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

From the Mayor's Desk ...



Over the past few years, the term “security” has taken on a new meaning, especially in terms of our communities. No longer are our local police departments concerned with only local crimes and crime prevention – they have become our local branches of what we all know as Homeland Security on the federal level.

Training for emergency preparedness involves every department of our municipal government, as well as cooperation with other agencies in Addison, including the fire district and DuPage County Emergency Management, as well as our school and park districts.

This is because emergency training helps prepare our employees for situations on nearly any scale. The same basic issues need to be addressed in any emergency, be it on a purely local level such as the gas leak experienced at a local business last year, or larger tragedy such as a tornado. Whatever type of emergency we face, we must be sure that every facet of our municipal government is prepared and ready to handle it. I am proud to say that Addison has truly led the way in training all its personnel.

More than a year ago, the Addison Police Department worked with staff in all Village Departments to completely rewrite our Emergency Plan. This manual is the blueprint outlining the role of our employees during crisis situations.

Building upon this, last spring elected officials and Village Department heads underwent N.I.M.S. Training (National Incident Management System) and went through a tabletop drill to outline procedures that would be followed in a large scale disaster.

In November a real-life drill was held at Addison Trail High School, involving not only our local taxing bodies, but DuPage County and the police departments from many of the communities surrounding Addison. I am happy to say that our community is well prepared.

Emergency preparedness is not just something for government employees, however. The Addison Police Department has already graduated two groups of residents in the Citizens Emergency Response Team (C.E.R.T.) program. This will enable us to have a database of volunteers that can be called to help out during an actual incident.

We all hope that this is training that is never needed or used, but if the unthinkable should happen, Addison is ready.

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Traffic Safety a Police Priority

Traffic Safety has always been a priority for the Addison Police Department. Just recently the department has increased the number of full-time Traffic Officers to three. This allows the department to have a Traffic Officer on each shift to address traffic concerns, investigate traffic crashes and work proactively to make Addison safer for all who drive in the village.

Supervised by Sergeant Karen Miller, the traffic officers include Officer Gordon Nisbet, Officer Michael Wadsworth and Officer Chris Weinbrenner. Each officer has or will receive a wide variety of specialized training specific to traffic enforcement. Some of the training includes accident investigation, accident reconstruction, breath analysis operator, truck enforcement and safety seat technician training.

The goal of the Traffic Unit has always been to prevent fatal accidents from occurring, reduce the number of accidents and to educate the motoring public about their responsibilities when it comes to operating a motor vehicle.

With the expansion of the unit and an emphasis on public information and education you can rest assured that the traffic officers will be highly visible in the community. Traffic officers teach one of the classes for the department's Citizen Police Academy and are available to speak at meetings for homeowners associations or businesses.

In addition to being involved in the community, traffic officers will be aggressively pursuing traffic law violators. The unit will be utilizing targeted enforcement through saturation patrols, selected enforcement

Citizens Police Academy Seeks Recruits

The Addison Police Department will host the Citizens Police Academy on Wednesday evenings from 6:30 p.m. - 9 p.m. from March 29 - June 7, 2006.

The Citizen Police Academy is a free 11-week program designed to give participants an understanding of the operation of the Addison Police Department. It provides an opportunity for citizens to develop direct lines of communication with the police department. Citizens participating in the academy will have a working knowledge of the Addison Police Department and its functions.

The Academy will conclude with a graduation ceremony in which each participant will receive a certificate of completion, and a unique Citizen Police Academy shirt. Graduates will have the option of continuing on to the Alumni Citizen Academy and partner with the police department to assist in identifying existing problems and possible solutions for issues that affect the quality of life for Addison residents.

Participants must be at least 18 years of age, and must live or work in Addison. An application for the academy must be completed, which will be subject to a background

A Bit of Addison History

On September 18, 1960, *The Chicago Sunday Tribune* included an eight-page section advertising Caron's new Westwood subdivision in "...nearby Addison ... where the LIVING is easy!"

The Caron family, which had been in the building business since 1888, was one of the first builders and settlers in Oak Park. Westwood subdivision, located north of Army Trail Road, and west of the Addison Golf Club, was their third development in Addison, and was designed in the Caron tradition of "luxury without ostentation."

Six models were offered, and they all began with the letter "M": the Metropole, the Milford, and the Merchant had two stories, the Mayflower and the Monitor were ranches, and the Merrimac was a bi-level. All models had either three or four bedrooms, and 1 - 2 baths. The Merrimac was the only model that did not come with a full basement. Minimum lot size was 70' x 120', and prices ranged from \$17,950 to \$24,450.

Readers of this *Sunday Tribune* ad were invited to "drive out today" and take a look at Westwood's prime location and quality homes in the "fine established community of Addison," where luxury countryside living, with churches, schools, shopping and recreation facilities close by, could be found.

Branch Pickup Service to Resume in April


The Village of Addison offers seasonal branch pickup service to residents from April through October. Branch pickup dates are determined by the area of town in which one resides.

Branches should be out on the parkway the **Sunday before their scheduled pickup**. Village crews will pass down the street only once during each week. Only one collection will be made per area per month.

The requirements are as follows:

- ☑ Branches should be on the parkway, **not** the street, stacked in one direction with the thicker end facing the street. Please do **not** cross stack branches.
- ☑ Branches should be limited to eight feet in length and eight inches in diameter.
- ☑ Limbs larger than eight inches in diameter should be cut into 16-inch log lengths and placed separately from the branches. Logs will be picked up Thursday or Friday of that week.
- ☑ Branches should **not** be tied with string, wire, etc.
- ☑ No root balls, lumber or landscape waste will be collected.
- ☑ **No contractor cuttings will be picked up by the Village.**

Solicitor Fees

The Village Board recently passed a change to the Village Code authorizing the Finance Department to collect a solicitor permit fee of \$50 at the time of application and a fee of \$25 for each person listed on the application as a solicitor.

For not-for-profit, charitable organizations a total fee of \$65 will apply and will include the application fee and the fee for all solicitors. No fee will be charged for persons engaged in the dissemination of religious or political messages.

The solicitor permit will expire after 90 days. A \$2 deposit is required for each solicitor ID tag, refundable upon return.

Update on technology plan

As anyone who keeps an eye on the world of technology knows, it is a field that encompasses rapid and constant change. Incorporating technology into schools and classrooms is a task that requires a great deal of planning, but the potential for increased student learning is almost limitless.

Over the past couple years, District 4 has invested in four major data handling systems: Versatrans, J School, Skyward and Follett. Versatrans is a transportation software system that has greatly increased the ability of school personnel to track students and redesign bus routes efficiently. JSchool is a financial software package which has been in use in District 4 for 1 1/2 years. New to the district for 2005-06 are the Skyward student information system used for attendance, grades, state reports and countless other functions and the Follett system, which includes an inventory and tracking capabilities for the school libraries. Administratively, these software systems have greatly increased the staff's ability to process all of the data that is required to keep school business functioning smoothly.

engage students in small group learning centers. Carts with speakers and a projector will also be provided for each classroom so that the tablets can also be utilized for large group instruction. Smaller than laptop computers, these machines can be carried easily by teachers between their classrooms and their homes.

Another aspect of the technology plan that will be implemented in fall of 2006, pending school board approval, is an interactive multimedia technology education program that will be used at Indian Trail Junior High School. For many years, the Industrial Technology department has been a place where students learned a wide variety of hands-on skills, such as woodworking. The new curriculum for this department will involve computer modules where 7th and 8th grade students will have the opportunity to experience even more diverse activities. Some of the modules that are being purchased include Space & Rocketry, CO2 Raceway Design Brief, Engineering & Stress Analysis and Web Development. The new curriculum will allow to students to learn and design projects on computers and then develop those projects in a lab setting.

More exciting to students and teachers, however, is the plan to implement wireless computers into every classroom next fall. Pilot teachers have tested models of wireless tablet computers in their classrooms. These machines are totally portable and can be used by students and teachers in every corner of the classroom. Another advantage of these machines is the ability to process information that is hand written on the computer screen with a stylus. Many of the pilot teachers have used the tablets to

The mild winter has provided great construction conditions for our classroom additions at Indian Trail Junior High School and Lincoln Elementary School. Construction is progressing on schedule. Additionally, we are packing up as many classroom items as we can now at Lincoln, Lake Park, Wesley and Stone Schools in preparation for the total inside renovations of these buildings this summer. We will be on a very tight construction schedule for school to open September 5, 2006.

I am excited that Addison District 4 will soon establish an Educational Foundation for Excellence. Our educational foundation will provide extra funding for students and staff activities. The Foundation will be formed and operating by this spring. The Foundation will be a new and exciting asset to our school district and community.

Since technology is a critical component to assist in the teaching and learning process, Addison 4 has been piloting new computers for students and staff. A recommendation for the purchase of new district computers for next school year has been made to the school board. Additionally, the junior high school is revising the Industrial Arts curriculum with Industrial Technology experiences in computerized drafting, engineering, robotics, plastics, media, and other technology based areas. These computer technology improvements will be an exciting new experience for students and staff.



from the Board of Trustees...

The Library will have a new building in 2008! Construction will begin in 2007. There are many decisions to make as the plans for this building are formalized.

Rather than asking the voters to approve a referendum that would increase property taxes, the Village will provide financing through the local sales tax which was used to construct Village Hall. As they retire their bond debt from that project, the Village will have \$11 million available through this sales tax to help the Library. The Library will contribute an additional \$2 million dollars which will come from the Library's capital improvement fund.

Dr. Fred Schlipf, a professional building consultant, guided the Board and staff in an analysis of the current space and formulated a building plan. The result of the process is a 163-page written building program which can be found on our Website (www.addisonlibrary.org). Using the building program as a guide, the architectural firm of Burnidge Cassell & Associates, Inc., has been hired to do a feasibility study including a thorough engineering review of the existing property. They will use this information to design the new building. Some of the things on our wish list for the new library are a drive-up book drop, small study rooms, a larger meeting room with a direct exit from the building, larger spaces for adult and children's services.

By the time you read this, we will know much more about the design of the building and its location, construction dates, etc. Current information is on our Website. Library staff will happily answer as many of your questions as they can.





If your CO alarm sounds:



Know the difference between the sound of your smoke detector and CO detector.

If it is a battery-powered intermittent alarm, check the battery.

If it is a steady alarm or you are unable to determine the source, evacuate the home

Report the CO alarm warning by calling 911.

Do not re-enter the home until the fire department says it is OK.



Make Sure Kids Can Escape

If there was a fire in your home tonight, could your kids escape? Every parent needs to seriously consider this question as it could literally mean the difference between life and death. In a July 2005 report issued by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), children under the age of 5 were found to be 74% more likely to die in a home fire than the general population. Most of these deaths occur at night while the family is sleeping and most deaths are due to smoke inhalation.

While having working smoke detectors can cut the risk of dying in a home fire by 50%, it is also essential for the family to know how to escape if the smoke detector should alarm. Children need to know ahead of time what to do and where to go in case of a fire. Parents need to assure that not only do their kid know what to do, but also that they are physically able to escape.

Parents should take time to assess their home and make sure that there are no physical barriers to escape routes. Things to consider include:

Windows

If you or your child cannot escape using normal exits, can the bedroom windows be use? Can children open them easily and climb outside? If the bedrooms are on an upper floor, are escape ladders available?

Doors

Can your doors be easily opened in low visibility conditions? What type of locks do you have? Can they be easily opened from the inside without the use of a key? Do any of your doors stick, making opening difficult for small children?

Clutter


Are there large pieces of furniture or clutter that could make escape routes difficult to use in darkness or smoky conditions? It is surprising how disoriented people can become in fire conditions. In an emergency, clutter can make normal exit routes seem like a maze.

Disabilities

Does anyone in your home, child or adult, have a disability that would make an emergency escape more difficult? Plans should be made to address these difficulties.




