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

Question- I called for an ambulance; why did a fire truck also pull up?


Answer- Often we will send a fire truck with the ambulance on calls that are potentially serious. During a medical emergency, more personnel on scene means we are able to get the patient to the hospital that much faster. All of our personnel are trained in assisting someone during a medical emergency.

INCREDIBLE OPPORTUNITY PROVIDES TRAINING FOR THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Training is an important part of the Addison Fire Protection District and is provided to the firefighters every day in many forms. It is provided in the classroom, at our Station 2 drill tower, and sometimes off site. All of this training helps keep Addison's firefighters ready to answer the call in an emergency. The more realistic the training, the better prepared we will be.

Every once in awhile, we are provided the opportunity to conduct realistic training in a house before it is demolished. These opportunities are few and far between, but incredibly valuable.

Recently, the Addison Fire Department was presented with a unique chance to use not one, but six houses for live training. These were being demolished to make way for the Addison Trail High School expansion but were first donated to us for our use. What followed was more than two weeks of intense training. All types of firefighting skills were honed. Some of these skills included searching for lost victims, rescuing trapped people, cutting roofs and advancing hoselines. We were also able to start controlled fires in order to practice live firefighting in an actual house. The value of this type of training cannot be overstated.

Our annual parade has been canceled as well. For the past two years, the parade had been held in October, but this year the intention had been to bring it back to Community Days.

No determination has been made about 2010. However, we hope that residents will enjoy our other Summer Events – details are on page 6.

‘Mini’ Capital Bill Calls for Resurfacing of Illinois Route 53

Complete Resurfacing Should Begin Soon

On April 3, Governor Pat Quinn signed a \$3 billion “mini” capital bill, the first infrastructure bill in Illinois in more than eight years.

The bill includes \$200 million in Motor Fuel Tax funds to address emergency road repairs, and thanks to the efforts of State Representatives Dennis Reboletti and Franco Coladipietro, and State Senator Carole Pankau, Illinois Route 53/Rohlwing Road will be resurfaced from Army Trail Road to Irving Park Road.

“We appreciate our State legislators going to bat for us,” said Mayor Larry Hartwig. “While this is isn’t the total reconstruction that we’ve been waiting for, it’s far more than the patching that has been done for

More Buzz on Bugs: Summer Brings New Pests

Summer brings more and more insects. Here are some to keep a look out for, and what you can do to minimize their effects.

Gypsy Moth

The Gypsy Moth does its damage as a caterpillar, feeding on the foliage of hundreds of species of plants. Gypsy moth caterpillars grow from 1/16 inch long at hatching to about 2 inches long, multiplying their weight almost 1,000 times. One 2-inch caterpillar can eat leaves covering more than one square yard.

They usually spread to new areas by hitchhiking on outdoor articles such as camping equipment and vehicles, as well as through the movement of landscape debris. Although all life stages of the insect can hitchhike, it is usually the tan-colored, fuzzy egg mass (roughly one-square-inch in size) that is transported. Each can contain as many as 1,000 eggs.

Now that it has established itself here in Addison, you may find egg masses on your tree, house, and outdoor furniture in the infested areas. Gypsy moth caterpillars are easy to identify, because they possess characteristics not found on other leaf-

feeding caterpillars. They have five pairs of blue dots followed by six pairs of red dots lining the back. In addition, they are dark-colored and covered with hairs.

Mosquito

The West Nile virus (WNV) is a potentially serious illness which is transmitted predominantly by Culex mosquitoes. These mosquitoes become infected when they feed on infected birds, and can then spread WNV to humans and other animals when they bite.

People typically develop symptoms of West Nile virus between 3 and 14 days after they are bitten by the infected mosquito. People over the age of 50 are more likely to develop serious symptoms of WNV if they do get sick and should take special care to avoid mosquito bites.

How to prevent mosquito bites:

- Use insect repellent containing an EPA-registered active ingredient.
- Many mosquitoes are most active at dusk and dawn. Be sure to use insect repellent and wear long sleeves and pants, or consider staying indoors during these hours.
- Have good screens on your windows and doors to keep mosquitoes out.
- Get rid of mosquito breeding sites by emptying standing water from flower pots, buckets and barrels. Change the water in pet dishes and replace the water in bird baths weekly. Drill holes in tire swings so water drains out. Keep wading pools empty and on their sides when they aren't being used.

What to Do in the Event of a Sewer Backup

The Sewer Division of Public Works receives many calls throughout the year from residents regarding sewer lateral backups.

Residents are encouraged to call Public Works in such an event. The Sewer Division will inspect the Village sewer main in the immediate area to determine if the liability lies on private property, or within the right-of way.

If a blockage is found within the right-of-way, the Village will assume responsibility. The Sewer Division may install a sewer clean out for access to the lateral to make repairs and for future rodding issues.

If the main line is clear and there is no history of problems at your address, you may need to contact a plumber to assess the problem and rod the sewer lateral if necessary.

Work performed on your property is your liability and is not reimbursable. If the blockage is determined to have been within the Village right-of-way, the Village has a program that may allow for a reimbursement of plumber costs, up to \$200 with proper documentation.

If your plumber does not feel that rodding is an option, or that a sewer clean out installation is the only alternative, contact the Sewer Division immediately at 630-279-2140. During non-business hours, you can call the Addison Police Department non-emergency number at 630-543-3080.

The Village will not reimburse any costs incurred if a private contractor installs a clean out. Also, it is illegal for a private contractor to install a clean out without proper permits prior to installation.

The project was scheduled to go out for bid by the Illinois Department of Transportation in the early spring, and construction should begin shortly after the July 4 holiday.

The road will remain essentially the same with the resurfacing project. The planned widening of the highway will take place when Route 53 is eventually reconstructed.

The widening and reconstruction has been in the state’s Five Year Plan for several years, and remains a priority. However, there is still no word on when the project will actually take place.

A Bit of Addison History

Originally there was a frame building housing Schuller’s Butcher Shop at 120 E. Lake St., constructed with beams which had been in Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church of Bensenville. In 1922, it was moved to a location on North Ave., where it then served as a residence.


In the same year, a brick building was constructed on the property, and became the Plass Garage, owned by Elmer Plass. Three years later it was decided that this building was too small, so it was torn down, and a newer, larger brick building was built. This new building functioned as a service station and dealership for Willys-Overland vehicles.

In 1929-30 the business was bankrupt, and the building stood vacant until 1935, when it was purchased by the P. A. Sturtevant Company for its Miniature Train & Railroad Company operation. They became a leading manufacturer of industrial and automotive torque control devices.

The business was eventually sold, and the building stood vacant again, until 1979, when the façade was redesigned for use by the Miulli Furniture Company.

Bogart’s Movies and Music then moved into the building and remained there until 2002, after which the façade and interior were again altered to make way for Dental Profile, which has occupied the site since 2004.

**Keeping Our Community
Educated On the Quality Of Our Drinking Water**

The purpose of this report is to keep our Residents informed on the quality of their drinking water and on the monitoring requirements mandated through the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). If you have any questions or comments pertaining to this report, please call John Chrysogelos, Water Department Foreman, at (630) 620-2020.

The Village of Addison receives all of its water through the DuPage Water Commission (DWC), which receives it from the City of Chicago Jardine water filtration plant located near Navy Pier. The Village of Addison does not mix well water with Lake Michigan water. We provide 100% Lake Michigan water at all times. We have been receiving Lake Michigan water since March of 1992.

To insure that the Village of Addison has the ability to supply water to our residents in an emergency, we also maintain seven wells. These wells are exercised and sampled for bacteriological contamination monthly. This is done to insure that if needed, the well water would comply with all EPA requirements.

Lake Michigan is the sole source of drinking water for Addison, Chicago and 118 other suburban communities. The Environmental Protection Agency has found that the quality of Lake Michigan has improved dramatically over the past 25 years. Lake Michigan, by volume, is the second largest Great Lake and the only one located totally within the United States. It serves as a source of drinking water, as a place for swimming and fishing, as a scenic wonderland, and as a sink for municipal and industrial waste and runoff from the surrounding lands. All 63 miles of shoreline within Illinois are now considered to be in good condition. Since the quality of the raw water source is good, conventional treatment methods of disinfection, coagulation and sedimentation, and sand filtration are adequate for producing water that is free of harmful contaminants.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at (1-800-426-4791). Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lesson the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the SAFE DRINKING WATER HOTLINE (1-800-426-4791).

The Village of Addison Water Department samples and monitors the water from the entire water distribution system every month as mandated by the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA). If the required samples are not submitted or if a sample would be found to be contaminated, this would be a violation of the SDWA and EPA regulations, and all Addison residents would have to be notified as soon as possible. Our Water Department collects 47 water samples every month to insure that your tap water is free from bacteria. These sampling points are distributed evenly throughout the Village. This year, as in past years, your drinking water has met all USEPA and State drinking water standards. The City of Chicago and the DuPage Water Commission also sample and test the water before it reaches the Village of Addison.

The Village of Addison, in addition to performing bacteriological testing, also collects water samples at homes throughout the village to test for lead and copper contamination. Homes containing lead pipes, lead service lines or copper pipe soldered with lead based solder were chosen based on criteria set by the United States Environmental Protection Agency. If more than ten per cent of the collected samples exceed levels set by the USEPA, we would be

notified by the IEPA of what actions we must take. The testing began in July 1992, and after two rounds of sampling, the IEPA reduced the number of samples the Village of Addison was required to test from 60 to 30, due to the water being in compliance with lead and copper standards.

The Chicago Water Department monitors for contaminants which are proposed to be regulated or for which no standards currently exist but which could provide useful information in assessing the quality of the source water.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive materials, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

A) Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

B) Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which may be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.

C) Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

D) Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

E) Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottle water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Explanations of the abbreviations and definitions you will need to understand the sampling data on the water quality sheet for 2008 are as follows:

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) -The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) - The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Treatment Technique (TT) - A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Action Levels (AL) - The concentration of a contaminant that triggers treatment or other required actions by the water supply.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) – The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) – The highest level of a drinking water disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contamination.

Avg Regulatory compliance with some MCLs are based on running annual average of monthly samples.

NTU Nephelometric Turbidity Unit used to measure cloudiness in drinking water.

Range of Detection- This column represents a range of individual sample results, from lowest to highest that were collected during the Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) calendar year.

Level Found- This column represents an average of sample data collected during the CCR calendar year. In some cases, it may represent a single sample if only one sample was collected.

Lead - EPA has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. Materials that contain lead

were frequently used in the construction of water supply systems and indoor plumbing. Lead in these materials can contaminate drinking water as a result of corrosion that takes place when water comes into contact with these materials. Additional information is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Haloacetic acids - (HAAs) are disinfectant by-products. The Village of Addison has been monitoring for HAAs since at least 2000. The City of Chicago started monitoring for HAAs in July, 1998. The EPA set a MCL for HAAs at 60ppb. Results of the monitoring from Chicago are approximately 11.8 ppb, which is comfortably below the regulated level. **All samples collected by the Village of Addison have been far below the levels set by the IEPA.**

Trihalomethanes-are disinfectant by-products. The Village of Addison started sampling for Trihalomethanes in July 1987.

Turbidity- is a measure of the cloudiness of the water. The City of Chicago monitors it because it is a good indicator of water quality and the effectiveness of their filtration system.

Fluoride- is added to the water supply to help promote strong teeth. The Illinois Department of Public Health recommends an optimal fluoride range of 0.9 mg/l to 1.2 mg/l.

Sodium- There is no state or federal MCL for sodium. Monitoring is required to provide information to consumers and health officials that are concerned about sodium intake due to dietary precautions. If the level is greater than 20 mg/l and you are on a sodium-restricted diet, you should consult a physician.

Cryptosporidium- Analyses have been conducted monthly on the source water since April 1993. Cryptosporidium has not been detected in these samples. Cryptosporidium is a single-celled parasite, highly resistant to chlorine, which produces an illness characterized by vomiting, fever, diarrhea and fatigue when ingested. Treatment processes have been optimized to ensure that if there are cryptosporidium cysts in the source water, they will be removed during the treatment process. By maintaining a low turbidity and thereby removing the particles from the water, the threat of cryptosporidium organisms getting into the drinking water system is greatly reduced.

Chromium- Occurs naturally in the environment as chromite iron ore. It is rarely found naturally in water, yet it is widely distributed in soils and plants. Chromium in this form is an important contributor to human health. Chromium can also exist in a toxic state as Hexavalent Chromium, which is associated with industrial waste. Chromium is used in metal alloys including stainless steel, protective coatings on metal, magnetic tapes and pigments for paints, cement, paper and rubber. The USEPA determined that there is no evidence that the lifetime exposure to Chromium in drinking water can cause cancer. Hexavalent Chromium at acute levels can cause skin irritation or ulcers; long-term exposure to Hexavalent Chromium can lead to liver and kidney damage as well as damage to nerve tissue. Hexavalent chromium has been successfully eliminated from entering the environment as a result of past and current national pollution discharge elimination system and industrial pollution discharge limits. The MCL for Chromium in drinking water is 100 ug/l. The water we receive from the City of Chicago has less than 2 ug/l according to the test data we receive.

UNREGULATED CONTAMINANTS:

A maximum contaminant level (MCL) for this contaminant has not been established by either the state or federal regulations, nor has mandatory health effect language. The purpose for monitoring this contaminant is to assist USEPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water, and whether future regulation is warranted.

The Illinois EPA considers all surface water sources of community water supply to be susceptible to potential pollution problems. The very nature of surface water allows contaminants to migrate into the intake with no protection only dilution. This is the reason for mandatory treatment for all surface water supplies in Illinois. Chicago's offshore intakes are located at a distance that shoreline impacts are not usually considered a factor on water quality. At certain times of the year, however, the potential for contamination exists due to wet-weather flows and river reversals. In addition, the placement of the crib structures may serve to attract waterfowl, gulls and terns that frequent the Great Lakes area, thereby concentrating fecal deposits at the intake and thus compromising the source water quality. Conversely, the shore intakes are highly susceptible to storm water runoff, marinas and shoreline point sources

due to the influx of groundwater to the lake. Throughout history there have been extraordinary steps taken to assure a safe source of drinking water in the Chicago land area. From the building of the offshore cribs and the introduction of interceptor sewers to the lock-and-dam system of Chicago's waterways and the city's Lakefront Zoning Ordinance. The city now looks to the recently created

Department of the Water Management, Department of Environment and the MWRDGC to assure the safety of the city's water supply. Also, water supply officials from Chicago are active members of the West Shore Water Producers Association. Coordination of water quality situations (i.e., spills, tanker leaks, exotic species, etc) and general lake conditions are frequently discussed during the association's quarterly meetings. Also, Lake Michigan has a variety of organizations and associations that are currently working to either maintain or improve water quality. Finally, one of the best ways to ensure a safe source of drinking water is to develop a program designed to protect the source water against potential contamination on the local level. Since the predominant land use within Illinois' boundary of Lake Michigan watershed is urban, a majority of the watershed protection activities in this document are aimed at this purpose. Citizens should be aware that everyday activities in an urban setting might have a negative impact on their source water. **Efforts should be made to improve awareness of storm water drains and their direct link to the lake within the identified local source water area. A proven best management practice (BMP) for this purpose has been the identification and stenciling of storm water drains within a watershed. Stenciling along with an educational component is necessary to keep the lake a safe and reliable source of drinking water.**

Something new to the Consumer Confidence Report is on the topic of Cross Connection and Backflow Protection. Since 1986, the Village of Addison has adopted the latest version of the Illinois State Plumbing Code, regarding this issue. New homes and business were built in accordance with this code.

Several years ago the Village of Addison passed an ordinance pertaining to Cross Connection and Backflow Protection, sighting the Illinois State Plumbing Code and the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency). We have been aggressively enforcing this ordinance, and are making sure all irrigation systems and fire sprinkler systems are in compliance. All backflow protection devices need to be **tested and certified on a yearly basis**, a copy of the test data needs to be sent to us for our records. This is an ongoing annual program, if residents and business owners are unsure if this pertains to them or have any questions please call Stewart McLeod, Water Operator, at (630) 620-2020.

Elementary report card pilot designed to improve communication with parents

Anyone who has ever looked at a report card knows the excitement of seeing a row of 'A's in a column, but letter grades can be somewhat limited in the information that they communicate to a parent. Are students graded on a 'curve'? Does the grade place equal weight on homework and tests, effort and achievement? There are many questions that can remain unanswered with a simple letter grade.

In an effort to better communicate to parents how their children are learning, Addison School District 4 will pilot a new standards-based report card in grades K-5 for the 2009 - 2010 school year. The design of the piloted K-5 report card will be standards-based, which will assess students on learning standards that are identified for each content area. By providing more specific descriptions of what knowledge or skills children are expected to learn and by evaluating students on each individual standard, students and parents can see where the child's performance excels and where it needs to improve.

What is Standards Based Reporting?

- ⇒ Standards-based reporting provides parents clear information about what their child has learned, what they are able to do, and what they need to learn in relation to the standards.
- ⇒ This system provides an easy-to-understand student progress reporting tool that merges a traditional format with new standards-based measures.
- ⇒ Student progress is reported in relation to expected levels of performance at that time.
- ⇒ Achievement and effort are reported separately.
- ⇒ Not all report card standards are assessed each term.
- ⇒ Student achievement is measured in a variety of ways: through observation, questioning, reviewing assignments, testing or evaluating projects, and performance.



Students in 2nd through 5th grades will also receive letter grades each term, based on their proficiency in meeting the standards for each content area at that point in time. A student's effort and assignment completion will also be reported separately in each content area and are not reflected in the content area grade. Students will continue to be evaluated on their work habits and social skills.

All elementary schools will participate in this pilot in at least one grade level per building. An important part of this pilot will be parent education and feedback. Parents of the students who are in these pilot classes will be informed about the new report card and the process of how each standard is assessed and communicated. All other K-5 classes will continue with the traditional report cards for the 2009-2010 school year. The goal of the report card pilot is to identify any areas of improvement necessary prior to launching the new report card for all K-5 classes for the 2010-2011 school year.

Trimester terms for elementary students

Most elementary school children receive their report cards four times each year, with their schools using a quarter system. This interval for reporting progress usually allows students 42 to 45 days to learn the required skills prior to reporting progress for parents. Depending on the quarter, students had to contend with long breaks or holidays that interrupt momentum toward learning. [Starting with the 2009-2010 school year, all K-5 students in Addison School District 4 will begin following a trimester schedule](#), which will provide 56 to 61 days to learn and develop learning skills.

There are inherent advantages to extending the interval of reporting progress to parents. Some of these include:

- Better opportunity during the first trimester to allow children more opportunity for growth, as opposed to measuring their ability to adjust back to school.
- More time for teachers to know students allows better assessment of student learning.
- Aligns with benchmarking and progress monitoring, which increases consistency.
- 12 weeks of data vs. 9 weeks of data gives a better prognosis of child's progress.
- Overall increase in communication with multiple progress reports.

There are advantages for Parent/Teacher Conferences, too...

- Two conferences for three trimesters--as opposed to two conferences for four quarters--provide a greater ratio of conferences to grading intervals.
- The second conference is earlier in the trimester, which allows students to improve their performance prior to when grades are finalized.
- Having conferences early in the grading period also gives parents the information they need in order to intervene with their children earlier.



The change in reporting intervals to Trimesters will provide students with the opportunity to develop their learning prior to finalizing grades that are reported to their parents. Parents will be provided with a better assessment of their child's growth and will experience improved communication from their child's teachers.

The trimester schedule will not change the school calendar. Even though K-5 students will be on trimesters and 6th-8th grade students will still be on quarters, they will all share the same starting, ending and vacation/holidays dates.

Health/immunization requirements

Please note the following health and immunization requirements for the 2009-10 school year. Students entering any of the District 4 preschool programs must have proof of a Hib vaccine and three doses of Hepatitis B vaccine.

All students new to the district, as well as those entering [kindergarten](#) and [sixth grade](#), are required to present proof of a recent physical exam and current immunization record.

CHILDREN WILL BE EXCLUDED FROM SCHOOL FOR THE 2009-2010 SCHOOL YEAR UNTIL THEIR IMMUNIZATIONS AND PHYSICAL EXAMS ARE CURRENT.

Immunizations are available from the DuPage County Health Department for a reasonable fee for each vaccine. Families participating in Medicaid should bring their Medicaid cards. Parents must accompany their children to the clinic and must present their children's current immunization records in order to receive the vaccine. Health Centers that offer immunization clinics are located in Lombard, Wheaton and Westmont. **IMMUNIZATION CLINICS ARE BY APPOINTMENT ONLY.** Please call 630-682-7400 for an appointment.

Kindergarten, 2nd grade and 6th grade students are also required to have a dental examination. Proof of a dental exam must be on file in the school office by May 15, 2010.


