



Chemical Fire Engines

For over 100 years, fire engines have pumped water by means of high capacity water pumps powered by gasoline or deisel motors. However in the late 1800's, chemical fire engines made a brief appearance. These engines consisted of one or two 100 gallon tanks filled with water and ordinary baking soda. At a fire, a glass bottle filled with sulfuric acid mounted on top of the water tank was emptied into the tank. The resulting chemical reaction produced carbon dioxide gas that pressurized the tank to over 200 PSI, squirting water out of the connected hose like a shaken soda pop bottle.



Opticom System

The next time you are stopped at a red traffic light in Addison, take a look at the pole on which the light is mounted. On the pole you will see what looks like a small clear light bulb, facing oncoming traffic. This device is called an opticom. It is designed to sense the lights of an oncoming emergency vehicle and give that vehicle right-of-way through the intersection.



How does the opticom work? Emergency vehicles in Addison are fitted with a special strobe light that is activated when the emergency lights are on. As the vehicle approaches an intersection, the opticom senses the special strobe pattern. Once activated, the opticom will automatically operate the traffic signal to stop opposing cross-traffic and give the emergency vehicle a green light through the intersection.

You can tell the opticom is activated when its bright, white light is illuminated. A flashing light designates the emergency vehicle is approaching the intersection parallel to your lane and that your traffic light is, or will be, turning green. A solid opticom light indicates the vehicle will be traveling across the intersection, turning your traffic light red. In either case, all drivers must slow down and yield the right-of-way to the emergency vehicles. Pull to the right and wait until all emergency vehicles have passed. Then proceed with caution.



The opticom system and others like it are quickly becoming commonplace. This system has greatly improved the safety and travel times of vehicles responding to emergencies. Because in an emergency, seconds count.

From the Mayor's Desk ... A Look Back at 2002



Shortly after turning the page on another calendar year, the Village also begins the process of closing out another fiscal year, and in the case of 2002, financial concerns weighed heavily on village staff, as it did for residents. But while the economy has slowed, making it necessary for everyone to "tighten their belts," our community has continued to grow and see improvements.

Our business community expanded to include more high quality restaurants like IHOP, Home Run Inn Pizza and Applebee's, all near the hub of our entertainment corridor at Lake Street and Lombard Road.

Business also expanded with new, larger locations for two long-time Addison businesses – Caputo's Fresh Markets and The

Pampered Chef. Eleven years after opening at Lake Street and Kennedy Drive, Caputo's Fresh Markets moved into a sparkling new store near Mill Road, offering a wider variety of products to its customers and bringing the promise of new businesses to a long-empty shopping plaza. The Pampered Chef, which has grown at an astounding rate over the past few years, opened its international headquarters at Army Trail Road and Swift Road in October.

With more and more businesses coming to Addison that attract shoppers and customers from outside the community, transportation through town has become a top priority. Phase I of the reconstruction of Lake Street, beginning at the Village Hall and going east into

Elmhurst, was begun this year, and immediately proved the old adage that "things have to get worse before they can get better." We appreciate our residents' patience during the construction and lane closures, and encourage them to patronize our local businesses while they endure this enormous project.

The widening and reconstruction project will continue west, beginning with the burial of utility lines. By 2005, our community will enjoy a safe, wider thoroughfare that will also enhance the look of Addison.

While financial concerns forced the Village to postpone or reprioritize some new projects, ongoing plans in areas such as Green Oaks Court and

Centennial Park continue. Within the next year, Green Oaks Court will see a new park where several buildings once stood; and Lake Street and Rohlwing Road will see the completion of Centennial Lake, making the way for a new Hampton Inn & Suites in front of Marcus Cinema.

Making decisions that will affect our entire community is a responsibility that each member of our Village Board takes very seriously. In the past year, it was with a touch of sadness that we said “goodbye” to one of our colleagues, as Village Trustee Jarrod Russotto resigned his seat due to work commitments. Flood Information Outreach Project

The Village of Addison Community development Department – Engineering Division reminds residents of the following:

- ❑ **Flood Insurance:** Federal law requires a flood insurance policy be obtained for any federally backed mortgage secured for a building in a flood hazard area. Mapped flood hazard areas are available for viewing at Village Hall. The Village of Addison maintains a 15 percent reduction in premiums by FEMA-FIA due to its Class 7 CRS rating. Remind your insurance agent when renewing your flood insurance policy.
- ❑ **Drainage System Maintenance:** Obstruction of natural water courses, including man-made water courses and storm sewers, by

dumping trash or debris and oils are prohibited. It is important to keep these drainage systems free from obstruction to ensure the flow of water and to abate the maintenance costs. Violations will result in citations and fines.

- ❑ **Floodplain Development Permit Requirements:** The Village has stringent requirements relative to storm water management for developments in all areas. Ordinances regulate all types of development in floodplains, not just building construction. Please report any illegal filling, development or building in floodplains to 693-7530.
- ❑ **Flood Hazard, Flood Warning, Flood Safety and Property Protection:** Flood hazards and flood warning systems have been in-

corporated in the Village's Flood Mitigation and Flood Management Plan. A brochure is available at Village Hall and the Addison Public Library. The Engineering Division will continue to conduct site investigations and provide *technical assistance only* for property protection and drainage concerns.

- ❑ **Siren Tests, Emergency Assistance and Media Advisories:** Sirens are used for weather emergencies, as well as to alert the public of peacetime emergencies. Tune in to Addison Community Television Channel 6 for live bulletins and updates on emergency conditions, as well as Channel 19 for printed bulletins. Sirens are tested on the first Tuesday of each month at 10 a.m.

A Bit of Addison History

The Addison Historical Museum has in its collection records dating from 1898 to 1913 about the town of Swift. Swift was located near Addison on the southeast corner of Swift Road and Fullerton avenue, near the Illinois Central Railroad tracks.

Located there was a general store with a post office, feed mill and milk station. Area farmers brought their milk in 8 or 10 gallon cans for pick-up by the train, which took it to dairies in Chicago. Chipped ice was used to keep the milk fresh during the trip.

Surnames of some of the residents of Swift during this time period were Meyer, Patrick, Plass, Rosewindel, Westermann, and Zars.

The Patrick family lived on a farm south of the tracks and west of Swift Road. Wil-

liam Kirk Patrick, who came to DuPage County in 1850, was the supervisor of Bloomingdale Township from 1864 to 1873, as well as president of the DuPage Agricultural and Mechanical Society.

Grace Patrick, a relative, was the school teacher in the "English" (public) school, which was located on the west side of Swift Road, about 3/4 mile south of Army Trail Road. The school was eventually abandoned.

The most recent mention of Swift which we have found is on a 1962 topographic map of the area done by the U.S. Geological Survey.

Please contact the museum if you are able to provide any further information, photos, or reminiscences about Swift.

The Addison Historical Museum, located at 135 Army Trail Road, is open Saturdays from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. Call 628-1433 for information.

Village/Cable Television Scholarships Available

For the 16th year, the Village of Addison and its cable television provider, AT&T Comcast, will provide scholarships to local college and university students.

Five \$1,000 scholarships are available for mass communications students. Scholarship applications are due Friday, March 28, 2003 at 5 p.m.

Applications may be picked up at Village Hall during normal business hours at either the reception desk, or in the Community Relations Department in Room 2400, or they may be downloaded from the Village of Addison website at www.AddisonAdvantage.org.

All applicants must meet the following criteria in order to be considered for the scholarship:

- Must be an Addison resident.
- Must have enough college credits to be considered a junior or senior in the 2003-2004 school year.
- Must have a minimum grade point average of 3.0 on a 4-point scale.
- Must have declared a major in a mass communications field of study.

Mass communications majors are defined as those in one of the following three fields:

Media – including television, radio, film, audio/video engineering, or journalism.

Computer Technology – desktop publishing, computer graphics or internet/world wide web design.

Marketing – advertising or public relations.

Applications will be reviewed by a screening committee which will recommend recipients to the Village of Addison Board of Trustees. A maximum of five \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded.

Winter Safety Driving Tips



**Police
Beat**

Even though we've already had some snow to travel in this winter, historically the worst winter driving is yet to come. The Addison Police Department wants you to have a safe winter driving season.

When driving in the snow:

Slow Down! Even if you have four-wheel drive, everybody takes the same amount of time to stop. Don't overestimate your vehicle's ability to stop quickly.

Don't take chances. If weather conditions make travel dangerous, don't.

Make sure your vehicle is ready for winter. Is it tuned-up? Do you have wipers in good working order?

Carry emergency supplies, such as flashlight, flares, blanket, and cell phone if possible.

Keep your gas tank over half-full.

If you get into an accident:

Be prepared to present your Drivers License and Proof of Insurance.

You must report all accidents involving more than \$500 in damage or any personal injury.

If it happened on private property, you may be required to report to the Police Department.

During heavy accident reporting times (during snowstorms), you may be required to report to the Police Department for all non injury accidents. Dispatchers will advise you of the reporting procedures when you report the accident.

Parking Restrictions:

If you live on a snow route, please do not park on the street after 2 inches of snowfall. After 4 inches of snowfall there is no parking on any street. You could be subject to a \$25 village parking ticket.

Keep your sidewalks free of snow and vehicles – no one can block the sidewalks from 7 a.m. until 10 p.m. This will prevent pedestrians from having to walk in the streets.

Have a safe winter driving season.

If you have a complaint about a member of the Addison Police Department, contact any one of the police department supervisors to voice your complaint and fill out the appropriate personnel complaint forms.

The Addison Police Department investigates all complaints against its employees in an effort to maintain the highest level of professional service to the community.

Artist in Education Brings Passion for the Theatre

Children's Theatre Class with Cathleen Schandelmeier scheduled

The Addison Cultural Arts Development commission (ACADC) has received a \$9,550 grant from the Illinois Arts Council, a state agency, for a four-month residency with Cathleen Schandelmeier, a theatre artist specializing in creative writing and puppetry.

The ACADC will provide \$6,368, in addition to \$550 from each of the three school participating in the program this year: Fullerton School, Indian Trail Junior High School and St. Philip the Apostle Catholic School.

Approximately 1,200 students in Addison will benefit from the residency, which began in October.

Schandelmeier will also work with the Addison Children's Theatre, Lutherbrook Children's Center, senior citizens and the Addison Art Guild as community outreach.

"I feel theater is a valuable tool to every aspect of our culture – from fast food workers to corporate executives, from artists to firemen, from the page to the stage – because the balance of healthy self-care and the ability to work well with others is essential to its existence," said Ms. Schandelmeier.

Having received her bachelor's degree in theater from Northeastern Illinois University, she was named one of "100 Women Making a Difference" by *Today's Chicago Woman* in 1998, and earned the title "Poet Laureate of North Avenue Beach" where the "Beach Poets" series has been held since 1990.

In addition to writing and producing several plays, she has conducted residencies through the Illinois Arts Council since 1997, and taught drama and directed student-writ-

ten plays at the Evanston Arts Council in 2000.

"My primary ambition as a theater artist is to empower and educate people to learn to trust their gut instincts, to learn to make sound decisions, to be in a moment and experience it fully," she said. "These are the goals of my art."

In January, Ms. Schandelmeier will lead a theater workshop for children ages 7 through 12.

The one-day workshop, on Saturday, Jan. 11, will provide children with physical and mental theater exercises and puppet making as a means to express themselves in a mini production at the end of the day.

The program, sponsored by the ACADC and Addison Community Theatre, is partially funded by a grant from the Illinois Arts Council.

The limit for the workshop is 20 children; sign up at either of the Addison Park District locations: Community Recreation Center at 120 E. Oak St., or Centennial Park at 1776 Centennial Place.

Improving school communication

The primary goal of school districts is to improve student learning and achievement. Each year teachers and administrators spend countless hours assessing students and then using the information gathered in these assessments to develop plans to improve the schools and their methods of teaching. These school improvement plans play an important role in the direction a school follows.

Indian Trail Junior High School's school improvement plan for this year includes a focus on improving communication. This is a two-tiered plan. On one level, teachers and administrators are making an effort to improve communication between the school and the home. The second aspect of the plan involves the improvement of communication at the staff level —between between the elementary, junior high and high schools and between grades.

Over the years, many successful school-to-home communication tools have been developed. Open House evenings, parent/teacher conferences and notes to and from home are effective means to keep parents in touch with their child's school life. Additionally, every classroom has a telephone and computer, making phone calls and emails a convenient way for parents and teachers to contact each other. This year the Indian Trail staff has introduced two new approaches which they hope will share more information with parents. Teachers are being encouraged to create and distribute team newsletters which share their in-the-classroom events with students' families. Also "Trail Talk", the school newsletter, is being mailed into students' homes each quarter. This is an attempt to communicate information more directly to the parents, keeping them involved as partners in their children's education.

The second tier of the communication improvement plan involves working to improve articulation between grades and schools. Within District 4, IT's administrators spend time with 5th grade teachers and elementary principals to ensure proper classroom placement for students coming to the junior high. While standardized test scores and student grades are important in determining a child's placement, administrators are able to get a more accurate assessment after conferring with elementary teachers about each student's personality and learning style. Currently, meetings are being held to develop a similar program with Addison Trail. Under this plan, counselors from the high school will meet with the 8th grade team leaders each year to share student information and more accurately place those incoming students into the proper high school classes. This will allow teachers to be better prepared for the freshman students and students to get the

Superintendent search progresses

At the time this article is going to press, the school board has reached an important stage in their efforts to hire a new superintendent to replace Dr. Larry Weck who is retiring in June 2003. School board members met with the search firm of Bickert Group Ltd. in November to review applicant information and narrow the search to six candidates. Interviews are scheduled for December and the school board is hoping to announce their final decision in late December or early January.

“This has been a very positive experience and these top six candidates look very good,” related Don Puchalski, chairman of the school board’s search committee. “Dr. Weck has been involved in the process and Bickert said that, while superintendents are not normally involved, this has proven to be very beneficial. They plan to use District 4 as a model in the future.”

Fifty-three applications were received for the superintendent position. The search firm believes this is due to the fact that District 4 has a good reputation in the education community, citing the good working relationship between the Addison Teachers Association, the Board of Education and the administration. The second reason so many applications were received was because the school board began its planning early. District 4 is one to two months ahead of many area school districts who are also looking to hire new superintendents for next year.



Working with artist Cathleen Schandelmeier, 1st and 2nd grade classes at Fullerton each created puppets and wrote stories which they performed for other classes. Students at Fullerton and Indian Trail Junior High are working this year with Schandelmeier through the Artist in Residence program which is sponsored and funded by the Addison Cultural Arts Development Commission and a grant from the Illinois Arts Council, a state agency. The program is made available to Addison schools on a rotating basis.

Developmental Screening

Voluntary screenings for all three, four and five year old children living in the Addison School District attendance area will be held throughout the year at Ardmore Elementary School. The purpose of the screening is to identify children who may encounter some learning problems or who would benefit from specialized help prior to entering kindergarten.

The instrument used for screening is called the AGS Early Screening Profiles. AGS gives information about developmental skills such as how a child uses his or her body (fine motor skills), knowledge of basic concepts like counting and letters, and the child’s use of language. Vision and hearing screening is also included in this process.






