning environment for students. As anyone who has ever owned an 8-track tape player knows, however, technology changes quickly and the latest 'new' technology can often become old and outdated before the owner has learned how to use it. District 4's technology plan has been developed with the goal of improving student learning. The plan involves research, training and a staged introduction to software and hardware products that will give children the best tools they need to learn.

Last year, teachers were issued tablet computers for use in the classroom. These portable machines, combined with digital projectors, made a great deal of difference in the ways that teachers delivered instruction in the classroom.

During the spring of 2007, a pilot group of teachers had the opportunity to test the next phase of the technology plan in the classroom. Mobile carts, containing 10 tablet computers per cart, were made available for student use within the classrooms. Teachers in the pilot group used the mobile labs in a wide variety of ways, for both whole group and small group instruction. In the upcoming school year, a total of 210 tablet computers will be available on mobile carts for classroom use. Teachers will have the opportunity to bring these computer 'labs' right into their classrooms.



Technology director Terri Bresnahan led a training session for teachers who piloted the use of the new mobile computers in the classroom.

School board members are taking advantage of the tablet computers as well, using them to access the new 'paperless' board packet system for the first time at the July Board of Education meeting. Administrators prepare and board members read and study a great deal of information each month in order to conduct the business of the school district. The new computer system, which makes the packet information available online, is intended to give the board easy access to the most current information and to save paper.

Another tool that was implemented at the end of the 2006-07 school year was Family Access for Indian Trail. Junior high parents were issued passwords that allowed them to go to the school district's web page and check their child's attendance, grades, emergency information and health records. This program was well received by parents and will continue to be used to share student information with students and their families.

No implementation of new technology can be successful unless the proper infrastructure is in place and that part of the technology plan has undergone change over the summer months as well. The wireless network is being upgraded to allow consistent access to educational materials and communication tools. The Board of Education also contracted with Comcast to install a fiber wide area network that will support faster and better transmission of data.



The Dr. Teeth Big Band came from England to Addison in May to perform at Fullerton School and Indian Trail Junior High School. Stephen Steinhaus, lead singer with the band, is a former Addison resident who attended both schools. The band had audience members snapping, clapping and dancing along with the music during the afternoon assembly at Fullerton and the evening concert at Indian Trail. Dr. Teeth held a clinic for junior high band students and they also performed with the IT Jazz Ensemble that night.

The Addison Music Parents provided dinner and lunch for the band, picked up the extra expenses for the band's performance, sold tickets, set up for the concert, took photos and distributed flyers. Thank you to everyone who was involved in providing this enjoyable learning experience for students!

Student registration information

Families who are new to Addison School District 4 may pick up registration materials for the 2007-08 school year during summer at the Administrative Office, 222 N. Kennedy Drive. Office hours are 7:45 am - 4:00pm.

The student fees for the 2007-08 school year are as follows: Kindergarten \$45.00, Grades 1-5 \$60.00 and Grades 6-8 \$90. These fees cover consumable materials such as work sheets and periodicals used by students.

Junior high students must also purchase a gym locker lock (\$5.50) and a gym suit (\$19.50).

Paid busing is also an option for those elementary students new to the district who live within .9 mile of their elementary school or for junior high students who live within 1.5 miles of Indian Trail. For parents who make a one-time payment, the fee is \$310. Those who choose a six-month installment plan will pay \$330.

Students involved in athletics, band, orchestra or choir will also be required to pay a fee of \$30 (\$20 for 5th grade band/orchestra) in order to participate in these activities.
