



Emergency Services Reorganized

The Addison Village Board voted to reorganize the Emergency Services and Disaster Agency (ESDA) in April.

The change came about due to concerns of ongoing operational problems and the resignation of the head of the agency.

ESDA will now be made part of the Addison Police Department, under the auspices of the Chief of Police. This will provide additional accountability for the agency's operations, and will ensure the unit is focused on providing service to residents during emergencies. All existing ESDA equipment is undergoing reconditioning and will be reassigned to various Village Departments.

"The bottom line is that the emergency services ESDA provides – such as pumping out basements during heavy rains – will continue," said Village Manager Joseph Block. "These services will remain the same, but hopefully productivity and accountability will increase."

Due to the reorganization, duplication of services can be eliminated, while maintenance of emergency equipment can be handled more effectively.

Protect Yourself from Swindlers, Con Artists



Police Beat

Solicitation calls are often seen as an annoyance, but they can also be much more. Con artists have learned to use the telephone to promote confusion and deceive consumers and home owners on a regular basis.

To help protect you and your family from telephone scams please be aware of the following tip-offs to telephone frauds. If the caller states or requests any of the following:

- You must send cash, or give a credit card or bank account number.
- You must have a check available to be picked up by a courier, overnight delivery or anyone else.
- You have won a "free" gift, vacation, or prize and you only have to pay only for "postage and handling" or other charges.
- You have to act *now* or the offer will not be good.

Avoid Being Swindled

- Don't buy by phone from unfamiliar companies. Ask for written information about any offer or charity.
- Always check out unfamiliar companies with the Attorney General's Office or local Better Business Bureau.
- Never send money or give out your credit card or bank account number unless you are absolutely sure the company is legitimate.
- Follow this advice: **If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.**

Under new Federal Trade Commission Rules, telemarketers cannot:

- Call before 8 a.m. or after 9 p.m.
- Call again after you have said you do not want to be called
- Provide misleading information about their product or service.
- Access bank accounts without provable authorization.

Before making a contribution, verify that they are a bonafide organization through The Attorney General's Office at 1-800-243-5377 .

Drinking Water Quality Concerns

The Village of Addison Public Works department has received many calls from concerned residents regarding a musty taste or odor of their drinking water in recent summers. Although the problem is very real, the water is and continues to be perfectly safe to drink.

Ironically, much of the problem comes from the improved water quality of Lake Michigan. Because the water is cleaner, sunlight is able to penetrate further down into the lake. This has caused more growth of plants and algae, especially in shallow parts of the lake. During the summer months, when the water temperature of the lake rises, the plant and algae growth increases, causing the taste and odor concerns.

To address this problem, the City of Chicago, from whom the Village purchases the water, adds a step to the purification process. Activated charcoal is used to absorb the increased amount of organic matter such as algae, prior to the regular treatment.

Unfortunately, the Village of Addison can do nothing to remedy the problem. If you do experience taste or odor problems with your water this summer and wish to register a complaint, however, please call the Public Works Department at 279-4517 so that we can relay your concerns to the City of Chicago.

1998 Sidewalk Program

During the 1998 construction season, the Village of Addison will be replacing portions of public sidewalk that are considered potential trip hazards. A trip hazard is a sidewalk square or squares that protrude 1-1/8 inches or more above the adjoining sidewalk elevation.

If you feel that any of the sidewalk in front of your house is a potential trip hazard, please contact the Public Works Department at 279-4517. The sidewalk squares that are determined to be potential trip hazards only will be replaced at no cost to the homeowner. If you would like any additional public sidewalk replaced, it can be done under the 50/50 sidewalk replacement program.

The homeowner's cost for each 5' x 5' square of sidewalk will be \$35, approximately one-half of the total replacement cost. If you are interested in participating in this program, please contact the Public Works Department at 279-4517.



Improved Wood Chips

The Village of Addison is offering an improvement to the free wood chips that are made available to the residents. By using a tub grinder to regrind the wood chips, they are now more uniform in size, with far fewer twigs and sticks mixed in with them and are of a much higher quality.

Residents can use these wood chips as mulch around trees and shrubs, and its rich brown color will enhance any landscape.

The wood chips are available at the corner of Vista and Winthrop Avenues, adjacent to fire station no. 2 and the water standpipe.

Teaching the basics is alive and well in Addison School District 4 classrooms



Reading, 'riting, and 'rithmetic. The three "R's" conjure up memories of the good old days when reading, writing and arithmetic made up the entire curriculum. In those times students learned the basics. They still do.

American education has learned, however, that the basics go beyond the 3 "R's."

District 4 curriculum is firmly rooted in the basics as a foundation for all learning. Reading, Spelling, English, Social Science, Handwriting, Mathematics, Science, Health, Music, Art, and Physical Education make up its core curriculum. These subjects are taught at all grade levels.

The need for a solid basic educational foundation has not changed. The skills learned through the basic curriculum provide today's students with the means to adjust to rapidly changing life skills.

While the basics remain the same, their means of development in today's school is in keeping with the times. An integrated approach which hones basic skills in a number of areas around a central theme is frequently used.

Students may research a subject in depth, discover its significance, perform related computations, conduct experiments, and share their findings. In the process they employ and develop basic reading, writing, math, science, and social studies skills. They also enhance fine arts and physical skills. In short, they learn basic skills in ways which relate to real life.

District 4's educational philosophy states, "All children shall be provided opportunities to gain knowledge and educational skills which are essential for learning throughout life. Emphasis shall be on preparing students to be lifelong learners and productive members of society." The District curriculum reflects its philosophy. The curriculum teaches basic skills in a contemporary fashion.

Technology has enhanced the educational opportunities available to today's children. Its integration might be thought of as the new basic skill which illuminates all the others. By providing students with all the basic skills, today's educators light the lamp of lifelong learning for their students.

Reading, writing, and arithmetic may not be as basic as they once were but they are alive and well. They are being taught in District 4 classrooms.



Lake Park students present engaged learning project

Congratulations to Lake Park Elementary students and staff who were presenters at the Inaugural Student Technology Conference sponsored by the Illinois State Board of Education this spring. Their LP2 project was one of about 100 student-run sessions detailing school and personal projects involving the use of computer technology.

Lake Park's LP2, Lake Park Landscaping

Project, focused on problem based learning, school-wide involvement, integrated curriculum, and community commitment.

The conference was planned by students for students. It provided a forum for teachers and administrators to see how computers and telecommunication technology can be used by students to improve learning and achievement.

News anchors in the making at IT

The 5:30 news is nothing new but the 5:30 Daily News Show on Channel 17 is big news. Indian Trail Junior High recently launched its daily program on local access cable TV.

Every day adolescent news anchors look into the camera and report the day's events at Indian Trail Junior High. They film the news in a tiny studio and edit the half hour show every day before classes begin.

All are members of the Video Service Team. Under the direction of teacher, Rob Hepburn, a staff of approximately 15 students produce a new show daily that is shown during lunch.

After lunch, a courier hand delivers the day's program to the Addison Community Relations Department. A few short hours later, at 5:30 p.m., The Indian Trail Daily News Show can be seen in its entirety on ACTV channel 17. Viewers then have the opportunity to catch up on Indian Trail happenings. The program airs Monday through Friday when school is in session.

The Indian Trail Daily News Show consists of announcements and event relevant to the junior high. Highlights of school games, including pre-game interviews and play-by-play commentaries are featured. Special events and still shots also appear.

Team members recently participated in a training session which focused on filming tech-

niques and on-air presentation tips. The training was provided to the team by Addison Community Relations Coordinator, Don Weiss, and ACTV Operations Coordinator, Mike Tynus.

Pilot program communicates success

Your child's teacher pays you a visit. Last summer District 4 initiated a program of home visits on a limited basis. The purpose of the pilot program was to build a stronger school/family relationship based on communication.

Teachers and parents discussed information that would be helpful to both. School procedures and the child's interests were shared.

Participating teachers and their home visit families found that communication increased between them during the school year. Classroom telephones with voice mail enhanced the teachers' accessibility. Students could even call parents to relay good news during the school day.

Enhanced communication is leading to greater student success in the classroom. That success means the program will continue in 1998-99.

1998-99 health requirements

Please note the following health requirements for the 1998-99 school year.

Students entering any of the District 4 preschool programs must have proof of an Hib vaccine and three (3) doses of Hepatitis B vaccine. Children need to have received the Hib vaccine on or after 15 months of age.

All students new to the District, as well as those entering kindergarten and fifth grade, are required to present evidence of a recent physical exam and current immunization record. The immunizations required include Measles, Mumps, Rubella (MMR), Polio, and Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis (DTP) in appropriate doses. In addition, all students entering fifth grade, and all sixth graders are required to receive the Hepatitis B vaccine prior to the first day of the 1998-99 school year. Hepatitis B is given in a schedule of three doses.

Children are no longer required to receive a lead screening before beginning school.

Immunizations are available from the DuPage County Health Department at \$7 per vaccine, per child. Parents must accompany their children to the clinic and present their children's current immunization records.

Children will be excluded from school for the 1998-99 school year until their immunizations and physical exams are current.

Recycle!



Help Pave Our Outdoor Reading Room

The Addison Public Library will install the statue *A Book for Everyone* in the fall of 1998. This sculpture celebrates the love of reading, which should be encouraged in everyone, especially children.

The finished sculpture, which will be almost six feet tall, depicts a boy reading a book. The base of the statue is a pile of books. The sculpture will be located to the east of the entryway in our Outdoor Reading Room. Benches will make this a welcoming place to relax and read.

To assist the Library in making this a community project, decorative tapered brick pavers will be available to individuals, families, civic organizations, businesses and industries, and vendors and benefactors for a donation. These commemorative bricks come in two sizes, 4"x8" and 8"x8". Each personalized paver is individually engraved and filled with epoxy and color.


Money raised through the Continuous Book Sale and the Annual Magazine Sale will be used also. No tax monies will be used to fund this project.



The nonrefundable \$49 fee, due at registration, includes all admission fees and lunch. Place your reservation at the Readers' Services desk. Space is limited.


