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

From the Mayor's Desk ...



In February, the DuPage Water Commission approved a 20-cent reduction in its wholesale water rate – the rate it charges municipalities.

While it is up to each municipality whether to reduce their own rates, I am proud to say that Addison will.

This is the second time since 2005 that the Water Commission has lowered its rates by 20 cents, and both times, Addison has decided to pass that savings along to the community.

In the fiscal year beginning May 1, water rates had previously been scheduled to increase 26 cents per 1,000 gallons. Instead, they will increase by just 6 cents.

In addition, a portion of the Water Commission's fund balance, which was deemed excessive, will also be refunded to the municipalities.

Addison's portion of this is approximately \$1.95 million. This money is earmarked for water main replacement. A number of areas in the Village have aging water mains that experience frequent breaks. This money will help us accelerate our replacement program without dipping into other funds or raising water rates.

As a member of the Water Commission Board, I am proud that this agency was fiscally responsible in approving the reduction.

I am also proud that our Village Board, when it passes the new fiscal budget, will be equally responsible to our residents.

Fiscal Year Begins With New Projects

Strategic Plan Guides Objectives for 2007-08

On May 1, a new fiscal year begins for the Village. The Budget, expected to be approved in April, is the culmination of months of work on the part of the Village Board and Staff.

This work began last year, with the creation and adoption of a new Strategic Plan, outlining long-term goals through 2012. This plan was created not just by the board and staff, but by members of the community at large.

Much of the Village's long-term goals revolve around the planned Town Center, encompassing Lake Street and Addison Road and the surrounding area.

The first construction project in the Town Center will be the new library building, which will break ground in April. The Village issued bonds to cover nearly \$13 million of the \$15 million project, which will be backed by sales tax revenue. The Library will be responsible for the remaining cost.

As that construction project begins this year, another significant project is expected to finish. The Village will spend \$688,000 for the completion of the Henry J. Hyde Neighborhood Resource Center in the Michael Lane neighborhood. Former Congressman Hyde was instrumental in obtaining a federal grant for \$607,000, making the center possible.

Is Your Child Properly Secured?



Police Beat

Child Passenger Safety Week recently passed in Illinois, but keeping your child secure while driving is something you should be aware of year-

round.

According to State Law, any child under the age of 8 years old has to be secured in a child restraint system which is appropriate for his or her age, height, and weight. Such systems include infant seats, forward facing seats or convertible seats, and booster seats.

While selecting the proper seat for your child may seem confusing, on the base of each seat you can read the manufactures height and weight requirements, as well as the instructions to properly secure the seat. You have to obey the guidelines of the height, weight, and age for that specific seat.

Here are some other guidelines to keep in mind:

Rear Facing Infant Seat

- Infants less than 1 year old and 20 pounds or less
- Child should be reclined to 45 degrees

Forward Facing

- Child 1 year old and at least 20 pounds
- Make sure child is within manufactures guidelines for weight, age, and height
- Typical recommendations for these seats are between 1 and 4 years old and 20 to 40 pounds

Booster Seat

- Child 4 years old and a weight of 40 pounds
- Shoulder strap should rest on the shoulder and not touch the neck
- Lap belt should rest low, across the lap/upper thigh area and not across the stomach
- Child is recommended to be in booster seat until at least 8 years old and 4' 9" tall

Seat Belt Usage

- After age 8
- Child sits with lower back against lower back of seat with legs on floor, shoulder strap across shoulder and lap crossing lap.

Branch Pickup Service to Resume in April


The Village of Addison offers seasonal branch pickup service to residents from April through October. Branch pickup dates are determined by the area of town in which one resides.

Branches should be out on the parkway the **Sunday before their scheduled pickup**. Village crews will pass down the street only once during each week. Only one collection will be made per area per month.

The requirements are as follows:

- ☑ Branches should be on the parkway, **not** the street, stacked in one direction with the thicker end facing the street. **Please do not cross stack branches.**
- ☑ Branches should be limited to eight feet in length and eight inches in diameter.
- ☑ Limbs larger than eight inches in diameter should be cut into 16-inch log lengths and placed separately from the branches. Logs will be picked up Thursday or Friday of that week.
- ☑ Branches should **not** be tied with string, wire, etc.
- ☑ Branch piles containing root balls, lumber, metal, glass, yard waste or other debris, as well as large branch mounds that have been multi-directionally cross stacked **will not be picked up.**
- ☑ **No contractor cuttings will be picked up by the Village.**

Vision 4, Goal 1: Undertake Annexation and Development of Unincorporated Areas

The Village of Addison's Community Development Department actively pursues commercial annexations, especially along our community's main commercial corridor, Lake Street.

This allows for uniform zoning and other regulations, as well as the ability regulate usage and appearance.

Earlier this year the Village Board approved several properties along Lake Street, near 8th Avenue. This was prompted by residents' concerns of potential undesirable uses.

Over the next several years, the Village hopes to annex the remainder of the commercial property along Lake Street.

In each issue of Spotlight on Addison, watch for updates the Village's Strategic Plan for 2007-2012. The Strategic Plan was adopted by the Village Board in December 2006.

A Bit of Addison History

The following memoirs are those of Mary Oehman Rotermund, who came to America in 1843 and settled in Addison.

"It was May 19, 1843 when my parents, three brothers, two sisters and I left our home in Kirchweiler, Germany to seek a new home in the United States. We decided to take our own provisions for the voyage, for we heard that the food served on board ship was not good and would be more expensive than furnishing our own. These provisions included eight bags of homemade zwieback, each bag containing about five bushels of the crisp bread, three hams, a bushel of rice, a keg of vinegar, potatoes, flour, eggs, butter and coffee.

"We sailed from Havre-de-Grace, France on a three-masted sailboat, and reached New York after a voyage of 35 often stormy days. From New York we traveled to Buffalo and from there to Chicago by steamer. We remained with friends on the north side for three weeks, while my father looked for a farm outside the city. He found a farm in Dunklee's Grove, now Addison, of about 210 acres. We moved on August 15 into our two-room house, but we were still obliged to go to Chicago for our provisions and to attend church because there was only one Catholic Church in Chicago, St. Mary's.

"There were no roads through the prairie. Often it was impossible to drive a wagon, so we had to walk. We would leave home on Saturday morning, arrive in Chicago and buy our provisions. We stayed with friends overnight, attended mass at St. Mary's in the morning and vespers in the afternoon, then walked the 18 miles home carrying our provisions. Later a plank road was built that stretched from north of Addison to Chicago.

"In order to learn English, I went to Chicago to work. My first job was with Mr. Peacock, the jeweler, located on State and Adams Streets. I earned one dollar a week; later I was paid \$1.50. I was very lonesome because there was no one there who spoke German. One of my acquaintances got a job for me at the Sherman House, where there were more German girls employed. There I received two dollars a week. After being there a time I was seized with homesickness, and nothing could have kept me from leaving Chicago that night."

Ridge subdivisions at cost of \$315,000.

More than \$2.1 million has been budgeted for Street Resurfacing, including \$440,000 in TIF money to pay for streets in the Michael Lane area.

In addition, streets in the Green Meadows, Highview, Lake Manor, Pioneer Square, Villa Lorraine, Home Addition and Oak Mill subdivisions and in the Village's Industrial Park, will receive work this year.

The industrial resurfacing projects are funded through a portion of the Village's telecommunications tax, while the remainder is through redevelopment funds.

Assessing customer needs is another goal, much of this falling under the Community Relations Department. In the coming year, all of Addison Community Television's 15-year old studio cameras are expected to be replaced with digital equipment.

In addition, funds have been budgeted to provide web streaming for Village programming, allowing for local access programming to be available via a broadband internet connection. For several years, the Village Board has been concerned that subscribers to satellite dish services could not access the Village's local cable TV channel. With the implementation of this service, anyone will be able to view meetings and other programs via the internet.

Sidewalk Repair

The Village of Addison is taking requests for the 2007 Cost Sharing Sidewalk Replacement Program. Most of the work scheduled for this year is located south of Army Trail Boulevard to Fullerton Avenue and west of Mill Road to Addison Road.

Due to limited resources, this is on a “first come, first served” basis. Resident’s share for a 5'x 5' sidewalk square is approximately \$50. Please respond by May 1, 2007.



Landscape Waste

The Village of Addison provides landscape waste pickup each year, April through November. Grass and other landscape waste should be kept separate from other trash, and will be removed on normal garbage pickup days by Allied Waste.

Residents may fill 30-33 gallon trash containers with landscape waste, provided they obtain two landscape waste stickers at Village Hall and affix them to the container. There is no charge for the decals, which are necessary to make the landscape waste distinguishable and visible to the collectors.

Otherwise, residents may purchase paper biodegradable bags at area retailers including: Jewel/Osco and Len’s Ace Hardware. Stickers are not necessary when utilizing the paper bag system.



Did You Know?

Village ordinance (Sec. 10-25 of Chap. 10) requires a permit for any garage, yard, attic or basement sale, available at no charge from the Village Hall Reception Desk.

Permits are issued only to the property owner of the premises where the sale is to be held, two times annually for a period of not more than three days, plus one additional moving sale. Hours are restricted to 8 a.m. to dusk.

All signs must be located on private property, have the house numbers and dates on them, and must be removed within three hours of the conclusion of the sale. Posting of signs on parkways, public rights-of-way or on poles is illegal.

Foundation celebrates first year

Early in 2006 a group of dedicated volunteers began making plans to form an educational foundation that would serve to increase opportunities available to students in District 4. The volunteers discussed goals, plans and the structural procedures that would be required to fulfill those plans and goals. A great deal has been accomplished since those early meetings.

The Addison School District 4 Education Foundation for Excellence was established, bylaws were developed and a board of directors composed of thirteen community members was recruited. The directors meet on a monthly basis to plan and implement projects that help accomplish their goal of enhancing the educational experiences of District 4 students.

Last May, the Foundation sponsored a Cinco de Mayo Family Festival to introduce the Foundation to the community. The Foundation also raised funds through participation in the 2006 Mayor's Ball and through the solicitation of donations from businesses and individuals. Another project designed to raise funds and awareness of the Foundation is the commemorative brick paver walkway which will be installed at the southeast entrance to Indian Trail this spring.



Last year's Cinco de Mayo Family Festival included a day of games, food and music for Addison families to enjoy.

The 'payoff' for these efforts is coming now as the Foundation is awarding its first series of mini-grants to teachers who applied for funding of special projects in February. The Foundation reviewed 17 applications and awarded grants in amounts up to \$500 each. Staff members submitted applications for special projects addressing a wide range of subject areas-- fitness, art, literacy, math, science, math.

Most projects would be implemented in the classroom to supplement the curriculum, while others are geared toward extracurricular activities. One grant, which was awarded early due to the time constraints of the program, brought representatives from Morton Arboretum's Winter Outreach program into the 2nd grade classrooms at Army Trail to conduct a hands-on Plant Investigation learning experience.

The grant winners will be announced to the public at this year's Community Fun Fair on Cinco de Mayo, giving community members the opportunity to hear about the learning opportunities that are being provided with the Foundation's assistance. All Addison area families are invited to attend the Fun Fair, which will be held on Saturday, May 5 from 3-8:00pm at Indian Trail Junior High School.

On a more cheerful note, we did receive our ISAT (State Test) scores back from the State and all eight of our schools did well and surpassed the threshold to make adequate yearly progress (AYP). I am excited about traveling to Triggiano, Italy (sister city of Addison) with ten junior high students over spring break. Additionally, Mayor Hartwig and his wife will be traveling with us. It will be an exciting adventure for our students and all the chaperones.

Finally, as you know, the School Board election is April 17 and District 4 has four incumbents running unopposed for the school board. These board members--Joe Lullo, Kelly Ricamoto, Sergio Ruffolo, and Dave Williams--are outstanding individuals and the Addison community is fortunate to have their interest and energy focused on Addison District 4. I also wish the building referendum initiative on the April 17 ballot for District 88 much success. Addison Trail High School needs to be renovated so District 4 students can experience an improved facility for many decades to come.

***Name, address and telephone number of your child's physician, telephone numbers of two people who may be called in an emergency**

***Registration fee of \$45.**

Please bring originals AND photocopies of child's birth certificate and proofs of residency when registering. If a child will be picked up from or delivered to a babysitter's house, it is also important to know the babysitter's exact address. This information will be used to create bus stops.



Weather watches and warnings -

Watch- Severe weather is possible. Remain alert for approaching storms and prepare to seek shelter.

Warning- A severe storm or tornado has been sighted by spotters or is indicated by radar. Take immediate shelter.

NOAA Weather Radio

Did you know that you can purchase a weather alert radio? This radio is designed to make an alarm sound and notify you of severe weather in the area. When a watch or warning is made for our area, you will be notified 24 hours a day. These radios can be purchase at many local stores and on the internet.

Severe Weather Ahead - Are You Ready?


Spring and summer bring the return of warm weather, flowers and so many other enjoyable things. Unfortunately spring and summer are when we are most likely to have severe storms. Severe storms can bring lightning, hail, strong winds, and even tornados.

Each year 300 people are injured and over 80 killed by thunderstorms. Tornados are responsible for 70 deaths and 1500 injuries. While we can't stop the storms, we can take steps to make ourselves safer during severe weather.



Knowing some basic facts and what to do are your best defense in severe weather. Let's start with thunderstorms. When a storm is approaching, you need to take shelter. Many people think it is safe outside until the rain starts. Actually, lightning can strike up to 10 miles away from rainfall. Experts recommend you follow the 30/30 rule. When you see lightning, start counting. If you can't count to 30 before you hear the thunder, it is time seek shelter. The second part of the 30/30 rule is to stay inside for 30 minutes after the last clap of thunder. While inside you should stay away from windows and avoid using water or electrical appliances. A cordless phone is safer than a regular corded phone. Lightning can travel up the phone cord and shock you.

Tornados are devastating and unpredictable. The average forward ground speed of a tornado is 30 mph, but the speed can reach 70 mph or more. The tornado's movement can change at anytime in any direction. A tornado can occur anytime of the day, but the most common time is between 3 PM and 9 PM. If a severe storm is approaching, or you see any of the following signs, take cover. Signs of a possible tornado include dark, often green sky, large hail, clouds that are large and low lying, rotating clouds or a loud roar. If you see any of these signs seek shelter. Turn on your TV or radio for weather warnings.



If a warning is issued, the sirens sound or you see signs of a tornado take cover immediately. Go to the basement. If the building has no basement, go to an interior room away from windows and exterior walls. Do not open your windows. Stay sheltered until the severe weather has passed and the all clear has been given.
