

District 4 students enjoy being

Summertime learners

Students from all over Addison spent extra time in school in June and July as they participated in District 4's two summer school programs, Summer Bridges and Summer Academy.

The Summer Bridges program, offered in District 4 for the first time, was fully funded by the State of Illinois. It offered students an opportunity to build reading and writing skills in a more casual setting than they ordinarily encounter during the school year. The program included a strong phonics component reinforced by great deal of practice reading and writing. The students worked with fiction, non-fiction and poetry.

Not only were children learning, but their teachers were learning as well. The teachers attended afternoon sessions conducted by state professional development providers who taught effective strategies for teaching literacy.

"It's so exciting that we have the opportunity to work with the children in this program," said summer school principal Marilyn Krajenta. "It's wonderful that the teachers will be able share what they've learned with other teachers and carry it back to their classrooms as well."

The Summer Academy offered a variety of courses that covered math, science, reading, Spanish and computer skills. Students had a great deal of hands-on learning as they researched topics on the Internet, played games designed to

improve keyboarding skills and created oobleck. When asked what they enjoyed most about these classes, the students responded enthusiastically. "I liked surfing on the Net." "I liked watching my volcano erupt." "I just love learning new things!"

Eighteen dedicated teachers & staff members made learning fun for the 220 students that participated in the summer school programs.

"This is the first summer school program we have offered in a number of years," said Dr. Sue Buckman, Curriculum Director. "We were very pleased with the response of the parents and the enthusiasm of the children!"





Superintendent reflects on

Change and Growth

Dr. Larry Weck has seen many changes in Addison over the past 27 years. Dr. Weck has served as Superintendent in Addison District 4 for 17 years(1983 to present). Previously, Weck was principal of Addison Trail High School for seven years(1976-83) after having served there for three years as assistant principal(1973-76).

The enrollment in District 4 has increased from 3200 students when Weck began to 3977 as of June 2000. These increasing numbers led to the reopening of Ardmore School as a kindergarten center in 1992. Today Ardmore houses all of the kindergarten students from the Army Trail, Fullerton, Lake Park and Lincoln attendance areas as well as Early Childhood and P.E.P. classes. During the 1999-2000 school year, approximately 360 attended Ardmore. A similar change had occurred in the fall of 1987. At that time the six elementary schools were full and class sizes were large, and the decision was made to move all sixth graders to Indian Trail.

In recent years, the school buildings have been undergoing major improvements. A facilities study indicated the need to invest funds in order to maintain and update the school buildings. Roofing, new energy-efficient windows, new boiler systems and swipe card security entrance systems are among the updates that have been made to improve the learning environment for the students. Also, to accommodate the increasing enrollment, building additions have recently been completed at Army Trail and Fullerton Schools. New classrooms and gyms were added onto both schools. Weck is pleased with the progress that has been made and notes that the building

upgrades and additions have all been accomplished without having to pass a referendum for additional funding. The school improvements have been financed using existing funds, grant revenue and local and state funds. The new gym at Army Trail is a prime example having been totally funded by State of Illinois money obtained through the efforts of Senator Pate Philip and Representative Lee Daniels.

Intergovernmental cooperation has greatly increased during Dr. Weck's tenure in District 4. Addison has a unique relationship between its various governmental bodies that is mutually beneficial to all. The Army Trail gym was built as a joint venture--to be used by District 4 during the day and by the Addison Park District in the evenings. Another example of this cooperation is the availability of the board room in the new Addison Village Hall for District 4 Board of Education. District 4 has offered classes and made its computer lab at Stone School available to community members, as well. From cable TV broadcasts of school events to homework project assignments being posted in the Addison Library, Addison residents benefit from the increased effort of these governmental bodies to work together.

District 4 has made a strong commitment to keeping teachers and students current with technology. Every classroom has 3 computers and each building maintains a computer lab. Last year, District 4 began the process of converting from Apple computers to PCs. A new PC lab at Stone School has been heavily used for teacher/secretary training classes to help with the transition to the new computers. Additionally, a recently installed telephone system has made parent/teacher communication easier and more effective.

Another positive change that Weck has seen over the years is the improvement in staff training. "Providing training for your own staff is the most effective and efficient way of maintaining an up-to-date trained staff," says Weck. "We first inservice a small nucleus of the staff. They, in turn, train the remainder of the staff. We are pleased with the results."



New Board of Education member named to fill vacancy

The Addison District 4 Board of Education has named Jim Towns to complete the unexpired term of Board member, Joan Rush. Mrs. Rush resigned in June in order to retire with her husband in Florida. Her regular term of office ends in November, 2000.

Mr. Towns was one of seven highly qualified applicants for the school board position. Towns is a lifelong Addison resident who attended District 4 schools. He's looking forward to being actively involved in continuing to offer a quality education to all Addison children.





Medical Information Sheets

If you have ever needed to call 911 for an ambulance, you know this can be a very stressful time. Just as 911 dispatchers need specific address information to get units to the scene quickly, paramedics will need medical information for their patient assessment and treatment. Some people can feel overwhelmed from all the questions.

For this reason, it is a good idea to make a list of important personal information to be used in case of an emergency. This is an especially helpful tool for people with extensive health problems or other factors that may increase the chances of needing an ambulance. The list should be kept in a marked envelope, in a safe, easy to access place such as a desk drawer or taped to the refrigerator. Information on this list should include:

- Your name, address, phone number, and date of birth
- Pertinent medical history
- Medications and dosage
- Doctors names and phone numbers
- Insurance information (for the hospital)
- Persons you want contacted in an emergency



This list should be updated as information changes. Paramedics may ask to take the list with them to the hospital.

From the Mayor's Desk ...



Military veterans of Addison have served both our country and the Village in such an immeasurable fashion that the members of the Village Board and I feel obligated to honor them.

That is why the park land at the northeast corner of Lake Street and Addison Roads, currently known as Friendship Circle, will be renamed Veterans Circle, in consultation with the members of Addison Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 7446.

The land was acquired by the Village as part of the Addison Road improvement project in 1982. Since then, it has served as a passive park site amid the busy Lake and Addison business corridor.

In addition to renaming the corner, veterans



will also be honored through a gift from Walgreens Drug Store. The nearly-completed

store that neighbors Friendship Circle has donated five flagpoles, each waving the flag of one of the branches of our nation's armed services. My thanks to Walgreens for this generous donation to our community.

Every time we pass the corner of Lake Street and Addison Road there will be a permanent reminder of the dedicated efforts put forth by the veterans of Addison and our country.

Police Department Wins Accreditation

After three years of intense work, the Addison Police Department was officially accredited for superb law enforcement by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA), on July 29.

"This recognizes the fact that our police department is on the cutting edge of law enforcement," said Village Manager Joe Block.

According to Deputy Police Chief and Accreditation Manager Larry Stoll, the department met 401 of the 436 standards set by CALEA, a commission that sets and administers law enforcement standards of excellence.

The standards stress law enforcement subjects such as the department's relationships with other police agencies, management, personnel administration, law and traffic enforcement, prisoner and court services and technical services.

The majority of the process is spent performing a self-assessment. This includes gathering proofs in each area of law enforcement that would comply with CALEA's standards. Stoll said during the process of being accredited, they had to constantly update police procedures and regulations.

In the final step of the process, Addison's department was assessed by a team composed of law enforcement practitioners from similar, but out-of-state, agencies. They reviewed written materials, interview materials, visited offices and other areas where compliance could be witnessed.

"In all of North America there are only 500-600 departments accredited out of 20,000, and we're one of them," said Stoll

"Accreditation reduces our potential for liability, makes the department more efficient and improves pride among the officers and community," said Police Chief Mel Mack.

Some accredited police departments in the surrounding area are Lombard, Schaumburg, Naperville, Elk Grove Village and DuPage County Sheriff.

Vehicle Stickers on Sale Now; Display by Oct. 15

Vehicle stickers are now on sale, and may be purchased by mail or at the Village Hall Collection Office at One Friendship Plaza. Stickers are valid Sept. 1, 2000 - Aug. 31, 2001.

Residents who currently have an Addison vehicle sticker should have received a preprinted renewal form in the mail. We encourage residents to verify the accuracy of the information on the form, and save time by using the return envelope provided.

New residents should bring the vehicle registration showing an Addison address when applying for a sticker. All the necessary information for the application can be found on your registration.

Please note that vehicles that do not display a sticker by Oct. 15 will be ticketed by Addison Police. Anyone

purchasing a sticker after Oct. 15 will incur a \$5 late charge. After Nov. 1, the late charge will be \$10.

Senior citizens, physically handicapped persons and/or veterans and active full-time armed forces personnel must present proof of their status. To receive a senior citizen discount, the motor vehicle owner must reach the age of 65 on or before Jan. 1, 2001. Physically handicapped persons must have a handicapped license plate on their vehicle to qualify for the discount.

Discount fees shall apply to one motor vehicle registered per individual. If an owner has more than one vehicle, the reduced fee will apply to

Branch Pickup Service Ends in October


The Village of Addison offers seasonal branch pickup service to residents from April through October. Branch pickup dates are determined by the area of town in which one resides.

Branches should be out on the parkway the **Sunday before their scheduled pickup**. Village crews will pass down the street only once during each week. Only one collection will be made per area per month.

The requirements are as follows:

- Branches should be on the **parkway, not the street**, stacked in one direction on the parkway with the thicker end facing the street.
- Branches should be limited to eight feet in length and eight inches in diameter.
- Limbs larger than eight inches in diameter should be cut into 16-inch log lengths and placed separately from the branches. Logs will be picked up Thursday or Friday of that week.
- Branches should not be tied with string, wire, etc.
- No root balls, lumber or landscape waste will be collected.


