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
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

Keep the Wreath Red



Every December for the past 24 years, the Addison Fire District has displayed large green wreaths with red bulbs on each of its fire stations. The wreaths are more than holiday decorations, they are part of our "Keep the Wreath Red" holiday fire safety program. Anytime there is a fire in Addison that can be attributed to holiday decorations, one red bulb on the wreath is changed to white. So, how can you help keep the wreath red?

- * Use decorations made of fire resistive materials.
- * Be sure light strings are in good shape. Replace damaged strings.
- * Take care not to overload electrical outlets
- * If you use a real Christmas tree, make sure it is fresh and keep it well watered.
- * Candles should be kept away from other combustible decorations, in secure holders, and extinguished when leaving the home or retiring for the night.
- * Check around the house after a party. Make sure all smoking materials are extinguished and disposed of properly.

Arts Center Question Goes to Voters

An advisory referendum will appear on the Nov. 2 General Election ballot, asking voters in the Village of Addison their opinion on the future funding of a cultural arts center.

The referendum question was placed on the ballot through a citizen-initiated petition, and is not endorsed either for or against by the Village of Addison, its Board of Trustees or advisory commissions.

The ballot question is intended to ascertain voter input as to the use of public funding for the construction and/or operation of a permanent home for arts programs and related activities and events.

The Village of Addison has not committed any public funds for the construction and operation of a cultural arts center, and any such funding would require consideration by the Board of Trustees prior to any appropriation of dollars.

Voters are encouraged to become informed about the proposed cultural arts center and the advisory referendum by visiting their website at addisoncenterforthearts.com, and to exercise their right to vote on Tuesday, November 2.

Protect Yourself and Family, Even During the Holiday Season



Police Beat

The Holidays are a special time of year, they are also a time when people become very busy and can forget about their property and personal safety. Don't make yourself vulnerable to any types of crimes of opportunity during the holiday season, follow these simple safety tips from the Addison Police Crime Prevention Section and have a safe and enjoyable holiday season!

Home Safety

Before you leave your home try to make sure it looks the same as when you are in your home:

- Leave lights and a radio on timers.
- Make sure all doors and windows are locked securely.
- Never leave an extra key under a door mat or rock; burglars know to look there, too.
- Never display gifts where they can be seen from a window or doorway.

Annoying Telephone Calls or Solicitors

- Remember, you do not have to talk on the phone to or open the door for anyone, especially a solicitor, especially since this will occur more so during the holiday season (everyone will want you to be charitable and to be giving).
- Annoying telephone calls or persistent (repeat) calls can be handled by the Addison Police Department by filing report, or by contacting the Annoyance Call Bureau listed in the front of the phone book. You may also call the customer service department for your phone service carrier to help monitor the incoming problem calls. If a police report is made, your phone number can be changed for free one time to prevent/stop the problem calls .
- Do not list/publish your telephone number in the phone book or give out to persons you don't trust to help curtail future problems.
- All solicitors must be registered with the village and must have a solicitor's permit and I.D. that must be worn. (Political and Religious Organizations exempt)
- When someone asks you for a donation, find out what the purpose of the charity is and how your donation will be used. Ask if contributions are tax deductible, and get a receipt. If you are not satisfied with the answers, do not give!
- Be suspicious of charities that only accept cash. If you send a check, make sure it is made out to the organization not an individual.
- If a solicitor reaches you by phone, never give your credit card or checking account information out over the telephone.

Suspicious Activities

Please report any and all suspicious activities. The police do not know if there is a problem unless they are told. Crime Prevention is everyone's responsibility.

Flood Information Outreach Project

The Village of Addison Community Development Department – Engineering Division reminds residents of the following:

1. Flood Insurance: Federal law requires a flood insurance policy be obtained for any federally backed mortgage secured for a building in a flood hazard area. Mapped flood hazard areas are available for viewing at the Village Hall. *New maps will be issued soon by FEMA on December of this year and the maps for the entire County of DuPage can be viewed at <http://ec.dupageco.org/dec/floodmaps.html>.* The Village maintains a 15 percent reduction in premiums by the FEMA-FIA due to its Class 7 CRS rating. Remind your insurance agent when renewing or buying new flood insurance policies. Your typical homeowners insurance policies do not cover flood-

ing damages.

- 2. Drainage System Maintenance:** Obstruction of natural watercourses, including man-made watercourses and storm sewers, by dumping trash or debris and oils are prohibited. It is important to keep these drainage systems free from obstruction to ensure the flow of water and to abate the maintenance costs. Violations will result in citations and fines.
- 3. Floodplain Development Permit Requirements:** The Village has stringent requirements relative to storm water management for developments in all areas. Ordinances regulate all types of developments in the floodplains, not just building construction. Please report any illegal filling, development or building in floodplains to 693-7530.
- 4. Flood Hazard, Flood Warning, Flood Safety and Prop-**

erty Protection: Flood hazards and flood warning systems have been incorporated in the Village's Flood Mitigation and Flood Management Plan. A brochure is available at the Village Hall and the Addison Village Library. The Engineering Division will continue to conduct site investigations and *provide technical assistance only* for property protection and drainage concerns.

- 5. Siren Tests, Emergency Assistance and Media Advisories:** Sirens are used for weather advisories, as well as to alert the public of peacetime emergencies. Tune in to Addison Community Television Channel 6 for live bulletins and updates on emergency conditions, as well as Channel 19 for printed bulletins. Sirens are tested on the first Tuesday of each month at 10:00 a.m.

Website's 'Welcome Wagon' Goes Multi-Lingual



Each year, the Village of Addison updates its Strategic Plan.

The Strategic Plan is an outline of long-term goals and visions for the community, and is used as a guideline by Village Departments, as well as the elected officials during the budget process.

In October, the Village Board and staff met to discuss updates to the Strategic Plan, and unveiled a new section of the website to help meet the goal of increasing commu-

nication with increasingly diverse populations in the community.

In November, this new section will debut under the heading of "Welcome Wagon – Non-English."

Six languages – Spanish, Greek, Albanian, Polish, Italian and Urdu – have been selected with the help of our school districts, who have determined that these cultures have significant populations within Addison.

While it is virtually impossible to duplicate the hundreds of pages that make up the Village's website, the most important information for someone new to our community,

regardless of their origins, has already been located in one section of our website, under "Welcome Wagon." It is this section of the site that has been duplicated in the selected languages.

In the coming months, the Village, as well as other taxing bodies and service agencies, will do its best to communicate the availability of this information online.

Other taxing bodies in Addison, such as the Addison Public Library and School District 4, are beginning the same process. Their information will be linked to the Village's.

A Bit of Addison History

Have you ever wondered why addresses in unincorporated areas of DuPage County differ from those within the boundaries of a village like Addison, or a city like Wood Dale?

An example of an unincorporated address might be 18W243. What this address means is that the property it represents lies within an area 18 miles west of State Street in Chicago.

So you can see that the intersection of State and Madison streets has not only determined addresses within the city of Chicago, but throughout the suburbs also.

Properties located within and near the Village of Addison fall between 17 - 22 miles west of State Street, and between two to five miles north of Madison Street.

Since the area surrounding Chicago was largely undeveloped before suburban villages and cities began to incorporate, places were described as being located within a township.

In 1849, DuPage County was divided into the following nine townships: Addison, Bloomingdale, Downers Grove, Lisle, Milton, Naperville, Wayne and York.

Most of the Village of Addison falls within Addison Township; however, the area west of Rohlwing Road is located within Bloomingdale Township.

As more and more land becomes annexed into villages, unincorporated pockets of land are becoming scarcer, so the areas under township jurisdiction are decreasing. However, township government still continues to play an important role in the assessment of property values, general assistance programs, road projects, and mosquito abatement.

Renovation schedule planned

The eight school buildings in District 4 will be undergoing a great deal of change over the next few years as long-awaited upgrades and renovations take place. For voters who have been reading about the need for funding to improve the buildings since District 4 first proposed a building bond referendum in January 2003, it may seem as though the process moves slowly, but there are many steps to be taken before making such widespread changes.

Once the referendum passed in March 2004, the school district issued bonds to make funds available for the projects and the search for an architectural firm began. At the July 27 meeting of the Board of Education, the Board approved a contract with STR Partners to serve as architects for the building work to be done. Since that time, personnel from STR have visited all the schools and have met with the principals in order to gather information for the upcoming projects.

The Buildings and Grounds Committee of the Board of Education has met with STR and District administrators to develop a timeline for building renovations. Preliminary plans call for all work to be completed within the next four school years with the majority of the work to be done in the summer. Ardmore, Fullerton and Stone Schools are scheduled for renovations in summer 2005. Restroom renovations in all of the schools and many of the parking lot upgrades are also planned for next summer. Work at Army Trail, Indian Trail and Wesley is scheduled for the summer of 2006, along with asbestos abatement and floor tile replacement in all schools. Lincoln, Lake Park and, possibly, the building at 121 W. Fullerton are scheduled for their major renovation work during the summer of 2007.

The next step in the process involves selecting a firm to provide construction manager services. In September, sixteen companies submitted proposals to District 4. The process of studying the proposals and selecting a firm continued in September and October and the board planned to approve a contract with the selected construction firm at the October 26 Board meeting.

"Once we choose a construction firm, they will start working right away with the architects to continue with the planning process," said Pat Masterton, District 4's Assistant Superintendent for Business.

The school year has gotten off to a great start. Our district architects are working in all the buildings preparing renovation documents. We have a tentative building renovation schedule identifying Stone, Fullerton and Ardmore buildings to be renovated by the end of summer 2005; Indian Trail, Wesley and Army Trail by the end of summer 2006, and Lincoln and Lake Park by the end of summer 2007. The renovation schedule is tentative at this time but will be finalized by this November. Anyone having questions about the renovation should contact a building principal or me.

The student enrollment this school year is slightly higher than last year. We have a total of 3875 students with the breakdown as follows: Ardmore Elementary:352, Army Trail Elementary:439, Fullerton Elementary:502, Lake Park Elementary:277, Lincoln Elementary:365, Stone Elementary:387, Wesley Elementary:260 and Indian Trail Junior High School:1257.

One of the new exciting programs at Addison District #4 is a junior high and high school mentoring program sponsored by the Addison Business-Education Partnership Planning Council. The mentoring program will focus on training business and community leaders to become mentors for junior high and high school students. The mentors are trained to be role models and support adults in the lives of young people. Addison District #4 is excited about having these mentors interacting with our junior high students.

Addison #4 is looking forward to our winter activities and I hope to get a chance to speak with many of you soon. Please do not hesitate to contact me with any concerns.

Busses work overtime

Every day school busses transport thousands of Addison children between home and school. Busses begin picking up junior high students before 7:00 a.m. The busses unload students at Indian Trail and then head out to pick up and deliver students to St. Joseph and St. Philip Schools. Once those students are safely delivered, the busses begin transporting elementary students to Army Trail, Fullerton, Lake Park, Lincoln, Stone and Wesley Schools. The final bus run for each bus transports the district's youngest students to Ardmore School. Running four complete bus runs in a little over 2 hours requires extensive planning.

With road construction on main arteries such as Vista, Lincoln, Lombard, Diversey, Church and Army Trail the challenge of transporting children safely is even greater. The school district works closely with the Village of Addison and the Police Department to keep informed of construction plans. Because busses have to be rerouted on a daily basis to work around road detours, bus route changes requested by parents cannot be accommodated at the current time. It is important for families to be patient and flexible under these circumstances in order to insure the safety of all of the school children.




Fullerton school 5th graders were amazed by the mental math skills demonstrated by Mike Byster, a commodities trader who visits schools to present his "Wild About Math" program. Students and teachers watched Byster as he performed a number of complicated calculations in his head. His method of computing squares of 3 digit numbers had audience members excited by their ability to solve complicated problems quickly and accurately.

Data Retreat focuses on school improvement

Results from Illinois Standards Achievement Tests (ISAT) given in April 2004 were just one piece of a data puzzle for more than 40 teachers and administrators who gathered at Indian Trail in August for a three day data retreat. Other information that was included in the analysis was the parent and teacher survey data that had been collected in November 2003 and student survey data that had been gathered from targeted student groups in May 2004.

Seven schools had teams of five to seven staff members who worked with the guidance of facilitators Wendy McFerrin and Jim Frontier to analyze facts and predict trends related to the educational effectiveness of their schools. In



analyzing the data, teams worked to develop their School Improvement Plans (SIP). These plans outline the steps that will be taken to improve student learning in the current year. The school improvement process allows schools to make modifications that will best suit the need of their particular student population. Each school's SIP is included as the final section of its School Report Card. School report cards can be viewed on the District 4 website, www.asd4.org.

On the final day of the retreat, Addison Trail High School staff members joined the District 4 teams to build on their understanding of the patterns of strengths and weaknesses in the elementary schools.

Opera in our neighborhood

For the ninth consecutive year the Lyric Opera of Chicago brought their Opera in the Neighborhoods program to Addison. Over 1500 students--from District 4, Concord, St. Joseph and St. Philip--went to Addison Trail High School on October 14 to enjoy a one-hour English language production of "The Magic Flute" by Wolfgang Mozart. The program provides study guides for the students a month before the performance so teachers can introduce opera terminology and etiquette as well as information about the plot and the composer.

Addison students are fortunate to be able to participate in the Opera in the Neighborhood program as it performs in a limited number of venues--only seven locations in Chicago and six locations in the suburbs. The Addison Center for the Arts and the Addison Cultural Arts Commission are the local agencies that make have made this experience available to Addison students.

Many thanks, also, are due to Addison Trail High School for providing the stage and auditorium facilities that are used each year.

ExxonMobil grant to Ardmore

Once again this year, District 4 students are benefiting from the support of the local business community. Mrs. Jane Lee-- of Lee's Mart at Lake Street and Rohlwing Road--applied for a 2004 ExxonMobil Educational Alliance Program Grant on behalf of Ardmore School. The \$500 grant will be use to fund a literacy-related assembly for the students.

School board election information

Illinois school board elections will be held on April 5, 2005. The current terms of four District 4 Board of Education members--Judy Bormann, Gene Campbell, Jim Towns and Kathy Willis--will expire in 2005.

To be eligible to serve, a school board member must be, on the date of election, a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years old, a resident of the state of Illinois and District 4 for at least one year immediately preceding the election, and a registered voter. A candidate may not be a school trustee or school treasurer.

Nominating petition forms for the April 5 election are available in the District 4 Administration


Office at 222 N. Kennedy Drive, Addison. Forms can be picked up during regular business hours.

Improving Student Achievement Through a Personalized Learning Environment

Addison Trail High School faculty and staff members remain committed to **increasing student achievement during** the 2004-2005 school year. The following goals and strategies have been established with a student-centered focus on learning.

One of the school goals is to **personalize the learning environment to meet the needs of individual students.** Strategies to achieve this goal include:

- ▶ providing additional team teaching opportunities so students have common **teachers delivering individualized instruction**
- ▶ partnering with parents to **increase involvement in the learning community** by attending feedback sessions, joining committees and using Edline
- ▶ partnering with the local business community for **mentoring and career exploration opportunities**



Another primary goal is to **ensure all students develop essential learning skills** to help with career preparation. Strategies to reach this goal include:

- ▶ clarifying the expectations of students and the **specific skills that should be developed each year** during a high school career
- ▶ forming common evaluation strategies to **ensure and measure the attainment of student skills**
- ▶ talking with students about **pursuing education beyond high school**, including vocational/technical schools, community colleges and universities

Focusing on Student Success in all Grade Levels: Local School Districts Meet to Collaborate

In order to review local and national issues affecting education, Addison Trail High School and District 88 administrators are continuing their efforts to dialogue with "feeder" school districts **Addison District 4, Villa Park/Lombard District 45, and Salt Creek District 48.** The purpose of these joint district meetings is to **provide a seamless education system for all students in grades K-12.**



Dr. Elaine Buch, Addison Trail Media Center Director, leads a CRISS workshop for faculty from Addison School District 4 in August. The training workshop provided teachers with specific strategies to implement in the classroom and demonstrates the ongoing partnership between the high school and middle school.

Members of the administrative teams engage in discussions about **student success in the classroom**, techniques to **improve student performance**, and **steps to ease the transition** from middle school to high school for both parents and students.

In addition, the joint team focuses on **methods staff can implement for higher student achievement.** The school districts **compare and analyze test score data and trends**, which provides insight to make improvements in teaching strategies and the curriculum.
