
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


Good financial news in District

Economic hard times have been in the headlines for months and it is sometimes difficult to keep from being discouraged by the financial downturn. The business office in District 4, however, has recently been a source of positive financial news.

At the February 19 Board of Education meeting, Wendy Flaherty of First Trust Portfolios presented proposals to refinance the District's construction Series 2006 bonds in order to take advantage of the lower interest rates that are currently available. The District will be able to pay off these bonds, in the amount of \$6,000,000, earlier than originally planned which will result in approximately \$600,000 in savings for taxpayers. The Board of Education approved the move in order to take advantage of a financial marketplace that is much more favorable than it was when the bonds were first issued.

In order to refinance, the District needed to go through a rating review with Standard and Poor to assess the District's credit rating. Before this review, the District held an AA rating, in a system where AAA is the highest rating given.

In their report dated April 24, Standard & Poor shared the following: "The standard long-term rating and Standard & Poor's underlying rating (SPUR) on DuPage County School District No. 4 (Addison), Ill.'s general obligation (GO) school bonds have been raised to 'AA+' from 'AA', reflecting the district's maintenance of very strong financial operations and good financial management. Other credit factors are the district's:

- Participation in the Chicago metropolitan area's deep and diverse economy,
- Above-average wealth and income levels, and
- Moderate overall debt burden with rapid amortization."

Assistant Superintendent for Business, Jon Hitcho, was pleased to share the information about the ratings upgrade with the staff and community. "As you know, the better your credit rating, the more money you save on interest, fees, etc when you go to borrow money. This bump to a AA+ rating will save the community at least \$28,000 in insurance costs for this bond refinancing alone. With the current trend of many institutions being downgraded, being upgraded at this time with our economy is quite an accomplishment."

Additionally, District 4 received the Certificate of Excellence in Financial Reporting from the Illinois Association of School Business Officials for the sixth year in a row. This recognition--being placed in the highest financial ranking by the state --reflects District 4's solid financial position.

Registration & fee information for 2008-2009

New students


Families who are NEW to Addison School District 4 can register their children for the 2008-2009 school on **Tuesday, July 15 from 4:00-8:00p.m. in the District Board Room, 222 N. Kennedy Drive** (enter door #15 on the north side of Indian Trail Junior High School).

Student fees are as follows:	Kindergarten	\$45.00
	Grades 1-5	\$60.00
	Grades 6-8	\$90.00

Fees cover consumable material such as work sheets and periodicals used by students. Student fees for grades 1-8 include a \$10 technology fee. Junior high students must purchase a gym locker lock (\$5.50) and a gysuit (\$20.00).

Paid busing is available for elementary students who live within .9 mile of their elementary school or for junior high students who live within 1.5 miles of Indian Trail. For parents who make a one-time payment, the fee is \$320. Those who choose a six-month installment plan will pay \$330.

Junior high students involved in athletics, band, orchestra or choir will also be required to pay a fee of \$40 to participate in these activities. 5th grade and orchestra students are required to pay a \$30 fee. The maximum family fee for music and athletics is equal to four activities.



Returning students

Registration for returning students was conducted in May. If you have not yet returned your child's registration forms to school, please do so now. All registrations submitted after May 31 will be assessed a \$25 late fee in addition to regular school fees.

School supply lists will be issued at the end of the school year with report cards. School calendars and PTA information will be mailed out later in summer.

In an effort to make fee payment and collection more convenient for parents, District 4 is again accepting MasterCard or VISA for credit card payment of fees--registration fees, bus payments, music and athletic participation fees and more. Parents can pay online at the District 4 Web Store at www.asd4.org.

If you have not yet registered your child for school for next fall and you need additional information, please call your school office or the District 4 Administrative Center at 630-458-2500.

Health/immunization requirements

Please note the following health and immunization requirements for the 2008-09 school year.

Students entering any of the District 4 preschool programs must have proof of a Hib vaccine and three doses of Hepatitis B vaccine.

All students new to the district, as well as those entering kindergarten and sixth grade, are required to present proof of a recent physical exam and current immunization record. **Children will be excluded from school for the 2008-09 school year until their immunizations and physical exams are current.**

Immunizations are available from the DuPage County Health Department for a reasonable fee for each vaccine. Families participating in Medicaid should bring their Medicaid cards. Parents must accompany their children to the clinic and must present their children's current immunization records in order to receive the vaccine.

Kindergarten, 2nd grade and 6th grade students are also required to have a dental examination. Proof of a dental exam must be on file in the school office by May 15, 2009.

Developing strategies for student success

The focus of education is to provide students opportunities to learn and succeed in an ever-changing world. In order to stay current with effective instructional practices, the educators in District 4 are continuously searching for ways to implement best practices that meet the needs of all students. This school year many initiatives are in place to provide the optimal environment to teaching and learning. The following are some important areas of focus on which District 4 is centering its improvement efforts so we can help all children achieve success.



Response to Intervention (RTI) - RTI is process that is designed to provide early and effective assistance to children who are having difficulty learning--students who are considered academically 'at-risk'. RTI seeks to prevent academic failure through early intervention, frequent progress measurement and increasingly intensive research-based instructional interventions for children who need support. District 4 has created a district-level problem solving committee that is working to implement consistency and effective practices to ensure that every child has access to research-based scientific interventions and best instructional practices.

Instructional Coaches - In order to help teachers with the extra demands required by the individualized student interventions, the Board of Education approved the hiring of three Instructional/RTI Coaches for the 2008-09 school year, with plans to have one for each school in the next 2 to 5 years. Beginning in fall, these coaches will be serving Ardmore, Indian Trail and Fullerton Schools on a full time basis and one coach will be serving both Stone and Wesley Schools. The instructional coaches will give teachers the support needed to implement various instructional programs and practices. Coaches will help teachers learn how best to use assessments, data collection and analysis, instructional strategies, individual student and group learning plans, and progress monitoring to promote student learning.

Benchmark Assessments -To determine **which** students need **what type** of support we need to have objective data to examine. MAP testing was implemented in 2007-08 for students in grades 3 and 6. Students took online tests which gave teachers immediate and very specific information about where each student's academic strengths and what they are ready to learn. The data allows teachers to design their instruction based on students' needs. Due to the success of this year's MAP implementation in grades 3 and 6, the district will adopt MAP for all students in grades 2 through 8 for the 2008-09 school year and beyond, as our benchmark assessments, to provide us with information about student achievement.

Health and Wellness Curriculum - The District 4 Science Committee and the Addison Police Department will work closely together this summer to design a new health and wellness program to replace the current D.A.R.E. and V.E.G.A. programs and enhance the current science curriculum. It is the district and police department's combined goal that we enrich and add to the community program experience, including all District 4 students in grades K-8. We hope to have this "revised" district-wide curriculum in place by the fall of 2008. The curriculum will focus on police officers being an active and integral part of the schools and presenting lessons on how to make good choices, living a healthy lifestyle with nutrition information, diet and exercise, understanding and coping with peer pressure, and learning about community service and involvement.



Library Media Centers - The Board has approved two new Library Media Specialist (LMS) positions for the district. These two positions will be part of new Library Media Centers that will be modeled at Lake Park and Lincoln next year. These LMS personnel will provide students with resources, both digital and print, to support learning in the classroom. In addition, they will also help support teachers with the integration of technology and use of the mobile computer labs. All schools will move towards this model in the coming years. It is the district's plan to create Library Media Centers that will become the centers of each school to promote information literacy and help our students achieve to the best of their ability.

New Library News

The Library's Board of Trustees selected Chicago artist **GREGORY GOVE** to create a special art feature for the new building. This feature will occupy a two-story space and can be seen from Army Trail Road. Greg has been creating mural art for public spaces throughout the United States for over 15 years.

The special feature will consist of 30 floating books with silhouetted shapes arising from the open pages to create the pop-up look. The books themselves will be lighted using fiber optic technology.

Greg is designing the concepts for each book and consulting with a fabricator to complete the finished work. Some sculptures will have a few pieces, while others will be more complex and contain many pieces.

The pop-ups are designed in several ways including a few like "DNA" and "Molecules" which appear three-dimensional. To avoid confusion about what each pop-up


New Library Logo

Closing Information

At press time, the dates for moving into the new location are still pending. The Board of Trustees will set the exact dates for closing and reopening at their May, 2008, meeting, so until then we are just guessing!

We will tentatively be moving early in June, 2008. Shortly after the occupancy permit is issued by the Village inspectors, the library will close for about four weeks to move and prepare the new space for you to use.

Even though you will not be able to use the Addison Public Library, you can use your library card to check out materials from libraries in the surrounding communities.

If you plan to use your card at other libraries, before the library closes make sure your card has not expired and that you have no outstanding fines and no long-overdue items.

Cards that expire in May, June, or July 2008 must be renewed before the Library closes.



Fire Up the Grill-Safely ***Maintain your equipment.***

Make sure your gas grill is in good condition. Use a soap solution to check for leaks and replace faulty hoses and fittings. Corroded burners or other components need to be replaced.

Watch out for kids. Keep small children a safe distance from the grill and never leave a grill unattended while cooking.

Use the right stuff. To light charcoal, use only charcoal lighter fluid or electric lighters designed for the job. Never use gasoline or other flammables.

Choose the right spot. Keep clear of building overhangs or tree branches that could catch fire.



FIREWORKS

As a parent, would you allow your child to play with a 350 degree oven? Of course not. However, did you know that a sparkler burns up to 1800 degrees Fahrenheit? That temperature is hot enough to melt many metals. Yet each 4th of July it is not unusual to see children playing with sparklers in their yards. According to Prevent Blindness America, over 10,00 people in the U.S. are treated in hospitals each year for injuries caused by fireworks.

FIREWORKS SHOULD BE LEFT TO PROFESSIONALS

On Independence Day in a typical year, more U.S. fires are reported than on any other day, and fireworks account for half of those fires, more than any other cause of fires.

- In 2004, fireworks caused an estimated **1,500** total structure fires and **600** vehicle fires reported to fire departments.
- These 2,200 fires resulted in an estimated **20** civilian injuries and **\$21 million** in direct property damage. There were no reported civilian deaths.

This “experiment” was done in recognition of Sunshine Week – led by the American Society of Newspaper Editors, it is intended to increase awareness about the public’s right to know.

Village Clerk Lucille Zucchero and our Administration staff are always happy to help anyone receive whatever information they are looking for.

Construction Begins, Detours Ahead

Construction has begun on two of Addison’s biggest road projects for 2008, and residents are encouraged to drive safely.

Fullerton East Project: Fullerton Avenue, from Addison Road to Villa Avenue, will be re-constructed. The road will be closed for eastbound traffic and only westbound traffic is allowed.

Detours will be posted within the construction area to guide motorists.

Depending on good weather and underground conflicts, it is anticipated that the pavement will be completed by December and the restoration will be done the following spring.

Grace Street Project: Resurfacing will take place, along with minor curb and gutter replacement, from Fullerton Avenue to just north of the railroad tracks.

In addition watermain replacement between Belden and Fullerton avenues will take place. During this, northbound traffic will be prohibited.

Detours will be posted within the construction area to guide motorists. Depending on good weather and underground conflicts, it is anticipated that the project will be completed in August or September.

Please adhere to any posted detours to make travel safe, and watch for construction updates on Addison Community Television, as well as the Village website, AddisonAdvantage.org.

A Bit of Addison History

In an article in the Aug. 19, 1987 *Chicago Tribune*, Durante Bros. Inc., a general contracting firm at 925 S. Westwood Ave., had built about 60 buildings in our industrial area since 1965. The company was owned by brothers George, Louis and Frank who found "a tremendous market" in Addison, and saw it as the right location for industrial development. According to George Durante, Addison "was one of the first western suburbs to accept industry."

Mary Yetsky, the village's planning and zoning administrator in 1987, described the area as including about 1,000 industrial and service-oriented firms, "everything from high-tech to the little ma-and-pa business," but generally home to smaller firms with an average of 30 employees each.

The Durante brothers described Addison as "very cooperative in providing municipal services such as sewers and water to the industrial area, and very receptive to industrial development." Said George Durante, "When you get a town that's receptive to your operation and a good location, what else do you need?" The company also developed property in Wood Dale, Bensenville and Carol Stream, but, "Addison is my bread-and butter town."

The Durante brothers retired in the mid-1990's. George's son, Bill, took over the business, which now specializes in brick and block masonry construction. Recent projects completed by what is now known as Durante Enterprises Inc. include the Fullerton School addition and the pump house at the North Wastewater Treatment Plant on Addison Road.

Addison is home to the largest industrial area in DuPage County and the fourth largest in Illinois.

Watch Out for Mosquitoes

The West Nile Virus (WNV) is a potentially serious illness which is transmitted predominantly by Culex mosquitoes.

These mosquitoes become infected when they feed on infected birds, and can then spread WNV to humans and other animals when they bite.

Culex mosquitoes typically bite at dusk and after dark. By day they rest in and around structures and vegetation.

People typically develop symptoms of West Nile virus between 3 and 14 days after they are bitten by the infected mosquito.

People over the age of 50 are more likely to develop serious symptoms of WNV if they do get sick and should take special care to avoid mosquito bites.

Preventing Mosquito Bites

Use insect repellent containing an EPA-registered active ingredient. Follow the directions on the package.

Wear long sleeves and pants at dusk, or consider staying indoors during these hours.

Make sure you have good screens on your windows and doors to keep mosquitoes out.

Reducing Breeding Sites

Culex lay "rafts" of eggs on still water in a variety of natural and man-made containers including tree holes, ditches, non-chlorinated swimming and wading pools, flower pots, or anything where water can collect. They cannot develop in running water and water that is present less than a week.

Eliminating water from places where mosquitoes lay eggs is perhaps the best means of controlling mosquitoes. This can be accomplished by draining water-holding areas within the yard and by keeping water out of natural and artificial containers.

Avoiding mosquitoes doesn't mean that kids have to stay inside

in front of the TV. Get them outside and playing, but remember – a couple of seconds applying an effective repellent to exposed skin and clothing will help everyone stay healthy.

Village of Addison Water Quality Report January 1, 2007 To December 31, 2007

Keeping Our Community Educated On The Quality Of Our Drinking Water

The purpose of this report is to keep our Residents informed on the quality of their drinking water and on the monitoring requirements mandated through the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). If you have any questions or comments pertaining to this report, please call John Chrysogelos, Water Department Foreman, at (630) 620-2020.

The Village of Addison receives all of its water through the DuPage Water Commission (DWC), which receives it from the City of Chicago Jardine water filtration plant located near Navy Pier. The Village of Addison does not mix well water with Lake Michigan water. We provide 100% Lake Michigan water at all times. We have been receiving Lake Michigan water since March of 1992.

To insure that the Village of Addison has the ability to supply water to our residents in an emergency, we also maintain seven wells. These wells are exercised and sampled for bacteriological contamination monthly. This is done to insure that if needed, the well water would comply with all EPA requirements.

Lake Michigan is the sole source of drinking water for Addison, Chicago and 118 other suburban communities. The Environmental Protection Agency has found that the quality of Lake Michigan has improved dramatically over the past 25 years. Lake Michigan, by volume, is the second largest Great Lake and the only one located totally within the United States. It serves as a source of drinking water, as a place for swimming and fishing, as a scenic wonderland, and as a sink for municipal and industrial waste and runoff from the surrounding lands. All 63 miles of shoreline within Illinois are now considered to be in good condition. Since the quality of the raw water source is good, conventional treatment methods of disinfection, coagulation and sedimentation, and sand filtration are adequate for producing a water that is free of harmful contaminants.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain trace amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/Aids or other immune system disorders, some elderly and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. USEPA guidelines on appropriate means to lesson the risk of infection by *Cryptosporidium* and other microbial contaminants are available from the USEPA's SAFE DRINKING WATER HOTLINE (1-800-426-4791).

The Village of Addison Water Department samples and monitors the water from the entire water distribution system every month as mandated by the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA). If the required samples are not submitted or if a sample would be found to be contaminated, this would be a violation of the SDWA and EPA regulations, and all Addison residents would have to be notified as soon as possible. Our Water Department collects 47 water samples every month to insure that your tap water is free from bacteria. These sampling points are distributed evenly throughout the Village. This year, as in past years, your drinking water has met all USEPA and State drinking water standards. The City of Chicago and the DuPage Water Commission also sample and test the water before it reaches the Village of Addison.

The Village of Addison, in addition to performing bacteriological testing, also collects water samples at homes throughout the village to test for lead and copper contamination. Homes containing lead pipes, lead service lines or copper pipe soldered with lead based solder were chosen based on criteria set by the United States Environmental Protection Agency. If more than ten per cent of the collected samples exceed levels set by the USEPA, we would be notified by the IEPA of what actions we must take. The testing began in July 1992, and after two rounds of sampling, the IEPA reduced the number of samples the Village of Addison was required to test from 60 to 30, due to the water being in compliance with lead and copper standards.

The Chicago Water Department monitors for contaminants which are proposed to be regulated or for which no standards currently exist but which could provide useful information in assessing the quality of the source water.

The sources of drinking water, whether they be tap water or bottled water, come from rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels through the ground, or overland, it can dissolve naturally occurring minerals or radioactive materials, and pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or human activity. Some of these contaminants can consist of:

A) Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

B) Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which may be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.

C) Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from agriculture or urban runoff and residential uses.

D) Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and may also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff and septic systems.

E) Radioactive contaminants, which may be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottle water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Explanations of the abbreviations and definitions you will need to understand the sampling data on the water quality sheet for 2007 are as follows:

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) -The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) - The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Treatment Technique (TT) - A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Action Levels (AL) - The concentration of a contaminant that triggers treatment or other required actions by the water supply.

Range of Detection- This column represents a range of individual sample results, from lowest to highest that were collected during the Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) calendar year.

Level Found- This column represents an average of sample data collected during the CCR calendar year. In some cases, it may represent a single sample if only one sample was collected.

Lead - EPA has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. Materials that contain lead were frequently used in the construction of water supply systems and indoor plumbing. Lead in these materials can contaminate drinking water as a result of corrosion that takes place when water comes into contact with these materials. Additional information is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Haloacetic acids - (HAAs) are disinfectant by-products. The Village of Addison has been monitoring for HAAs since at least 2000. The City of Chicago started monitoring for HAAs in July, 1998. The EPA set a MCL for HAAs at 60ppb. Results of the monitoring from Chicago are approximately 11.8 ppb, which is comfortably below the regulated level. All samples collected by the Village of Addison have been far below the levels set by the IEPA.

Trihalomethanes-are disinfectant by-products. The Village of Addison started sampling for Trihalomethanes in July 1987.

Turbidity- is a measure of the cloudiness of the water. The City of Chicago monitors it because it is a good indicator of water quality and the effectiveness of their filtration system.

Fluoride- is added to the water supply to help promote strong teeth. The Illinois Department of Public Health recommends an optimal fluoride range of 0.9 mg/l to 1.2 mg/l.

Sodium- There is no state or federal MCL for sodium. Monitoring is required to provide information to consumers and health officials that are concerned about sodium intake due to dietary precautions. If the level is greater than 20 mg/l and you are on a sodium-restricted diet, you should consult a physician.

Cryptosporidium- Analyses have been conducted monthly on the source water since April 1993. Cryptosporidium has not been detected in these samples. Cryptosporidium is a single-celled parasite, highly resistant to chlorine, which produces an illness characterized by vomiting, fever, diarrhea and fatigue when ingested. Treatment processes have been optimized to ensure that if there are cryptosporidium cysts in the source water, they will be removed during the treatment process. By maintaining a low turbidity and thereby removing the particles from the water, the threat of cryptosporidium organisms getting into the drinking water system is greatly reduced.

MTBE or Methyl Tertiary Butyl Ether- This product is used as an oxygenate additive to gasoline to make it burn more efficiently and help vehicles comply with the 1990 Clean Air Act. This chemical is highly soluble and travels faster and farther underground than other gasoline compounds. At high levels, MTBE may pose a public health threat. The main source of localized MTBE contamination is from leaking underground storage tanks and pipeline spills. At the present time there is no MCL set for MTBE, MTBE is considered to be a ground water issue, not a surface water issue. Our Lake Michigan water source is a surface water supply.

Chromium- Occurs naturally in the environment as chromite iron ore. It is rarely found naturally in water, yet it is widely distributed in soils and plants. Chromium in this form is an important contributor to human health. Chromium can also exist in a toxic state as Hexavalent Chromium, which is associated with industrial waste. Chromium is used in metal alloys including stainless steel, protective coatings on metal, magnetic tapes and pigments for paints, cement, paper and rubber. The USEPA determined that there is no evidence that the lifetime exposure to Chromium in drinking water can cause cancer. Hexavalent Chromium at acute levels can cause skin irritation or ulcerations; long-term exposure to Hexavalent Chromium can lead to liver and kidney damage as well as damage to nerve tissue. Hexavalent chromium has been successfully eliminated from entering the environment as a result of past and current national pollution discharge elimination system and industrial pollution discharge limits. The MCL for Chromium in drinking water is 100 ug/l. The water we receive from the City of Chicago has less than 2 ug/l according to the test data we receive.

Arsenic- Occurs naturally in the environment, being the 20th most common element in the earth crust. Currently the M.C.L. for arsenic is at 50 ppb. The level found in our drinking water from Lake Michigan is less than 4ppb. The World Health Organization is trying to lower the M.C.L. to 10 ppb. At present this change is on hold pending further study by the USEPA.

Unregulated Contaminants:

A maximum contaminant level (MCL) for this contaminant has not been established by either the state or federal regulations, nor has mandatory health effect language. The purpose for monitoring this contaminant is to assist USEPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water, and whether future regulation is warranted.

The Illinois EPA considers all surface water sources of community water supply to be susceptible to potential pollution problems. The very nature of surface water allows contaminants to migrate into the intake with no protection only dilution. This is the reason for mandatory treatment for all surface water supplies in Illinois. Chicago's offshore intakes are located at a distance that shoreline impacts are not usually considered a factor on water quality. At certain times of the year, however, the potential for contamination exists due to

wet-weather flows and river reversals. In addition, the placement of the crib structures may serve to attract waterfowl, gulls and terns that frequent the Great Lakes area, thereby concentrating fecal deposits at the intake and thus compromising the source water quality. Conversely, the shore intakes are highly susceptible to storm water runoff, marinas and shoreline point sources due to the influx of groundwater to the lake. Throughout history there have been extraordinary steps taken to assure a safe source of drinking water in the Chicagoland area. From the building of the offshore cribs and the introduction of interceptor sewers to the lock-and-dam system of Chicago's waterways and the city's Lakefront Zoning Ordinance. The city now looks to the recently created Department of the Water Management, Department of Environment and the MWRDGC to assure the safety of the city's water supply. Also, water supply officials from Chicago are active members of the West Shore Water Producers Association. Coordination of water quality situations (i.e., spills, tanker leaks, exotic species, etc) and general lake conditions are frequently discussed during the association's quarterly meetings. Also, Lake Michigan has a variety of organizations and associations that are currently working to either maintain or improve water quality. Finally, one of the best ways to ensure a safe source of drinking water is to develop a program designed to protect the source water against potential contamination on the local level. Since the predominant land use within Illinois' boundary of Lake Michigan watershed is urban, a majority of the watershed protection activities in this document are aimed at this purpose. Citizens should be aware that everyday activities in an urban setting might have a negative impact on their source water. Efforts should be made to improve awareness of storm water drains and their direct link to the lake within the identified local source water area. A proven best management practice (BMP) for this purpose has been the identification and stenciling of storm water drains within a watershed. Stenciling along with an educational component is necessary to keep the lake a safe and reliable source of drinking water.

Something new to the Consumer Confidence Report this year is on the topic of Cross Connection and Backflow Protection. Since 1986, the Village of Addison has adopted the latest version of the Illinois State Plumbing Code, regarding this issue. New homes and business were built in accordance with this code.

Several years ago the Village of Addison passed an ordinance pertaining to Cross Connection and Backflow Protection, sighting the Illinois State Plumbing Code and the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency). We have been aggressively enforcing this ordinance, and are making sure all irrigation systems and fire sprinkler systems are in compliance. All backflow protection devices need to be tested and certified on a yearly basis, a copy of the test data needs to be sent to us for our records.


