*This past year has seen a resurgence in patriotism that is heartening to see. People in all walks of life seem to have found new appreciation for their community and their nation, and are finding many ways to show it.*

*In May, we were approached by State Senator Peter Roskam (R-Glen Ellyn) and asked to participate in the Ground Zero Flag Tour. This moving tribute to the police and firefighters who suffered devastating losses in the terrorist attack in New York was a way to remind us of what we have suffered, but also of what we have overcome.*

## New Trustee Joins Board

Lynch Replaces Russotto

Village Trustee Jarrod Russotto resigned his seat on the Village Board May 20. William Lynch, 33-year Addison resident, was appointed by Mayor Larry Hartwig to fill his vacancy, and was approved by the Board.

into establishing a foundation to help those who have suffered brain injuries.

"I've realized, reluctantly, that it's not fair to the residents to have me dedicate less than my best efforts to the Board," Mr. Russotto said.

Russotto was appointed to the Board in 1997 when Mr. Hartwig was elected Mayor. Mr. Hartwig was acting mayor for two years following Village President Anthony Russotto's death in 1995. Trustee Russotto was then elected in 1999.

As Village President, Anthony Russotto had worked to improve the image of the community and spearheaded new development and redevelopment, including bringing *Dave and Buster's*, the beginning of Addison's entertainment corridor. Jarrod Russotto further championed those efforts during his tenure on the Village Board, working closely with the Village's Community Relations Department in marketing Addison, especially the now-flourishing enter-

Mr. Russotto cited increasing conflicts with his work schedule as he resigned the seat he has held for the past five years. He also indicated that he hopes to put his efforts

tainment corridor.

Upon acceptance of Russotto's resignation, the Village Board approved the appointment of William Lynch to fill the vacancy.

Mr. Lynch, who is employed by Sears, Roebuck and Co., in Hoffman Estates, has served the Village on two of its commissions; he has been a member of the Plan Council since 1990, and the Citizens Advisory Commission since 1989.

"My wife, Adele, and I raised our two sons here and we enjoy living in Addison," he said. "I think this is a great community, and I'm happy to be a part of this."

Mr. Lynch will serve the rest of Russotto's four-year term, which will end in the spring of 2003.

## Fireworks Demand Caution, Common Sense

Holidays bring a special time to enjoy family and friends.

However, each Fourth of July, thou-

sands of Americans are injured in fireworks related accidents.

The Addison Police Department would like Village residents to have a "safe and injury-free summer".

The best way to avoid injuries involving fireworks is to not use them. Instead, attend public displays conducted by professionals.

Every summer, the Police Department handles many fireworks calls. Thousands of dollars in fireworks are confiscated. A person in possession of fireworks can be arrested, whether it is a Village Ordinance ticket or a State Criminal charge.

The Village Code of Addison is very strict in the types of fireworks allowed. Sparklers, firecrackers, roman candles, and skyrockets etc. are considered illegal fireworks. The possession, sale and use of fireworks are prohibited under Section 13-25.1 of the Village code of Addison.

If someone is arrested under Village Ordinance, they could be fined up to \$500.00 dollars.

The Addison Police Department Crime Prevention Section has many programs geared to help citizens learn how to prevent crime in their neighborhoods or at their place of business. Contact the Crime Prevention Section if you would like to establish a Neighborhood Watch in your area.

## Village Tax Rate Lower, But Hard To Tell On Tax Bill

The good news is ... the Village of Addison's total property tax rate decreased from .4564 in 2000 to .4482 in 2001.

The bad news is ... it's not easy to see this on your tax bill.

The Village has been able to hold down property tax rates due to appreciating residential property values and consistent growth in its commercial and industrial areas. These areas saw increases due to such things as the opening of a new Osco store on Lake Street, and the construction of the world headquarters and warehouse facility for Pampered Chef on Swift Road.

Village leaders take pride in the fact that the tax rate has consistently remained below the midpoint of DuPage County communities, providing Addison residents with a high level of service at a reasonable rate.

This good news, though, is obscured by changes to the format of your tax bill.

The Village government's portion of your tax bill is shown in the inset.

At first glance, it looks like the Village implemented three new taxes in 2001. However, this really represents the two old codes being broken down into three new codes.

During 2001, the Village entered into new boundary agreements with the Villages of Lombard and Wood Dale. As a result of these agreements, two properties were disconnected from Addison and incorporated into these villages.

Even though these properties are

no longer part of Addison, they are still responsible for their share of any outstanding Village of Addison bond issues.

DuPage County must now separate Addison's regular village rate (VLG OF ADDISON-EXCPT BONDS) and its bond rate (VLG ADDISON-OPQR BDS.)

The .0888 bond rate shown above will continue to show up on the tax bills of the disconnected properties until the bonds are paid off in 2006.

## Vehicle Stickers Available

Vehicle stickers will go on sale Aug. 1. They can be purchased by mail, or at the Village Hall Collection Office, One Friendship Plaza. Stickers are valid Sept. 1, 2002 through Aug. 31, 2003.

Residents who currently have an Addison vehicle sticker should receive a pre-printed renewal form in the mail. We encourage residents to verify the accuracy of the information on the form and save time by using the return envelope provided.

We ask new residents to bring in your vehicle registration card showing your Addison address when applying for your sticker. All the information you need for the sticker application can be found on your registration card.



## Trash Tote Information

By now, all single-family and two-family residences in town have received their 96-gallon trash cart from the village's waste hauler, Browning-Ferris Industries (BFI.)

Residents should remember that these carts are to be used for regular household waste only, not landscape waste or recyclables. Carts should be placed at the curb with the metal bar facing the street.

Remember that these carts have been provided with no change to your trash service – pickup days remain the same, as does the “no limit” service, so additional trash cans may also be placed at the curb if needed.

## Events Planning Guide

The Village of Addison Special Events Planning Guide is available to any resident or organization that wishes to host an event in town. Now, this booklet is also available on-line, so that you may download and print out everything you need.

It takes the organizer through a step-by-step process to ensure a successful event, including everything from permit applications to public relations tips.

While the guide is not required, those who use this planning tool will have Community Relations Department staff to help throughout the entire process. The guide should be returned to Community Relations, Room 2400 of Village Hall, 60 days prior to the event.

Community Relations will then help in coordinating with the necessary departments and overseeing any permit applications.

## A visit with the board president

Gene Campbell has seen a number of changes during the 10 years he has served on the Board of Education for District 4. "During this time I have worked with 12 different board members, four business managers, three curriculum directors, two deputy superintendents and 12 principals," says Campbell. "Fortunately, I've been able to work with the same superintendent, Dr. Larry Weck, through all my years on the school board." Although many of the faces have changed over time, Campbell is pleased with the strong working relationship that has developed between the board, the administration and the teachers. "I think the fact that we've been able to adopt multiple year teacher contracts is an indication of the level of respect and trust that exists between the school board and the teachers."

When asked what he believes are the strengths of the current school board, Campbell mentions its adaptability and flexibility. "This is a very good group to work with. We have been able to take on issues, debate and discuss them, and come to solutions quickly."

Campbell, who is a long-time resident of District 4, has been involved with the schools for years. Through his involvement

as a parent and active PTA member, Campbell became aware that everyone has tasks they need to do in order for the schools to succeed. "What I like about serving on the school board is that it encompasses everything. We get to see things from many different points of view--all the different pieces of the puzzle that fit together to make things work."

One of the biggest challenges facing the school board is the budget. "Since the tax cap was imposed, districts have had to work even harder to finance the programs we want to offer to students," reports Campbell. "The board need to keep a primary focus on the budget in order to maintain our fund balances."

In response to a question of how the schools adapt to changes in the community, Campbell stresses the need for school board members to be aware of the changing climate. "For example, as we see growth in the number of single-parent families, we might need to consider hiring additional social workers. We always need to be aware of the needs of our community so we can plan to staff our schools accordingly."

# New student registration and fees

Families who are new to Addison School District 4 may pick up registration materials for the 2002-03 school year during summer at the Administrative Office, 222 N. Kennedy Drive.



The student fees for the 2002-03 school year are as follows:

Preschool/Kindergarten	\$35.00
Grades 1-5	\$44.00
Grades 6-8	\$68.00

Fees cover consumable materials such as work sheets and periodicals used by students. Junior high students must also purchase a gym locker lock (\$4.90) and a gymsuit (\$18.50).

Paid busing is also an option for those elementary students who live within .9 mile of their elementary school or for junior high students who live within 1.5 miles of Indian Trail. For parents who make a one-time payment, the fee is \$265.00. Those who choose a six-month installment plan will pay \$285.00.

Lunch costs have also been established. Elementary students will pay \$1.80 a day for a complete lunch. The daily junior high lunch price will be \$1.90.

Students involved in athletics, band or orchestra will also be required to pay a fee of \$15.00 in order to participate in these activities.

Immunizations are available from the DuPage County Health Department for \$10 for each vaccine. Parents must accompany their children to the clinic and must present their children's current immunization records in order to receive the vaccine.

## Getting parents involved in education

Parental involvement has long been recognized as an important factor in determining a child's educational success. Schools encourage parents to visit classrooms, join parent groups such as PTA, monitor their child's homework progress and get involved in other appropriate ways. As society changes and more children come from homes where both parents work or homes where English is not the primary language, schools have to change their approach in order to help get parents involved with their child's education.

Dave Rolison, principal of Army Trail School, began a new program this year with that goal in mind. Over 45% of Army Trail's students have limited English proficiency and, while bilingual programs are in place to educate the students, parents are often feel inadequate in terms of their ability to become involved. To help these parents, Rolison invited Spanish-speaking parents to become involved with a Bilingual Parents Advisory Committee.

A large group of parents met five times during the past year. David Saucedo, an assistant principal in the Mannheim school district, came to Army Trail to present a program titled *Bien educado, mal educado* (Well Educated, Badly Educated). Another evening was scheduled as a reading night. At this meeting, members of District 4's bilingual staff showed a movie and then separated the attendees into different age groups to work on a variety of reading activities. Plans for future presentations will continue to have an educational emphasis. "We hope to have a math night, a presentation by a psychologist and more presentations by David Saucedo next year," reports Rolison.

In addition to the large group meetings, a small subgroup of parents met with Rolison during the year to act as a planning committee. These parents are ones that Rolison envisions as future PTA leaders.

"I'm pleased with the response we had from parents this year," said Rolison. "It's our job to educate the children. Since parental involvement is a large factor in a student's academic success, our goal is to help parents be more involved."

### CHARACTER COUNTS! all year long

As Addison completes its first year as a CHARACTER COUNTS! community, there are many positive changes that can be seen. In our schools, children are learning that the pillars of **TRUSTWORTHINESS, RESPECT, RESPONSIBILITY, FAIRNESS, CARING and CITIZENSHIP** are important parts of everyday life.

During the past school year, children who exhibited good character were recognized for their positive attitudes in many different ways, some of which included pizza parties, free lunch at Fuddrucker's, and names and pictures posted on school Walls of Fame .

When students were disciplined for making poor choices, they were reminded which pillar had been violated in order to reinforce the level of behavior that is expected from people in our community.

Schools presented musical concerts with a CHARACTER COUNTS! theme, parents read stories about good character traits, students watched videos and discussed the importance of being a person with good character.

District 4 looks forward to the continued growth of good character in our community as both children and adults remember that the way they act has an effect on others.

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

## Seven Warning Signs

When was the last time you thought about the wiring in your home? How old is it? Is it in good shape? Has it been changed or modified from its original design? Is it sufficient for your current demands? These are all good questions every homeowner should ask. If you are not sure about the condition of your home's wiring, have it checked by a professional electrician.

Each year, 38,000 home fires are caused by faulty electrical distribution equipment. While proper maintenance is always the best protection against fire, there are some warning signs that you may have an electrical problem in your home:

- ✓ Overloaded wall receptacles that employ multi-outlet extension cords or plugs.
- ✓ Wobbly plugs in wall receptacles
- ✓ Reliance on multiple extension cords
- ✓ Flickering or dimming lights
- ✓ Burning metal or plastic smell, call the fire department
- ✓ Hot or discolored receptacles, switch plates, cords, or plugs
- ✓ Tripping circuit breakers



Problems should be serviced by a professional electrician. Any sign of hot or burning smells should be immediately checked by the fire department.

## Torchiere Lamps

The halogen torchiere lamp is a popular free standing floor lamp. It is recognized by a shallow bowl-shaped light fixture mounted on top of a 6 foot pole and uses a tubular halogen bulb for light. The halogen bulbs burn much hotter than conventional light bulbs, up to 1000 degrees Fahrenheit. While newer lamps have several built-in safety features, care must be taken when using these lamps.



- Never place the lamp near anything that can burn (clothing, drapes, bedding, etc.)
- Never leave the lamp on while no one is home.
- Keep lamps away from pets and children or places where they can be tipped.

## Paramedic Recognition
