Village Hall Dedication Plans Unveiled

Business may already be taking place out of the new Village Hall, but that won't stop plans for the official ceremony celebrating the completion of the project, to take place during the Community Days festival.

Saturday, August 26 is the grand opening for the new Village Hall, located at One Friendship Plaza.

Even those who may have already come to the new building to conduct business, or simply out of curiosity, will want to attend the events planned to celebrate the new anchor to Addison's downtown, and open it to residents.

"Village Hall is a place where village business is conducted, but it's also a community gathering place," said Village Manager Joe Block. "We want residents to see the amenities of the new building, but we also want them to feel welcome here. It's their building."

Nearly a full day's worth of activities are planned, including several musical groups for entertainment, welcome by village, county and state leaders, and tours of the new facility.

"Residents are already coming in to the building to pay water bills and get building permits, but this will be an opportunity for them to see 'behind the scenes,' and get a feel for how employees will be better able to serve residents with a more efficient working environment," Block said.

Residents who are unable to attend the Dedication Ceremony can watch the festivities airing live on Addison Community Television Channel 17.

Groundbreaking for the \$10.1 million building was held in March 1999. The project included a complete remodeling of the adjoining police department.

Classic Georgian architecture was chosen to avoid having the building look dated in just a few years, and to make it a focal point of downtown.

Residents enter the distinguished elegant rotunda, and find immediately the areas which are most visited

Proper Trash Removal Guidelines

Browning Ferris, Inc. (BFI), garbage disposal contractor, recommends these guidelines to ensure proper trash removal.

BFI will collect all garbage, furniture, appliances, and landscape waste that is properly placed in containers no bigger than **32 gals. with handles**, weighing no more than 80 lbs. per container.

Garbage may be placed at the curb between 6 p.m. the night before and 6 a.m. the day of your pickup. Call BFI 24 hours before pick-up day to remove furniture and household appliances.

Grass clippings and leaves can be placed in the brown biodegradable bags, or cans displaying two landscape stickers placed one on each side.

Recycling may be placed in clear plastic bags, available at local merchants, or a recycling bin may be purchased from BFI for \$5.

Materials from construction, remodeling, concrete bricks, tree stumps, earth or earthy materials, automobile bodies or large machine parts, materials of a toxic, or explosive nature are not included in this contract. The contractor will charge an additional fee for removal of these items, or may refuse to remove them.

For multi-unit residents a recycling center is at the Wastewater Treatment Facility, 711 N. Addison Rd., open 8 a.m. - 7 p.m. Monday - Friday, 8 a.m. - noon Saturday.



National Night Out



Business As Usual

Village Staff Begins Work in New Building as Project Nears Completion

By the time this issue of *Spotlight on Addison* reaches residents’ mailboxes, employees of the Village of Addison are expected to be operating out of the new building, despite the fact that the project is not yet complete.

Following the move of files and work equipment – which was expected to take place the weekend of June 24 – the old building will undergo a month-long asbestos abatement before demolition of the 75-year old building can take place.

The demolition will be a delicate undertaking because the wing which houses the police department, which was constructed in the 1970s, will remain as a wing to the new building.

Until demolition and repaving of the parking lot west of Village Hall is complete, those who need to visit should enter on the east side of the new Village Hall, and park along Army Trail Blvd., near St. Paul Church.

Those who need to attend traffic court may enter the building on the south side.

The village staff wishes to express its appreciation for residents’ patience during the past year, and asks that they continue to extend it for the next few months, until the project is complete.

Vehicle stickers to arrive

Watch for your vehicle sticker renewal forms arriving in early August. Vehicle stickers will be on sale beginning Aug. 1 at the Village Hall.

Residents who currently have a Village of Addison vehicle sticker will receive a pre-printed renewal form in the mail. We encourage residents to verify the accuracy of the information on the pre-printed form, and save time by using the return envelope provided.

New residents should bring in your vehicle registration card, showing your Addison address when applying for your sticker. All the information you need for the sticker application can be found on your registration card.

A new sticker must be displayed by October 15 in order to avoid ticketing and penalties.

Vehicle stickers are valid Sept. 1, 2000 through Aug. 31, 2001.



New Computer Lab in Use

Serving students of all ages

For many years Addison School District 4 has placed a strong emphasis on the use of current technology within its schools. A technology change implemented during the 1999-2000 school year has enabled District 4 to more fully serve the community of Addison as well. A district PC training lab was established at Stone School. This lab was developed with two major goals in mind--to train teachers and staff on the new computers and software, plus offering computer classes to the community through a partnership grant with AT&T.

In July 1999, the Technology Committee recommended to the Board of Education that District 4 schools convert to Windows-based PCs, eventually replacing the Macs that are currently used in the schools. Beginning in the fall, a PC was added to every classroom in the district. In order to facilitate the use of the new computers by the teachers, classes were scheduled for the new PC lab. Computers, which were delivered to Stone School in November, were installed and the new lab was up and running by December 1999.

Since that time, classes have been offered Monday through Thursday after school and in the evenings. In addition to teacher training, classes such as Internet usage and basic computer skills have been offered to parents, senior citizens and other community members. The lab has also been utilized by the University of Illinois. This lab has proven to be such an effective tool that through the months of April and May every available evening time slot was filled.

The lab is equipped with 30 new PCs which are fully networked and have Internet access. Printers are also available. To make the lab effective for teaching, there is a large screen overhead projector which displays the teacher's computer screen for the students to follow along. In addition, the lab is handicapped accessible.

- Two (2) proofs of residency such as utility bills, signed leases, tax bill, etc.
- A current physical examination form, signed by the doctor and parent.
- Names and phone numbers of two local emergency contacts.

Student fees are payable at registration. For more information, please contact your individual school after Monday, August 14.

Fees cover consumable materials such as work sheets and periodicals used by students. The junior high fee does not include the cost of the gym uniform or the \$4.50 lock. Both girls' and boys' gym uniforms will cost \$17. All fees are payable at registration in August.

Paid busing is also an option for those elementary students who live within .9 mile of their elementary school or for junior high students who live within 1.5 miles of Indian Trail. For parents who pay for this service by the close of business (4 p.m.) on August 29, 2000, the fee is \$245. Those who choose a six month installment plan will pay \$264.

Lunch costs have also been set for both elementary and junior high students. Elementary students will pay \$1.70 a day for a complete lunch. The daily junior high lunch price will be \$1.80.

Children must be accompanied by a parent or guardian with a copy of a current immunization record. A fee of \$7 will be charged for each vaccine received. Families with public aid cards must bring their card.

All students new to the District, as well as those entering kindergarten and fifth grade, are required to present evidence of a recent physical exam and current immunization record.

Children will be excluded from school until their immunizations and physical exams are current.

Building Improvements

Summer is always a busy time for building maintenance and this year is no exception. The building additions at Army Trail and Fullerton School are continuing to progress on schedule. Their completion in time for the beginning of school is eagerly anticipated.

A \$3.2 million Energy Management project is underway with the goal of creating a healthier, safer, better learning atmosphere for our students. This project includes:

- *Lighting and window upgrades for all schools that have not yet been replaced
- *Repairing & replacing the unit ventilators in all classrooms
- *Replacing, adding & repairing boiler and valves as needed
- *Adding a new ventilation system to Indian Trail. This includes new air conditioning units for the commons and computer labs and an air tempering system for the remainder of the junior high.
- *Adding a security card access system to the most-used entry door of each school building.

Board of Education changes meeting day

In Board action taken during the May 22 meeting, school board members voted to change their regular meeting day to Tuesday. This enables the board to take advantage of the board room facilities in the new Village Hall. It has not yet been decided if all Board of Education meetings will be held there, but the size of the new board room lends itself to public meetings. Also, the state-of-the-art video equipment available there will improve the quality of the cable TV broadcasts of meetings held in the new facility. Another aspect that was considered when making the day change is that previously, the Village Board, Park District Board and Board of Education all held their meetings on Monday evenings. Moving to Tuesday evenings allows interested parties greater access to meetings of the different governmental bodies. Please note the earlier starting time as well as the date changes.


