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
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

From the Mayor's Desk ...



The new library building is nearing completion, and one of the most "frequently asked questions" I receive is, "What's going to happen to the old one?"

The Village has a long history of working closely with the other taxing bodies to share resources to ensure that all tax money is spent

wisely. So we looked into who in our community could benefit from use of this village-owned building. We received proposals from Addison Center for the Arts, and DuPage High School District 88.

In March, an intergovernmental agreement was approved giving District 88 a 99-year lease on the building at no cost to them, other than maintenance of the building. By doing this, they avoided a \$3 million addition to Willowbrook High School. Their office will also be a great addition to the Town Center.

What's more, Addison Center for the Arts will benefit as well. The Village will contribute to District 88's "build out" of the old Library. In return, ACA will have priority use of space at Addison Trail High School, including office space, storage, display area, and use of the remodeled Little Theater. It will be maintained by District 88, and will remain their property.

State Representative Dennis Reboletti has obtained \$100,000 in State funds to help remodel the Theatre. ACA will conduct a private fundraiser to come up with the remaining funds.

It is a unique public/private partnership, giving students and the public a unique visual and performing arts facility.

MFT Resurfacing Program



The Village prepares plans annually to resurface streets based on Motor Fuel Tax funds available.

For 2008, nearly \$1.4 million will be spent to resurface 2.8 miles of residential streets.

The project includes resurfacing, minor curb and gutter replacements, driveway restoration, etc.

These will include:

- **Farmwood North subdivision** – 9th Ave., Trinity Drive, Wood Ave., and Joseph Lane;
- **Westridge subdivision** – Sable Drive, Farmwood Drive, Westridge Place and Aspen Way;
- **Medinah Highlands subdivision** – Rosebud Lane, Lilac Lane and Ashley Lane;
- **Pioneer Square subdivision** – Cherry Hill Drive.

In addition to these residential streets, approximately .7 miles of industrial streets will be resurfaced.

These are funded through the Village’s telecommunications tax.

These include:

- **Westgate Drive** – Interstate Road to Fay Ave.
- **Factory Road** – Addison Road to Westwood Ave.

This program was scheduled to begin in early spring, weather permitting.

Construction will last for approximately three months.

Violators Beware – Police Traffic Unit is Watching



Police Beat

What’s the speed limit?

How fast am I going?

The Addison Police Department is utilizing new equipment and unique ideas to make the roads safer throughout Addison.

Police Officers are taking a proactive stance in traffic enforcement and safety. A number of directed patrols utilize unmarked police vehicle, plain clothes officers, hand-held LIDAR detectors, along with many other ideas. The police department’s focus is in areas of major crash intersections, school zones and high traffic volume areas.



LIDAR is a tool Officers use to measure a target vehicle’s speed using a form of energy called laser. LIDAR is operated with pinpoint accuracy in selecting specific target vehicles on a crowded roadway.

The Police Department’s Traffic Unit is constantly revising its methods in catching scofflaws, including having plain clothes officers operate hand-held LIDAR detectors.

The Village of Addison is continuously growing, and with the growth comes more motor vehicles on the roadway. Some main areas of focus that Officers will focus on will be speeding (including school zones), seat belt violations, truck safety, passing stopped school buses and driving under the influence.

The Traffic Unit continues to have directed patrols with emphasis in DUI enforcement around weekends and holidays to keep our roadways safe and free from impaired drivers.

The goal of our Traffic Unit is to ensure the safety and well being of citizens throughout the Village of Addison, to educate and promote traffic safety, and to deter crime through increased presence and visibility in the community.

The Latest Buzz on Bugs: Addison's Insect Concerns

Emerald Ash Borer

The Emerald Ash Borer has made its way into Illinois, and this devastating insect would like to hitchhike a ride, hiding in firewood or nursery stock that you bring back from infested areas.

It is a small, metallic-green beetle native to Asia, whose larvae burrow into the bark of ash trees, causing the trees to starve and eventually die. When the beetle emerges, it makes a very small BB-size D-shaped hole in the bark. No other insect creates the BB-size D-shaped holes on ashes.

While the beetle does not pose any direct risk to public health, it does threaten the tree population. It is responsible for the death of more than 22 million ash trees to date.

Although the Emerald Ash Borer has yet to be sighted in Addison, it has been found as near as Carol Stream and Glendale Heights. This is a cause for great concern, since approximately 1 out of every 5 parkway trees in Addison are ash.

It is believed that it is primarily spread by people transporting wood from infested areas. The USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service and the Canadian Food Inspection Agency have imposed quarantines. The quarantines restrict movement of ash logs, lumber, firewood, and nursery stock.

Planting an ash tree on your property that came from a nursery in one of these quarantined locations could introduce the EAB to Addison as well.

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Vision 4, Goal 1: A Substantial Share Of The Unincorporated Area Is Within Village Limits and Aligns With The Quality Of Our Community

For the past few years, the Village has actively pursued annexation of unincorporated commercial properties along Lake Street, seeking to improve the appearance of these properties.

In total, eight properties were offered agreements to annex. Most of these are located between Mill Road and 9th Avenue.

While each agreement was written for the individual type of business and use, all agreements contained incentives in exchange for annexation. Such incentives included time limits to bring their businesses into compliance with Village zoning and appearance standards and waiver some

administrative fees. In all cases, each business did annex and connect to the Village's water and/or sewer system.

With a few properties, instant code compliance was gained through the voluntary efforts of the business owners. Signs became code complaint, gravel parking was eliminated, and landscaping was added.

Annexing these businesses to increases the property tax base as well as provides additional revenue in terms of sales taxes and water and sewer fees.

Any improvements to these properties will now meet the Village's Zoning Ordinance and Building Codes, instead of the sometimes less restrictive County Codes. This gives the Village control over the types of businesses that operate and eliminates the less desirable uses that existed under

DuPage County Zoning.

The Lake Street atmosphere has vastly improved. Besides the street reconstruction project, a total of six highway-type billboards were removed.

By the end of this year, the billboard sign near Sunmist Restaurant is to be removed.

Six businesses along Lake Street took advantage of the Village's Facade Improvement Program.

The old Mobile/Texaco gas station at the southwest corner of Lake Street and Rohlwing was demolished.

However, not all businesses are annexed and not all billboards are removed. The Village will continue to negotiate with additional businesses to bring them into the Village and make strong efforts to eliminate Lake Street of the billboard signs.

If camping in infested or quarantined areas, leave unused firewood at that site. If buying firewood for home, buy locally and be sure of its source.

Gypsy Moth

The Gypsy Moth has made its home in the northeastern-most section of Addison, and was discovered when the population was so great that this wooded area looked like January in July. During the summer of 2004, the Gypsy Moth caterpillars covered the trunks of trees, swarmed on the sides of houses, and blanketed the ground with excrement – all the makings of a great horror movie.

The Village, Addison Township, Addison Park District, and the Illinois Department of Agriculture sponsored control treatments for the affected areas.

No treatments have been prescribed for this year as the moth population appears to have been knocked down to levels that show little signs of injury to the landscape. Monitoring will continue and treatment will resume as moth populations elevate.

The Gypsy Moth does its damage as a caterpillar.

They grow from 1/16-inch long at hatching to about 2 inches long. One caterpillar can eat leaves covering more than one square yard and is the number one defoliating insect pest in the United States.

The gypsy moth is usually spread to new areas by hitchhiking on outdoor articles such as camping equipment, vehicles, and portable structures as well as through the movement of landscape debris.

Although all life stages of the insect can hitchhike, it is usually the tan-colored, fuzzy egg mass that is transported. Each egg mass can contain as many as 1,000 eggs! Gypsy Moths may lay eggs on your camper, vehicle or other outdoor equipment after camping in, or moving from, infested areas.

You may find egg masses on your tree, house, and outdoor furniture in the infested areas.

Gypsy moth caterpillars are easy to identify, because they possess characteristics not found on other leaf-feeding caterpillars. They have five pairs of blue dots followed by six pairs of red dots lining the back. In addition, they are dark-colored and covered with hairs.

Gypsy Moths do not spread far on their own, since the white colored female moths cannot fly.

A Bit of Addison History



In the last issue of *Spotlight on Addison*, this column focused on the Mirabella Peony Farm that was mentioned in an article about Addison in the 1930 issue of *The Greater Chicago Magazine*. In this same magazine, Addison's "two crack baseball teams," the St. Paul team and the Aces are mentioned.

The St. Paul team was a church league, tied for second place that year, and described as seniors playing "high class amateur baseball." The Aces were juniors, with a 14-6 record, as of the writing of the article. Both teams played the teams of neighboring towns and had new uniforms and "the best equipment obtainable." Most team members were around 18 years of age, and are described as doing good work, playing for the sportsmanship alone, and drawing big crowds of home folks and strangers, who supported them financially and with enthusiastic approval.

Mulch Available

The Village of Addison provides residents with free truckload deliveries of woodchip mulch (3 cubic yards or greater).

To inquire about or arrange for the free delivery, call Public Works at: (630) 620-2020.

For those who wish to receive less than 3 cubic yards of mulch, a wood chip supply for residents to access at their own convenience is located at the southwest corner of the intersection at Vista and Winthrop Avenues.

Wood chips applied around the base of plants provide a beneficial mulch which retains the moisture in the soil, holds down aggressive weed growth, returns nutrients to the soil, prevents lawn mowers from damaging plants and is visually attractive.

Mulch should not be mounded up against the base of trees, as this actually creates an environment that can lead to trunk decay and tree decline.

Resource Center Serves Students

The Henry J. Hyde Neighborhood Resource Center is a busy place after school each day. Located at 199 W. Michael Lane, the new facility was completed last summer and is a place where up to 85 students spend their afternoons.

The after school program begins at 3:30 p.m. with students working on homework. The Center does not provide tutoring, but adult volunteers are with the students, encouraging them to work on their school projects and complete their daily work. The center has a computer room with 13 computers that are available for students who need to conduct research.

Once their homework is completed, students have the opportunity to play games, and access kid-safe websites on the computers. They participate in Scouting programs that are tailored for resource centers, art classes, movie days and birthday celebrations. Students also receive a full meal provided by Northern Illinois Food Bank thru the federal food program each day.

Kiki DeLuna, the director of the Resource Center, and Angie Vega, who has worked in the center since it was located in an apartment building on Michael Lane, work with volunteers to give students a safe and welcoming environment each day. As a Police Department-operated program, the center is carefully monitored --a background check is required of all adults who are in the center when the children are present. Volunteers include members of the S.A.L.T. (Seniors and Law Enforcement Together) program, teachers from the Peoples Resource Center and Lincoln School, high school students and students from College of DuPage.

The center can accommodate 85 children in the after school program. Parents have the opportunity to register their children in the program at the beginning of the school year. While the majority of students in the program attend Lincoln School due to the Center's location in the Lincoln neighborhood, the Center is a resource for the entire Addison community. Currently there are students from Army Trail, Fullerton, Lincoln, and Indian Trail participating in the after school program.

The Center also offers spring, summer and winter camps that correspond with school breaks. For specific dates and registration information, parents can call or visit the Center.

DeLuna reports that she is very impressed by the level of service and generosity that she has seen from the community. Volunteers, donors, and many outside agencies contribute to provide experiences that the students enjoy. "I'm also incredibly proud of our kids," said DeLuna. "They have such warmth, intelligence and thirst for knowledge! We work to empower them and encourage them to do their best."

Calling all future kindergarteners!

THREE of the following (which show the proper address): Drivers license, vehicle registration, public aid card, home/apartment insurance papers, gas, electric, water, phone, cable or credit card bill OR four pieces of forwarded mail (four pieces of forwarded mail count as ONE proof of residency);

***Name, address and telephone number of your child's physician, telephone numbers of two people who may be called in an emergency.**

***Registration fee of \$45.**

Please bring originals AND photocopies of child's birth certificate and proofs of residency when registering. If a child will be picked up from or delivered to a babysitter's house, it is also important to know the babysitter's exact address. This information will be used to create bus stops.

Building The Future in District 88: *Construction to Begin This Summer!*

The dirt and dust of construction at DuPage High School District 88 will be **underway this summer**. Architectural design and engineering to improve the learning environment of Addison Trail and Willowbrook High Schools began **after receiving 58% voter approval** in the April 17, 2007 election.

Published on the District 88 website at www.dupage88.net, the most current designs released show a "schematic snapshot" and the magnitude of work involved at each building. Renovations will **focus on the following priorities** as presented during the referendum:

- ◆ Technology enhancements to classrooms and the schools
- ◆ Additional/enhanced science labs
- ◆ Adding classroom & instructional space
- ◆ Expanded music and art facilities
- ◆ Creating new spaces for team learning opportunities
- ◆ Student-centered cafeterias, commons and guidance areas
- ◆ Extensive infrastructure (electrical and plumbing) upgrades
- ◆ Improved handicap accessibility
- ◆ Air quality and air-conditioning for a healthier learning environment
- ◆ Site improvements to address traffic flow and parking needs
- ◆ Expanding the capacity of physical education and athletic facilities to meet the demands of students and the community

Commenting on this important project to significantly shape the futures for the schools and communities, Superintendent Steve Humphrey, stated, "The modernization of our high schools is **vital to improve student learning**. District 88 is grateful for the tremendous community support and partnerships that have contributed to launching the next phase of Building The Future which is **on schedule to be completed in Fall 2010**."

The Board of Education and administration continue to finalize decisions that include all of the identified priorities and **remain within the budget of \$115.3 million pledged to taxpayers**. Early bid packages will be released in April for construction to begin in June 2008. "Swing space" will be created at both buildings to move students from existing spaces to allow for year-round construction.

Summer school programs will be hosted off campus in the feeder school districts and at DeVry University to allow for significant renovations including technology infrastructure to begin. When students return in the fall, the buildings will have **wireless capabilities** making learning both future-oriented and relevant.



News About the Building

When will the current building
close?

At the time this copy was written, the dates for moving into the new location are pending. If the weather and all the trades people working on the building follow the schedule the architect and construction manager have in place, we should be moving into the new library early in June, 2008. Of course, if winter continues to unfold the way it has in January and February, the time table may be altered.

Shortly after the occupancy permit is issued by the Village inspectors, the library will close for about four weeks to move and prepare for the new space for you to use.

There are many new and wonderful things about the new library, but each comes with a learning curve, and we want staff to be ready to show you all we have to offer the day we open our new doors.

What other libraries can you use?

Even though you will not be able to use the Addison Public Library, you can use your library card to check out materials from libraries in the surrounding communities.

If you plan to use your card at other libraries, make sure your card has not expired and that you have no outstanding fines and no long-overdue items before the library closes. Cards that expire in May, June, or July 2008 must be renewed before the Library closes.

Where is the money coming from?

Building the new library has not and will not raise your real estate taxes. The money for the building comes from an existing ¼% sales tax. This means that, for every \$100 someone spends in Addison, 25¢ is raised to pay the new building bonds.

What will happen to this building?

School District 88 will rent the current building from the Village of Addison for their administrative offices. The district also plans to have some special education classes in this building. Renovations will begin shortly after the library moves to the new site.

Why does some of the glass seem so green?

The spandrel or green glass was always intended to have some contrast with the other glass; the stripes that it makes will form a unifying element that ties together the corners of the interior glass "cube" as it pokes through the masonry wall. The regular glass will be much brighter and visually closer to the spandrel glass as the interior is completed. The stripes will still be visible but not as strongly.

Preview of the New Children's Library

Early in June we should be moving into our new library. The Children's Library will be on the first floor and serve children from birth through 5th grade and their parents and teachers. Young people in 6th grade and up will have their own teen area on the second floor.

Some of the features of our new library will make our library an exciting destination. **Play/Early Literacy Area**

Narrative skills, print motivation, vocabulary, phonological awareness, letter knowledge, and print awareness are the six pre-reading skills important for children in learning to read.

Together with our book collection, our Play/Literacy Area will help children with their pre-reading skills and their fine motor skills. This area will have a train table, doll house, play kitchen, toys, games, puzzles, and an activity table with a new theme each month.

Parent/Teacher Resource Room

Also located in the Children's Library will be a resource room for parents and teachers to use. A die cutting machine with a selection of dies, a laminator, and a

paper trimmer are some of the equipment that can be used to prepare materials, crafts, etc., for children.

Seating and Games for Students

Elementary age children will have a seating area with booth seating, lounge chairs, and a game table. A selection of board games for preschool children through 5th grade students will be available for use in the library.

Computers

Twelve computers will be available for children through 5th grade. Computers will offer Microsoft Office, Live Homework Help, Tumblebooks, electronic homework resources, and games. Children may use these computers for a total of one hour a day.

A walk up Internet station will give parents with children in the department an opportunity to check email, etc., for 15 minutes. WiFi will also be available in the Children's Library for those who bring

their laptops to the library.

Story Hour and Craft Rooms:

We will have two programming rooms in the Children's Library. The smaller room will be used for small story hour groups. The larger room will be used

for larger programs, including story times, specials, and drop-in programs.

Study Rooms

When the small story hour room is not being used for programs, small groups may use the room for group study. Study rooms will also be available in Adult Services for group study.

Other Features

Other features of the Children's Library include an aquarium, the handprint wall, the special feature, two family restrooms, a drinking fountain, stroller parking, black and white and color printing, black and white photocopier, and display cases to showcase children's collections or hobbies.



The open frame will house the aquarium which will be located in the lobby just before you enter the Children's Library.

In the Library children under the age of 10 must be directly supervised at all times by a parent or approved caregiver aged 16 years or older.


